THE TOBACCO MARKET.

NEW-YORK, July 19.—The market is

generally more active, and prices are well

maintained, and in some instances show a

slight improvement.

Leaf.—A good business is doing in Western

leaf for export, and the sales for the

week amount to upwards of 3200 hogheads.

The prices realized are fully up to current

ufactured. Receipts for the week, 628 boxes and 8 hds. Exports, 5 boxes to the Provinces.

PORTLAND, July 15.—There is no movement whatever to report, and the market has never before been so dull.

PHILADELPHIA, July 15.—Manufactured, especially the finer qualities, is in some demand, but transactions are very limited. Small lots are arriving from Virginia, but most of the samples are unsuitable for the trade, and buyers are very fearful of operating in them. Although business is excessively dull, there is a prevailing confidence in an improved market in early autumn.

Exports, 1088 lbs. leaf to Havana, and 8878 lbs. mf. to Barbados. No imports.

BALTIMORE, July 15.—The receipts of Maryland continue light, but market is firm, although the demand is a little less active on account of the unfavorable news from foreign markets. Shippers show very little disposition to buy. Some few lots have been taken to fill up the vessels now on the berth.

Ohio is coming in more freely. Sales are very limited, and the stock consequently increasing in factors' hands. Prices, however, continue firm. Kentucky is quiet.

Manufactured is without change. There is a moderate inquiry for bright goods, which are scarce.

Inspections of leaf this week, 286 hds. Maryland, 928 do. Ohio, 56 do. Kentucky, and 2 do. Virginia—total, 1272 hds.

Cleared this week, 1108 hds. to Bremen, 34 do. to Liverpool, and 7 to West Indies—total, 1149 hds.

NEW-ORLEANS, July 7.—The market continues at a standstill. The old current of trade has not yet resumed its course, although there are indications that it will do so at no distant day. It is believed that foreign orders to a limited extent could be executed here as favorably to the exporter as at any other port in the United States. Letters from the West state that very considerable shipments will be made to this market as soon as indications of a renewal of the export demand will justify it. At the same time, we are informed that there are foreign orders already pending here, which are held back in the hope of having a larger stock to fill from. If even a portion of these orders were executed at once, it would undoubtedly stimulate receipts, and help materially to revive the trade.

Arrived since the 29th ult., 63 hds.; cleared, none; stock, 810 hds.

FOREIGN.

HAVANA, July 8.—Although the season is far advanced, the year's business has not fairly opened yet. Buyers are very cautious, as the bulk of the crop, particularly in the Vuelta Abajo, is not yet disposed of; very little has been done, except a few contracts at extreme rates—say 1sts a 5ths at \$200, 6ths at \$120, 7ths at \$80 a \$90, 8ths and 9ths at \$25 a \$30. Some of this was of superior quality and of average classification and bulk of fillers. Owing to the unfavorable advices from abroad, shippers operate only on a limited scale almost exclusively in the best Partido, with a trifle of second-class Vuelta Abajo. The usual rates are, for 1sts to 5ths, \$100 a \$150; 6ths, \$60 a \$80; 7ths, \$30 a \$45; and 8ths, \$12 a \$18—the higher figures including extra bulky bales of 150 lbs. net.

The supply during the last fortnight has been confined to unsuitable descriptions, and therefore had to be stored.

A few lots of superior Vuelta Abajo have recently arrived, but have not been offered for sale.

The stock does not exceed 1000 bales inferior and middling Partido. Superior is scarce, and prices are stiff.

The crops of both Vuelta Abajo and Partido are estimated to fall short considerably, the amount of superior not being so large nor prices so easy as was thought they would be.

The stock of old has lately been considerably diminished.

Vuelta Abajo is still in good supply, the stock being considered ample for the manufacturers until the new is available. Fillers are being absorbed rapidly by the active demand for the United States. The shipments have been composed mainly of inferior and middling (in default of others), the prices ranging from \$12 a \$17 per qt. Superior has sold at \$25 a \$28 per bale of 100 lbs. net.

For Germany and the Netherlands, some fillers of comparatively good quality have been taken at \$7.50 a \$10 per qt.

For the Spanish contract, 500 bales very inferior sold at \$7 per qt. Desirable bargains are now not easily made at the late rate.

Nothing has been done for the French or Austrian contracts that we hear of.

Of Yara and Guira (Manzanillo), Mayari, Gibara, Saguanamo, etc., there is none on hand. Of Matanzas, which of late years has been a staple article with us, scarcely 2000 bales could be gathered; hence the price of assorted has advanced to \$25 a \$30, and fillers up to \$10 per bale. Manicargua, sold also under the head of Matanzas, can not be had at all just now. The next crop is said to promise satisfactorily. Prices have not opened yet, owing to the shyness of buyers.

Cigars continue in demand, particularly for the United States. The descriptions most sought for are those not costing over \$30, and coming under the tariff of \$1.25, and 30 per cent. ad valorem.

California is now calling for a larger proportion of qualities above that figure, say at \$31 a \$45.

