TWO DOWN, THREE TO GO

The third year of the Florida Breeding Bird Atlas is under way. Eagles, Ospreys, Owls, Great Blue Herons, and Wood Ducks are now nesting, and several other species are about to begin. We are most grateful to all of you who have contributed time, effort, and data to this project. This is an important year -- we must be over halfway through block coverage by the end of this season if we are to be successful. Where does your county stand in this regard? One means to help coordinators to improve coverage is through volunteer blockbusting parties. This year some funds are available in each region to assist with organized blockbusting efforts. We hope every coordinator and cooperator will make a special effort to complete their current atlas blocks and move on to new blocks (especially the two priority blocks in each quad).

FIRST YEAR'S (1986) DATA PRINTOUTS


Data printouts of the first year's computer input are now in the hands of county and regional coordinators. These are to be checked by the coordinators, and, if necessary by the cooperators involved, and any errors, or missing information brought to the attention of the state coordinator (Wes Biggs). In some instances, new information on the printout will be a result of an added casual observation. Unfortunately, the data processor neglected to add a code to

indicate an added casual observation, but in future printouts this will be indicated by a notation at the bottom of the page.

In some cases, whole blocks or quads may accidentally have been omitted from the printout--please bring this to our attention. Every County coordinator must keep a record of the blocks (and quads) for which he has forwarded data cards so that he can insure that the annual printout accounts for every block for which a card was submitted.

After the 1987 field data are computerized, we will produce as many species maps as possible at the block level for each region. These will better show what and where gaps exist so that special efforts can be made to fill these in by individual cooperators and by blockbusting teams.







DISBRIBUTION OF FOUR FLORIDA SPECIES


We asked Brad Stith to prepare preliminary maps for four species—two that are widespread in Florida (the Northern Mockingbird and Caroline Wren) and two with relatively restricted distribution (the Indigo Bunting in North Florida and the Mangrove Cuckoo in the Keys and southern mangrove—fringed coasts). These appear on

this page and show distribution (1986 data) by surveyed quadrangles. Please remember that several of our counties and many blocks received no atlas coverage in 1986, hence blank spots do not necessarily indicate absence of birds. On the other hand, it should encourage cooperators to "fill in the blanks" whenever possible.

Barbara Parham is the new Putnam County Coordinator. She and her husband have recently moved to Palatka from Jacksonville.

Dr. Bob Loftin has agreed to serve as St. Johns County Coordinator, replacing Brian Peters, who was transferred out of state.

Longtime Orange Auduboner and active atlasser Bob Sullivan will be co-coordinating Seminole County with Dr. Walt Taylor.

After three other County Coordinators have fallen by the wayside, Hillsborough County has now got a fireball named Gail Parsons.

The new coordinator for Osceola County is none other than our Region 7 Coordinator, Chuck Geanangel.

Merritt Island atlasser Dan Click is now the Coordinator for Region 8, replacing Doug Stuckey, who had to resign because of other demands on his time.

St. Lucie County Cooperator, Jane Brooks, is the new Okeechobee County Coordinator. Jane's husband, John, has also agreed to help get the job done.



One of the hottest birders in Miami is the new Region 9 Coordinator, Mickey Wheeler. Mickey takes over from Sonny Bass, who will continue to serve as a member of the Atlas Advisory Board and cooperator.

John and Linda Douglas are the new Collier County Coordinators.

Our new Hendry County Coordinator is Lynne S. Lewis of LaBelle. Lynne moved south from Jacksonville about a year ago, and is just about the only birder in Hendry County.

There isn't a new coordinator for Monroe County, it just looks that way on the list. The original coordinator has a new name. The blockbuster of the Florida Keys, Karen Sunderland, has married the luckiest man in Tavernier, and is now Karen Strobel.



NEWS FROM THE COORDINATORS' CONFERENCES

The annual coordinators' conferences were held in January, 1988. We wish to thank Jim Cox and the Game Commission for hosting the January 16 meeting in Tallahassee, which was attended by 24 people from Regions 1-4.

The Archbold Biological Station hosted the meeting for Regions 5-9 near Lake Placid on January 23, attended by 52 people. Thanks go to Fred Lohrer and Dave Johnston of ABS for their assistance.

Project Director Herb Kale and State Coordinator Wes Biggs gave a brief overview of the project to date and reported on the North American Breeding Bird Atlas (NABBA) Conference that they and Region 7 Coordinator Chuck Geanangel attended in San Francisco in August, 1987.

The 1986 computer printouts were distributed to county and regional coordinators.

A lengthy discussion concerning "adequate block coverage" was held. Coordinators were urged to seek breeding information from wildlife rehabilitation centers who receive many baby birds each year.

Techniques for recruiting and retaining cooperators were discussed, with many good ideas coming from Polk County Coordinator, Buck Cooper, and Hillsborough County Coordinator, Gail Parsons.

The conclusion was reached that County Coordinators need to spend some time with their atlassers showing them the most profitable use of their time in the field.

A great deal of information was exchanged in regard to blockbusting ideas and how Regional Coordinators and County Coordinators will need to work closely to institute effective regional blockbusting during the coming breeding season.

It was announced that every effort would be made to raise the needed additional monies to start the paid blockbusting phase of the project in 1988 instead of 1989.

The importance of a good working relationship between cooperators and County and Regional Coordinators and Atlas Headquarters was emphasized.

A new "Year End Report Form" was distributed to all county coordinators. The form is designed to help coordinators and Atlas Headquarters keep up to date on block coverage.

