## 13 ASSISTANT PROFS

Allen Announces  
New Staff Members

The appointment of 13 new assistant professors to the staff of the University of South Florida was announced yesterday by USF President John S. Allen. The new faculty members, who will join the staff Sept. 1, are: Dr. John B. Adams, sociology; Dr. Donald G. Ander-

son, marketing; Bernard A. Fusaro, mathematics; Dr. Sheldon N. Grebstein, English; Dr. Ralph T. Helmer, mathematics; Dr. Theodore B. Hoffman, humanities; Donovan R. Lichtenberg, education; Dr. David H. Long, psychology; Samuel D. Miller, education; Elmo E. Moretz, education; Dr. Richard E. Pasternak, economics; Dr. Charles F. Reasoner, education; and Dr. Robert D. Whitaker, chemistry.

## Formerly of Tampa U.

DR. ADAMS, former faculty member at the University of Tampa, comes to USF from Shimer College, Mount Carroll, Ill. From 1955 to 1961 he was on the faculty of Queen Aliyah College, Baghdad, Iraq, and The American University of Beirut, Lebanon. He received his Ph.D. degree from the University of Chicago.

DR. ANDERSON completed work on his doctorate in marketing, economics and geography at the University of Iowa last month. He comes to USF from the University of North Dakota, where he was assistant professor.

Fusaro received his master's degree from Columbia University and expects to receive his doctorate this summer from the University of Michigan. He comes here from the staff of the University of Oklahoma, where he was assistant professor of mathematics.

DR. GREBSTEIN has been on the faculty of the University of Kentucky since 1953. He received his Ph.D. degree in English and American literature from Michigan State University.

DR. HELMER, who received his doctorate from Pennsylvania State University this year, also received his master's degree from that university and has been a research assistant there since 1960. He was formerly associate professor of mathematics at Lock Haven State College, Pa.

DR. HOFFMAN comes to USF from San Benito College, Hollister, Calif., where he was chairman of the music department. He received his Ph.D. degree in arts and philosophy from College of the Pacific.

DR. LICHTENBERG comes here from a post at the University of Wisconsin, where he received his master's degree in 1958. He expects to receive his doctorate this year.

DR. LONG was an instructor at the University of Denver from 1960 to 1962 and served as assistant research director at the Federal Correctional Institution at Englewood, Colo. He received his Ph.D. degree in 1961 from the University of Denver.

MILLER expects to receive his doctorate from the University of Michigan this summer. He received his master's degree in music from the University of Michigan and has been a teach-

## Stock Exchange Head Calls For Tax Cut

WASHINGTON, July 23 (UPI)—Keith Funston, president of the New York Stock Exchange, has joined in the call for an income tax cut. He said it would restore business confidence and provide investment funds.

But Funston said yesterday that it would be unwise to consider any kind of tax cut unless Congress and the administration first give some evidence that steps will be taken to cut the rate of federal spending.

The stock market president urged sharp reduction in corporate and high-income tax brackets. He said low-income taxpayers also would have to be included "to convince the electorate you are being fair to them."

President Kennedy is expected to decide within the next month whether to ask Congress for an income tax cut this year in an effort to infuse new vigor into the economy.

Sentiment in Congress is divided on whether taxes should be cut now. The House Ways and Means Committee has been quietly lining up witnesses to testify on the issue and may start hearings this week.

Funston, in a radio-television interview with Sen. Kenneth B. Keating, R-N.Y., proposed that the corporate tax rate be cut from 52 to 47 per cent to relieve what he called a squeeze on business profits.

## Group Charges Munich Police With Brutality

MUNICH, Germany, July 23 (UPI)—The Local Committee for the Protection of Civil Rights said yesterday it has filed 13 suits against city officials in connection with riots in which American television star James Garner and others allegedly were mistreated by police.

The actions charge that several persons were beaten or insulted by police sent to disperse crowds listening to street singers in the artists' quarter of Schwabing earlier this month. Garner and two U.S. embassy employees previously charged the Munich police with acting in a brutal manner. They were not involved in the suits filed by the committee.

# New County Dump Angers Nearby Residents

Residents in the vicinity of the new county dumping site at Morris Bridge Road and Fowler Avenue weren't very happy today at the prospect of living close to a dump.

Most of them said they did not know the abandoned State Road Department borrow pit was to be used as a dumping site until they read about it in the newspapers last week.

Dan Getman of the mosquito control division said plans are

to begin dumping trash and garbage there this week. Mosquito control crews are erecting a fence around the site.

He said the dump will be used by Temple Terrace and several franchised garbage collectors from Zephyrhills to Tampa.