The reduction in prices previously alluded to does not amount to much: that in Cabanas was mainly caused by a great falling off in the United States, and particularly California. This will not affect it much in the European markets, as its standard is as unimpaired as ever. Panetelas, which formerly cost \$40 a \$50, can now be had at \$35 a \$40,

and Trabucos and Operas, which were at \$50, are now at \$40.

Good new cigars will probably not come to market before September. It is said some new French and Austrian contracts are pending, but nothing, however, is known for certain.

BUENOS AYRES, May 26.—Supplies of Paraguay having now entirely ceased, holders are very firm in their demands, and quotations remain unchanged. The few sales made during the month have been for consumption—for export there being no demand whatever.

MONTREAL, July 8.—Manufactured shows no activity nor change in price.

Western leaf is almost without sales. Transactions in Canada leaf are limited to small lots. We quote:

LONDON, July 4.—Recent advices from the United States have tended to render the market more firm; but prices have as yet undergone no change. Buyers, considering the large stock on hand, entertain but little apprehension of a rise caused by the reported failure of supplies from North America.

Western leaf, of good quality, is in fair demand, but without transactions. Strips are dull, with the exception of fine old spinners, which are becoming quite scarce. Between the 1st of January and the 1st of July the stock was augmented by 627 hds., whereas last year, during the same period, it diminished 2820 hds. The stock of Western leaf on the 1st of July was 5482 hds. in excess of that at the same date in 1864.

The stock of all kinds of North American on the 1st of January was 19,120 hds.; on the 1st of July, 19,792 hds. We quote:

LIVERPOOL, July 4.—The demand for medium qualities of Western leaf for Ireland continues good, and prices are unaltered. Sales are made of Missouri, which we quote as follows:

The market closes a little more firm, under the influence of American advices.

For sound, well-made New-York tens the demand continues good, but inferior qualities are unsalable.

The stock of Western leaf on the 1st of July was 11,769 hds. in excess of 1864 at same date.

The stock of North American of all kinds was 10,738 hds. in excess of 1864, it having increased since the 1st of January by 2795 hds., while in 1864 it was diminished by 5022 hds.

BREMEN, July 1.—We have received from Carl Focke's Widow and Son, through their New-York representative, Mr. C. W. Walter, a report of the market up to this date. We extract from it as follows:

"We have to report a much better feeling for all finer grades of the new crop of Kentucky; prices are at least 1 to 1½ grt. higher, and we expect further a very good demand for good and heavy new qualities.

"Old Kentucky and Missouri are neglected, and rather lower. For Maryland there is no demand and no transactions.

"Kentucky.—Sales 100 hds. ordinary and good ordinary heavy Clarksville at 7½ grt.; 100 hds. fine medium and ordinary saucers at 20 grt.; 12 hds. of the new crop, of which 1 hhd. refused, and 11 hds. medium and fine heavy at 15 grt.; 25 hds. ordinary, very leafy, at 8½ grt.

HAMBURG, June 30.—Sales from first hands this week are limited to 223 pkgs. Spanish stems and 15 cs. seed-leaf. At auction 230 cerons St. Domingo sold at 4 and 9½ sch.; and 64 cerons sold at 4 and 9½ sch.

ROTTERDAM, July 1.—Nothing worthy of note has transpired during the week beyond the sale of 112 cerons Havana.

AMSTERDAM, July 1.—No sales to report to-day. The stock on hand comprises 686 hds. Maryland, 150 do. Kentucky, 15 do. stems, 12,749 pkgs. Java, 2382 do. Brazil, and 32 cs. seed-leaf.

SALES OF OWEN COUNTY TOBACCO.

Sales of Owen county cutting leaf have been made recently at \$49.50 a \$51 per 100 lbs. This tobacco was grown by Mr. John W. Thomas, of "Sweet Owen," the same gentleman who took the first premium on cutting leaf at the late fair. That premium tobacco, it will be recollected, sold for the extraordinary price of \$100 per 100 lbs. The Louisville Journal says that Mr. Thomas is conceded by all to be one of the best tobacco planters in Kentucky.

SOUTHERN NEWS.

Recent letters from Virginia state that, since the opening of the James River and Kanawha Canal, a considerable quantity of tobacco in hogheads has been shipped from Lynchburg to Richmond. The farmers are bringing it in from the country to the various boat landings in small lots for shipment.

Very little is offering in the warehouses at Lynchburg. Some few hogheads common leaf sold recently at from \$7.50 to \$10. One lot loose lugs brought \$8.30.

Considerable tobacco is still held by the farmers away from the lines of transportation, which will not be got to market for some time yet. The latest reports from North Carolina represent that there is a good deal of tobacco in that State awaiting the means of transportation. Agents have been sent North to devise means of getting it to market, and if possible to effect a sale of it.

Another correspondent says there will not be tobacco enough cultivated in Virginia this year to supply the wants of her own people. Men in the tobacco-growing countries who raised two and three hundred hogheads in years gone by, will not raise so many pounds this year. In consequence of this prospect many holders are unwilling to part with their supplies at the prices now ruling. Most of them will not sell before next winter or spring, being satisfied that a large advance upon the present price will then be obtained, because of the great scarcity of that article which is certain to follow the derangement of the southern labor system.