Coordinators were resupplied with all atlas printed materials with the exception of Handbooks which Herb and Wes will be revising before a new printing is made.

The annual Coordinators' Conferences are forums for Coordinators to learn and to teach. Based on comments and suggestions from participants, next year's conferences will be conducted with slightly altered format.

MISCELLANEOUS ITEMS

All checks sent to the Atlas project for whatever reason should be made out to Florida Audubon Society, with a notation at the bottom of the check, "For BBA project."

Breeding Bird Atlas materials cost money. If you are no longer interested in taking an active part in the Atlas project, please inform your county coordinator, and return materials that another person could be making use of. If you have completed field data cards from 1986 or 1987, please make a copy and send the original directly to Atlas headquarters.

PLEASE be sure to fill in the space for hours on your 1988 Field Data Cards. If the block you are working in is also where you live, do the best you can to estimate the actual time you spent atlassing there. For those of you who left that space blank on your 1986 or 1987 cards, you will be contacted by your County or Regional Coordinator in the very near future to provide that very necessary information.

ATLASSERS IN THE NEWS

The Glades County Democrat ran a story in the July 9, 1987 issue that explained the Atlas project and asked prospective cooperators in Glades and Hendry Counties to contact Glades County Coordinator, June McCallum.

Hillsborough County Coordinator Gail Parsons and Pasco County Coordinator Bill Pranty appeared in an article in the July 28, 1987, issue of the Tampa Tribune's Pasco edition. Writer Eunice Stump seemed to have had a good time on her trip into "the world of birds." Not surprising, considering the fact that they had the rare "yellow crownight warbler!"

The Caloosa Belle printed a guest editorial by Hendry County Coordinator Lynne Lewis in the edition of August 19, 1987. Lynne's article on the life and times of the Florida Scrub Jay gave the reader a good overview of the precarious situation in which the Scrub Jay exists.

Region 6 coordinator Dave Goodwin and Hillsborough County Coordinator, Gail Parsons, conducted the meeting attended by 24 atlassers and Tribune staff writer, Naftali Bendavid, who wrote a good article explaining the atlas project and the proceedings at the meeting.

The fall issue of The Nature Conservancy Florida Chapter Newsletter contained a photo of Atlas Data Base Director and Conservancy Chapter Chairman, Steve Humphrey. In the photo, Steve and Northwest Florida Water Management District representative, Bill Smith, are shown unveiling a plaque at Edward Ball Wakulla Springs State Park last July.

It's hard to believe, folks, but there is something that Polk County atlasser Paul Fellers knows even more about than birds. Yes, Virginia, it's orange juice. The Orlando Sentinel Florida Magazine of September 20, 1987, had a very interesting interview with Dr. O.J. that appeared in the People Watch section. The accompanying color photo by staff photographer George Skene made Paul look much younger than he really is.

The striking color illustration that appeared on the cover of the September/October 1987 issue of Bird Watcher's Digest was the creation of BBA logo designer, Ann Sisson. Ann also co-authored a wonderful article in that issue entitled "Burrowing Owls in Florida's Urban Underground."

MEET THE COORDINATORS BY BRUCE NEVILLE

COORDINATOR OF THE YEAR 1986

The first Florida Breeding Bird Atlas award for Best Coordinator went to Buck Cooper of Polk County. For the honor, Buck received a Ray Harm bird print at the spring 1987 FOS meeting near Lake City.

Buck was born and raised in Winter Haven. After his retirement from the Air Force, he returned to Winter Haven, where he has been the Resident Naturalist at Ridge Audubon Society's Street Nature Center for the past two years. Buck recently married, and he and his wife, Linda, honeymooned in Panama. When not birding, Buck and Linda enjoy antiques, music, and the theater.

Birds are just one of his hobbies, and he is interested in all facets of natural history. His early training was in herpetology. Buck is a reformed lister. He still keeps a Florida list, but he can't say how many he's seen in the U.S. or the world.

He says his favorite bird is the one in his binoculars at the time, but when pressed, he says it would have to be the Swallow-tailed Kite. His favorite local birding spot is the phosphate mines of central Florida, which he likens to the mountains of the moon.

Polk County is one of the largest in the state, with 32 quads. So far, Buck has 30 atlassers in the county. Among the best finds have been Blue Grosbeaks feeding young in Green Swamp, 70 Sandhill Crane nests, and a previously unknown Bald Eagle nest. Buck and a friend in a plane managed to spot three families of Wild Turkeys, thus confirming that species in three blocks in one morning. His most exciting find was the biggest rattler he ever saw under a huge live oak.



Buck's advice to his fellow coordinators is to treat your atlassers with respect and give them lots of encouragement. Buck tries to get out at least once with each of his atlassers. His advice to atlassers is to wait until later in the season when it's easier to confirm more species and not to burn yourself out too early in the season. Even hard-core listers have found atlassing fun, because it requires them to stop and look at even the common species.

NOTES TO COUNTY COORDINATORS



Please remember to contact each cooperator who did not list hours actively atlassing on their 1986 data cards. In one way or another, they need to come up with a reasonable estimate of actual time spent in their blocks. This should not be difficult to do.

Please ask your cooperators about any interesting anecdotes, incidents, experiences, ideas, etc., that they would be willing to share with other atlassers in the pages of this newsletter.

Funds (\$200/region) are available to support voluntary blockbusting in each region during 1988. Please get with your regional coordinator to help determine where and when your regional blockbusting will occur. Regional coordinators should keep Atlas headquarters apprised of your plans.
