COE Grads Perform Well on State Tests



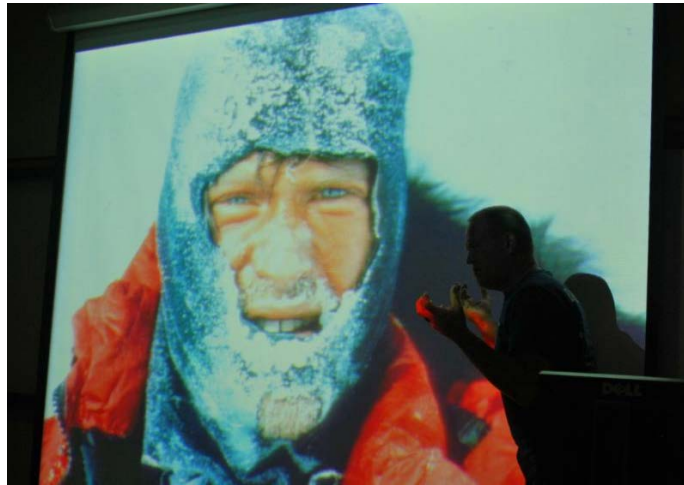

Graduates of the USFSP **College of Education** are performing consistently well on the State of Florida's General Knowledge Test and the Florida Teacher Certificate Examination. That, according to assessment results just released for the years 2011-2014. Results show that USFSP teacher certification candidates are performing at or above the state average in all of four subtests: English Language Skills, Mathematics, Reading and Essay.

"The performance results reinforce the College's efforts to prepare the very best teachers possible," said Bill Heller, dean of the College of Education. "These teachers can and will make a difference with every child."

USFSP candidate performance has increased steadily, with the highest scores recorded during 2013 and 2014. "The outstanding performance of the COE students on the state certification tests reflects the excellence of the COE students, and the COE faculty and staff, said Dr. Han Reichgelt, regional vice chancellor of Academic Affairs. "They all deserve our congratulations."

Blue Ocean and USFSP Welcome Sir Swan

As part of the Blue Ocean Film Festival, Sir Robert Swan presented to a class of USFSP Geography students. Swan was the first man in history to walk 900 miles to the South Pole and 700 miles to the North Pole -- and today, is one of the world's leading advocates for the preservation of Antarctica.

"Climate change is definite. Science has told us this," said Swan. "Most people insure their cars, their homes. We need to insure our planet."

"Sir Robert Swan's 'chat' with Dr. Meindl's class was perhaps the most inspiring 45 minutes of my life," said Dr. Frank Biafora, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences. "His stories of leadership and courage and of surviving the elements on two polar expeditions left the audience breathless and in awe, with each of us to ponder what we are doing in our own lives to make a positive difference in the world."

Sea Level Rise a Topic for Maldives President, Mayor

Also as part of Blue Ocean, the university welcomed the former president of the Maldives, Mohamed Nasheed. Nasheed was on hand for a screening of documentary, "The Island President," which details why the Republic of the Maldives - which includes 1,200 coral islands and 400 miles of coastline - is in critical danger because of rising sea levels. The low-lying islands are on the front lines of sea level rise and facing possible devastation, the likes of which other nations could face in the future.

"Our students were active in helping to organize this event and responded in large numbers," said Dr. Dona Stewart, assistant visiting professor in the Department of Environmental Science, Policy and Geography. "SEAS, the Student Environmental Awareness Society, has been a terrific resource."

Stewart went on to note that USFSP, as a member of a coastal community, must play a role in helping develop resilience to the effects of climate change. "President Nasheed's visit was especially timely as our community works to
