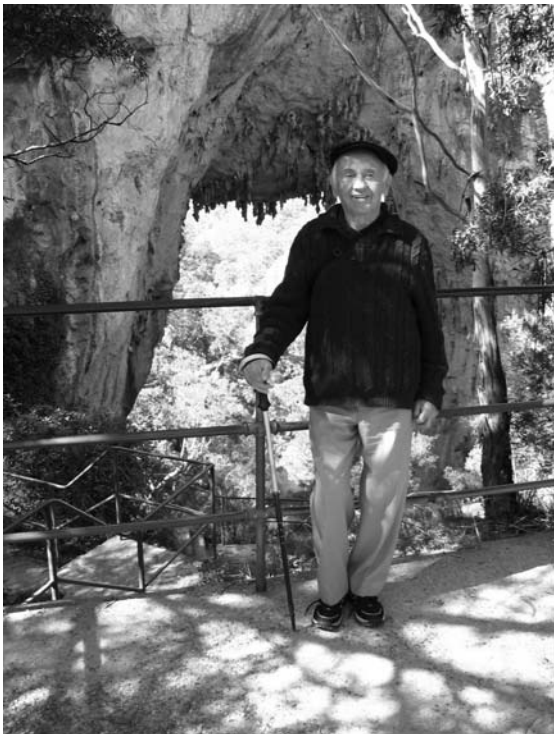

Basil Ralston (author of the book *The Golden Ages of Caving*) and his wife Irene, recently visited Jenolan Caves in April 2005 some forty years after working there as a guide. Basil worked at Jenolan in 1964-1965, during the time that Ron Newbould and John Culley discovered the Barralong Cave. After a days' work showing the caves to the public, they would go off exploring in the show cave system till all hours, and although not on the initial discovery trip, Basil made many trips into the Barralong helping to explore it.

This trip, Basil took in a tour of the Temple of Baal, dropped in at the Guides office for a long chat, walked around Carlotta Arch, the Blue Lake his old home in Burma Road, and even ventured up McKeowns Valley.

Basil said "My unforgettable memory of the whole weekend was sitting in the guides office and being accepted as one of them. They are beautiful people" He also commented upon leaving at the end of the weekend "he felt like he was leaving home!" ♦

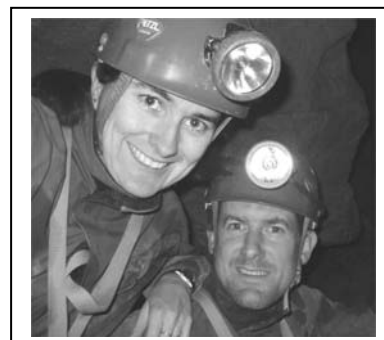
SOCIETY SPOTLIGHT

For the past 11 years now we have driven to Jenolan from Newcastle over 50 times now to pursue our weekend recreational activity, caving.

My husband Gary and I are members of Illawarra Speleological Society and Sydney Uni Speleological Society. We are actively involved in cave surveying, and exploration at Jenolan, and many other caving destinations both around Australia and overseas. In fact we even spend our holidays going caving!

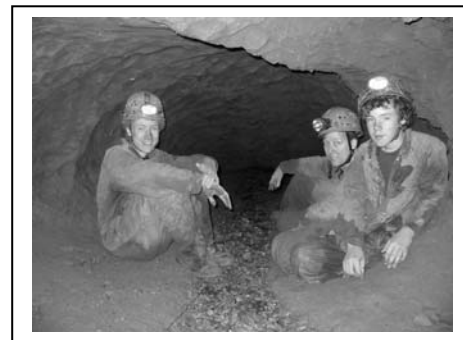
A recent caving highlight for us was in January 2005 we led several other JCH&PS and Illawarra club members on a trip from Spider Cave through to the Jubilee which featured in an article in the Sydney Morning Herald (24 January 2005 page 3). That morning heavy rain fell, 59.6mls in that 24hr period. Only three trips ever have completed this journey between the two caves, and we have been on 2 of them. The linking passage was only discovered late last year during times of drought. Within 2 weeks of the January trip, the Water Cavern at the end of the Jubilee Cave had filled with water again and was sumped. It only dried up a few times last century, so who knows when it will be passable again.