Other statements, however, represent the negroes as falling into the new order of things, and working much more regularly than was anticipated. Many planters are inclined to take a very gloomy view of the future, and consider the tobacco culture as forever ruined. Here is a specimen of their speculation:

"It is supposed that the production of tobacco in Virginia for the future will be limited to the requirements of her own people. The cultivation of that article successfully required the constant attention, employment, of a certain number of hands to the acre, the whole year round. Women and children were just as useful in its culture as men, but as the cutting season advanced, planters were often compelled to withdraw their entire force from other employments and put it to cutting, so as to save the crop from the blighting influence of the early winter frosts. They had often to work even in the night time in order to save the crop from ruin. To raise tobacco a man must have his own labor at command to meet emergencies of this sort, and a delay of two or three days would involve the loss of the whole crop; and in that state of things no time is afforded to go about and collect together a sufficient number of hands to save the tobacco. A planter could not, of course, hold in reserve a sufficient force to meet an emergency of this character."

When the new labor system becomes well organized, the groundlessness of these apprehensions will be apparent.

The celebrated Dr. Parr is the greatest modern example of an excessive smoker. He smoked continually, in season and out of it, even in company of ladies, and in their drawing-rooms; he insisted on the indulgence wherever he went, and generally picked out some young lady to light his pipe after dinner. He sometimes smoked twenty pipes in an evening, and he never wrote well without tobacco; he describes himself as composing his works "and rolling volcanic fumes of tobacco to the ceiling." Dr. Richardson, in his *Recollections of the last Half-Century*, tells us that Dr. Parr, at the dinner given at Trinity College to the Duke of Gloucester as Chancellor of the University of Cambridge, upon the removal of the cloth, indulged in his eternal pipe, "blowing a cloud into the faces of his neighbors, much to their annoyance, and causing royalty to sneeze by the stimulating stench of mundungus." This is certainly no example for a decent smoker to follow; but as Parr lived to the ripe age of seventy-eight, it is a pretty good proof that the immoderate use of tobacco is not very fatal.

Another and greater philosopher, Thomas Hobbs, of Malmesbury, smoked to excess, and he lived to the age of ninety-two. Aubrey tells us that he always took a pipe of tobacco after dinner as a digestive, a custom held to be of "rare and singular virtue" in his day. Sir Isaac Newton was also a great smoker, and as if to show the fallacy of many objections to tobacco—one being that it injures the teeth—though he lived to a good old age, he lost but one tooth.

Of royal symposiums where the weed was largely indulged in, perhaps the most remarkable was that of the first Frederick of Prussia, whose "Tabaks Collegium" was the cabinet council of the country. It is vividly described by Carlyle, who stylishly remarks, in contrasting it with our Parliament, "the substitution of tobacco smoke for parliamentary eloquence, is by some held to be a great improvement."

Of literary men, Goethe hated tobacco, a very extraordinary thing for a German to do. Heinrich Heine had the same dislike. Of French litterateurs Balzac, Victor Hugo, and Dumas, did not smoke; but the smokers are Alfred de Musset, Eugene Sue, Merimee, Paul de St. Victor, and Madame Dudevant, better known by her sobriquet George Sand, who often indulges in a cigar between the intervals of literary labor; as the ladies of Spain and Mexico delight in doing at all other intervals.

Charles Lamb, "the gentle Eliu," was once a great smoker. In a letter to Wordsworth he says: "Tobacco has been my evening comfort and my morning curse for these five years. I have had it in my head to write this poem for these two years (*Forewell to Tobacco*); but tobacco stood in its own light, when it gave me headaches that prevented my singing its praises." Lamb once, in the height of his smoking days, was puffing coarsest weed from a long clay pipe in company with Parr, who was careful in obtaining finer sorts, and the Doctor in astonishment asked him how he acquired this "prodigious power!" Lamb answered, "by toiling after it, as some men toil after virtue." Of other literary smokers in England we may note Sir Walter Scott, who at one time carried the habit very far. So did the poet Bloomfield. Campbell, Moore, and Byron delighted in its temperate enjoyment, as does the present Laureate Tennyson, who has echoed its praises with Byron in immortal verse.

Robert Hall, when at Cambridge, acquired the habit of smoking from being in Parr's company; and being asked why he had commenced, answered: "I am qualifying myself for the society of a Doctor of Divinity, and this (holding up the pipe) is the test of my admission." When presented with Clarke's pamphlet on *The Use and Abuse of Smoking*, he said, "I can't refute his arguments, and I can't give up smoking."

The "learned in the law" as well as the dignitaries of the Church have smoked. Lords Eldon and Stowell, and Lord Brougham in early life, indulged thus. The late Duke of Sussex and the Duke of Devonshire gave it aristocratic sanction, and George IV. royally patronized it.

* This elegant little poem is so well known to require us to do more than allude to it. It is remarkable for its veneration as well as its praise. The former is insincere; but it is difficult to doubt the sincerity of such words as:

"For thy sake, tobacco, I
Would do anything but die."

+ Tobacco does not induce headache; but beer, spirits, and wine will. Lamb records that he drank freely.
