## USF Mascot To Be Chosen In Contest

University of South Florida students may be known as the "fighting desert rats," come October, when the mascot contest will have been completed.

Plans for the contest were formulated by the University Center Program Council, who were asked by the Student Association to take the project in hand.

An abortive attempt at choosing a mascot occurred during the fall semester of 1960. At that time many suggestions were made (such as desert rats and camels) but since these came at a time when the USF physical environment was rather uncultivated, they were termed student satire and shelved.

Present concern over the choosing of a mascot came as a direct result of the designing of senior class rings. One side of the ring now appears a blank, for this is the place reserved for the long awaited mascot.

The University Center Committee in charge of the mascot contest has formulated some tentative rules. Chairman Don Gordon released these suggestions:

1. Since the university is an integral part of the state of Florida, entries may be submitted by any resident of the state.

2. Any member of the Student Association Executive Committee or any members of other committees which have worked in the contest are excluded.

3. Submitted suggestions must have an explanation in 40 words or less as to why the name would be appropriate.

4. All names must be mailed to the University Center Program Council c/o the University Center.

5. In case of two or more submissions of the same mascot the earliest postmark will determine the winner.

The contest will open Sept. 10, 1962, with suggestions accepted until midnight, Sept. 23. On Sept. 25, the SA Executive Council will select 15 semi-finalists to be voted on the next day by the Student Association, the faculty, and the university staff.

Two days after the first voting, Sept. 28, voters will choose the USF mascot from among the five highest ranking finalists.

University Center personnel expect the contest scope to include the entire state. Many entries are expected from persons not connected with the university.

Prizes for the five finalists are being collected at the present time. Although the list is not yet complete, two of the finest yet offered are an expensive typewriter and a trip to Nassau.

Persons entering the contest should keep in mind that the mascot chosen will be the one most representative of the university, its immediate area, and the attitude of its inhabitants.