The old photo of Jeremiah Wilson abseiling down the Grand Arch (that hangs in the guides office) first got me thinking more about the early days of Jenolan. Having seen many old initials and signatures in the caves, I started to wonder about the life and times of our early day cave explorers who etched their mark on the limestone walls deep inside Jenolan. It was these inscriptions of Wilson, Wiburd and others that inspired me to want to know more about Jenolan and its history. So thus one of the reasons we joined the society. ♦

WHAT'S IN YOUR CUPBOARD ???

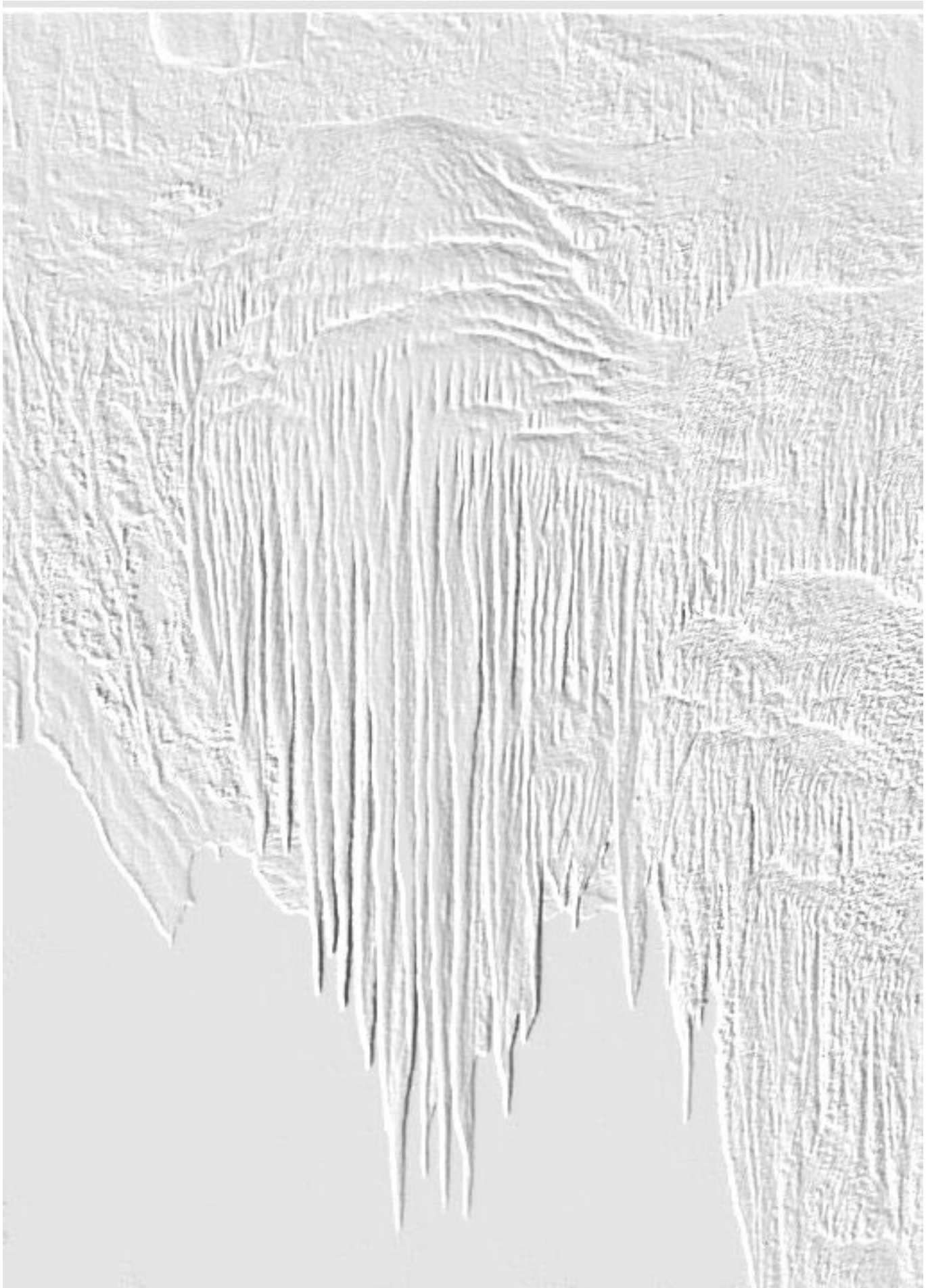