Commenting on reports that county health department sanitation officers had been invited to look over some possible sites for Temple Terrace to use for dumping within its corporate limits near the Hillsborough River, Gorman said he felt certain the County Health Department would not approve dumping along the riverside swamps, if the city of Tampa complains of it. The river is Tampa's water source.

City Manager Frank B. Moses said possibilities are being investigated into the feasibility of Temple Terrace handling its own dumping on low areas not far from the river along River Hills Drive. Sanitation officers from the health department have been asked out to study the area and give an opinion the city manager can relay to the Temple Terrace Planning and Zoning Commission and the City Council.

The sanitary land fill problem is on the agenda of the planning and zoning commission next Tuesday, and the situation is expected to be brought before the council Aug. 7.

The possibility of using an area across the Hillsborough River on Florida Christian College property has met with approval of college authorities, but County Health Department officers frowned on including garbage for such a fill, because the seepage might pollute Tampa's water source, Moses said.

Moses said he is suggesting

"Whatever they do, they are going to do regardless of our complaints," she said.

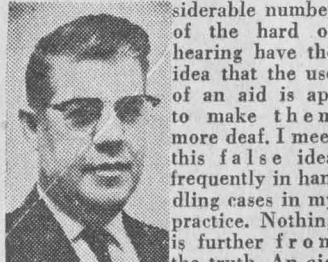

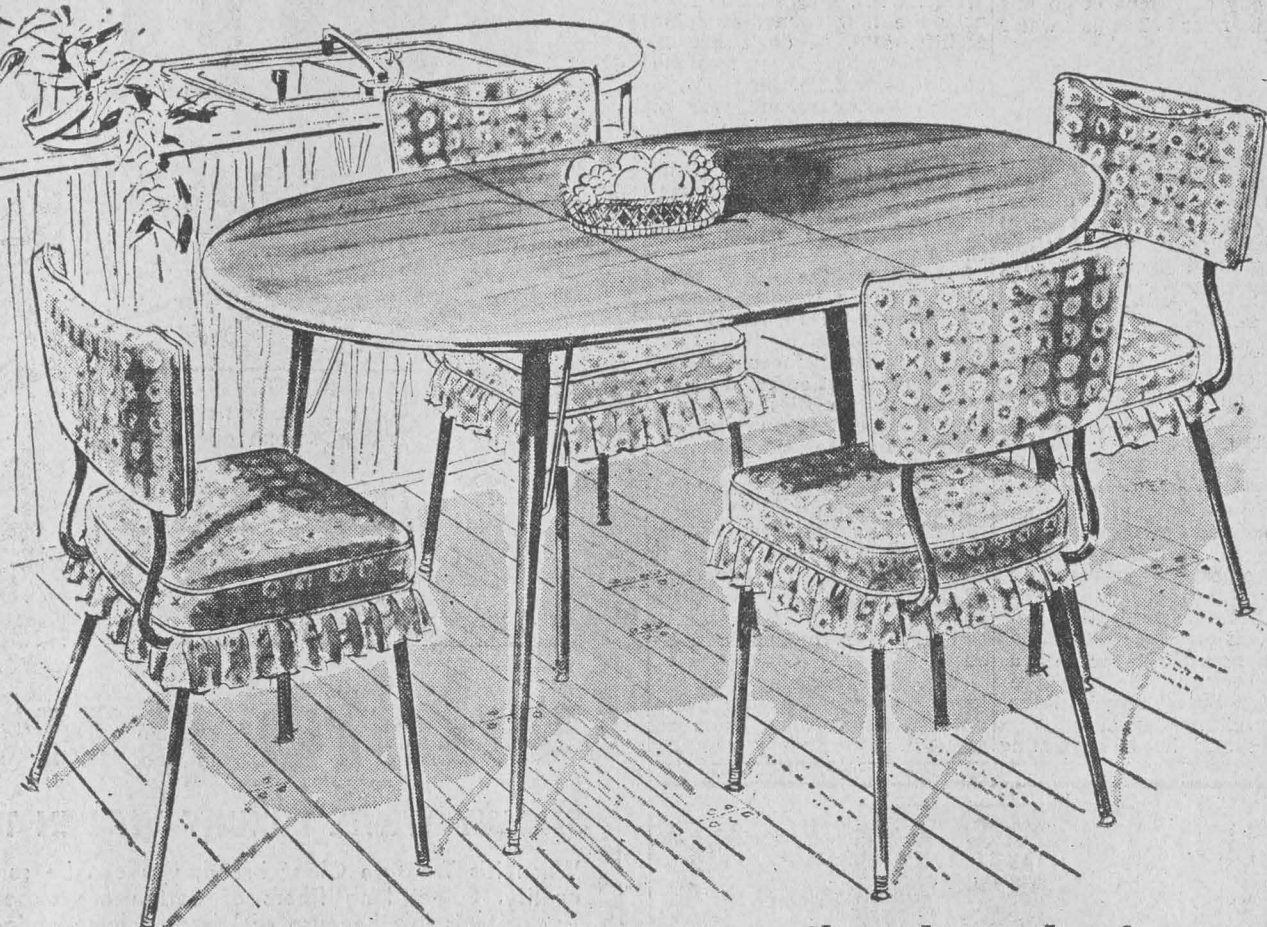

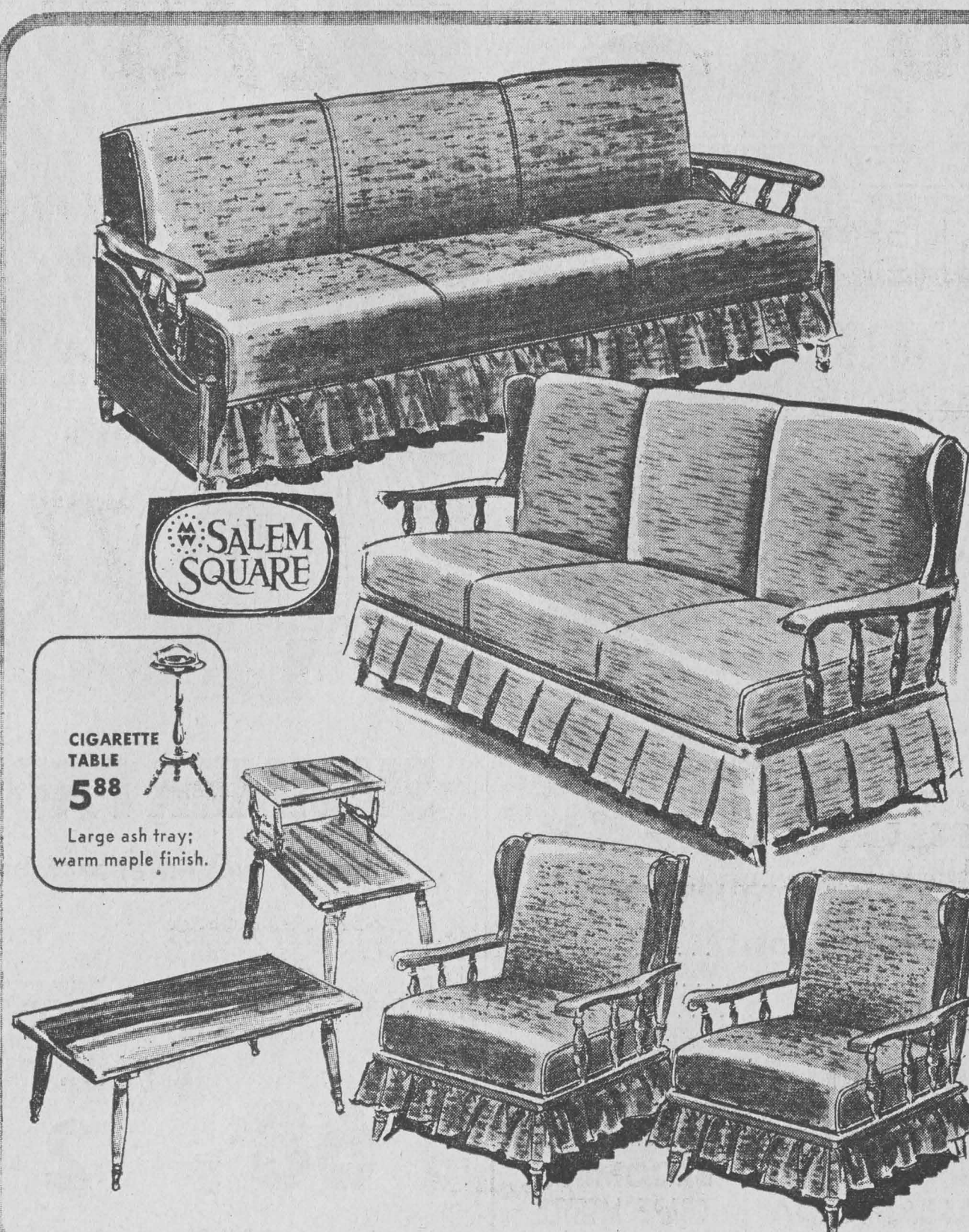
