Introduction and Provenance

In the fall of 1992, Mary E. Allcorn-Grigsby, Director of the Nelson Poynter Memorial Library, negotiated a gift of underground newspapers and alternative press publications from the University of Missouri, Columbia. This collection occupies 36 archival storage boxes comprising approximately 45 cubic feet and includes 2,712 single issues, with some duplicate copies, representing over 70 titles. All issues fall within the inclusive dates from 1965 to 1978, with the bulk of the material representing the period from 1968 to 1972.

Restrictions/Preservation Note

The acidic paper often used on printing presses has promoted the rapid physical deterioration found in many titles of this collection. To prevent further damage to the underground papers, refrain from placing any additional stress on the paper fibers by folding or creasing newspapers, or by exposing them to light for an extended period of time. Please report any tears or other damage so library staff may take appropriate preservation or conservation measures. While no restrictions limit access to the underground newspapers, library staff will evaluate photocopying requests on an individual basis to ensure the long-term preservation of this unique collection.

Scope and Contents

The titles represented in the USF St. Petersburg Underground Newspaper Collection offer a broad editorial and geographical diversity. Numerous papers, such as the *SDS New Left Notes* and *The Movement*, document the New Left and student radicalism from a national perspective. Local and regional papers, including *The Drummer*, *The Great Speckled Bird*, and *The DC Gazette*, allow researchers to understand movements in various cities and communities, while Vancouver's *Georgia Straight* and London's *Peace Notes* provide a view of the political Left from outside of the United States. *The Black Liberator*, *The Black Panther*, and *Muhammad Speaks* record the evolution of Afro-American nationalism and the growing chasm between white and black student leaders. *The Ally* and *The Bond* bring the anti-war movement to military personnel. Incredible visual and graphic images appear in many titles and on many covers, including *The Seed*. Newspapers are arranged chronologically within title, and alphabetically by title.

Additional Sources of Information

Any researcher interested in the underground press should also examine the issues preserved on microfilm by the Bell and Howell Micro Photo Division. The Tampa Campus Library maintains a copy of the 423-reel *Underground Newspaper Microfilm Collection* (Film N 16; guide: Z 6951. U5) on the second floor. As part of the Yazell's Pinellas ACLU Collection, the Special Collections Department of the Nelson Poynter Memorial Library has retained archival copies of *Come Unity*, a local alternative publication based in St. Petersburg. Bibliographies and directories include: *Alternative Press Index* (Northfield, MN: Radical Research Center), William D. Lutz's compilation of the *Underground Press Directory* and an earlier index known as the *Underground Press Guide*, and a resource printed by the American Library Association's Social Responsibilities Round Table with the title *Alternatives in Print: An International Catalog of Books, Pamphlets, Periodicals, and Audiovisual Materials*. In addition, consult a collaborative effort by James P. Danky and Elliott Shore entitled *Alternative Materials in Libraries* (Metuchen: Scarecrow, 1982), which built upon Danky's earlier *Undergrounds: A Union List of Alternative Periodicals in Libraries of the United States and Canada* (Madison: State Historical Society of Wisconsin, 1974). Other libraries have created finding aids to assist patrons using their unique collections. For examples of these directories, see: the *Underground Newspaper Collection, UM Libraries* guide designed by Mary Allcorn-Grigsby and Alan Kimbel (Columbia: University of Missouri, 1989), and *Alternatives: A Guide to the Newspapers, Magazines, and Newsletters in the Alternative Press Collection in the Special Collections Department of the University of Connecticut Library* (2d ed., University of Connecticut, 1976).

Scholarship has produced a variety of valuable monographs. Some authors have masterfully integrated sources from underground newspaper into their works. W. J. Rorabaugh's *Berkeley at War: The 1960s* (New York: Oxford University, 1989) and Todd Gitlin's *The Sixties: Years of Hope, Days of Rage* (New York: Bantam, 1989) offer excellent examples. In addition, consult Gitlin's *The Whole World is Watching: Mass Media in the Making and Unmaking of the New Left* (Berkeley: University of California, 1980), and Abe Peck's *Uncovering the Sixties: The Life and Times of the Underground Press* (New York: Citadel Press, 1991). Numerous contemporary accounts offer both a primary and a secondary perspective. For example, see: Robert J. Glessing's *The Underground Press in America* (Bloomington: Indiana University Press, 1970), and Laurence Leamer's *The Paper Revolutionaries: The Rise of the Underground Press* (New York: Simon and Schuster, 1972). Collective works include: Jerry Hopkins's compilation entitled *The Hippie Papers: Notes from the Underground Press* (New York: New American Library, 1968), and *Fire! Reports from the Underground Press, Put Together by Paul, Jon, and Charlotte* (New York: E. P. Dutton, 1970).

Students and scholars in many academic disciplines integrate underground newspapers into their research. Histories of individual titles have evolved. For two examples, see: Arthur Seeger's *The Berkeley Barb: Social Control of an Underground Newspaper* (New York: Irvington, 1983) and William G. Fudge's "A Descriptive Readership Study of the Atlanta Underground Newspaper: *The Great Speckled Bird*" (Unpublished Ph.D. dissertation, Florida State University, 1975). David Armstrong's *A Trumpet to Arms: Alternative Media in America* (Boston: Houghton Mifflin, 1981) provides a broader account of the relationship between mass media and popular culture.

General studies have documented the growing rift between liberalism and radicalism. A few examples include: Allen J. Matusow's *The Unraveling of America: A History of Liberalism in the 1960s* (New York: Harper and Row, 1984), James Miller's "Democracy is in the Streets:" *From Port Huron to the Siege of Chicago* (New York: Simon and Schuster, 1987), Wini Breines's *Community and Organization in the New Left, 1962 - 1968: The Great Refusal* (New Brunswick: Rutgers University, 1989), and *The Sixties Papers: Documents of a Rebellious Decade*, edited by Judith and Stewart Albert (New York: Praeger, 1984).

The Berkeley Tribe gave photocopies of this document to the Black Panther Party on Wednesday morning, in the interest of their survival. The document details a heavy-armed attack against the Black Panther national headquarters by members of the Berkeley Police Department. It was brought to the Tribe a few hours after it left the Berkeley police headquarters, where it had left the hand of a raking Berkeley police officer during a careless moment. 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
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
