1. The St. Petersburg campus now has its very own listserv. This listserv can be used to post any messages regarding upcoming events, news, etc. on this campus, or related community activities. To those of you who wish to subscribe to the list, send an e-mail message to [listserv@cfrvm.cfr](mailto:listserv@cfrvm.cfr), leave the subject field blank, and place the following line in the body:

Subscribe pete-l "YOUR FIRST NAME" "YOUR LAST NAME"

This listserv will replace the "everybody" alias effective immediately. Additionally, a list of all listservs available at USF is enclosed with this message.

2. Most of the commonly-used unix/internet commands have on-line help files available. To see what is available, simply type "info" at the bayflash% prompt. There is info on:

address      downloading      languages      pine  
archie      gopher      networks      unix

use "info <filename>" for specific info. For example, for information on basic unix commands, type "info unix". Additionally, there is more information about Unix and the internet on Steve's home page (<http://bayflash.stpt.usf.edu/~johnson/>)

WebCrawler <http://www.biotech.washington.edu/WebCrawler/WebQuery.html>  
The Crawler helps find Web sites by subject.
