Smoak to Travel to China on Fulbright

USFSP **Professor Donny Smoak** has been awarded a Fulbright Specialist grant in Environmental Science at China's Shenyang Agricultural University. Smoak will head to China for three weeks in June to lecture and participate in a series of seminars on climate change and coastal wetlands.

"I welcome the opportunity to return to China. There are great scientists there and interesting places to work," said Smoak. "In 2005, I did a Fulbright in Brazil and have since returned many times to work on projects with my colleagues there."

Smoak says he hopes this visit will foster additional exchanges with Shenyang University, and that the development of an academic focus in this area could lead to our students seeking advanced training in China.

"Fulbright assignments, one of the highest honors in higher education, underscore the excellence of the faculty at USFSP," said Han Reichgelt, regional vice chancellor of Academic Affairs. "Dr. Smoak's newest award reflects his dedication as a professor and researcher, and the significance of his contributions to the field."

ESP&G Student Wins Statewide Poster Competition

USFSP's Joseph Terrano took First Prize in the statewide poster competition at the annual meeting of the Florida Society of Geographers. An **Environmental Science, Policy & Geography** (ESP&G) senior, Terrano's project seeks to determine the vulnerability of local power plants to storm surge and the potential hazards to nearby populations. Terrano mapped storm surge data using GIS (Geographic Information System) and remote sensing techniques to edge out competitors from Florida State and Florida International, among others.

"Joseph's win demonstrates the strength of our program and the unique opportunities our undergraduates have to get involved in research," said Dona Stewart, ESP&G visiting assistant professor. "We're really proud of this work."

Dr. Stewart was recently elected to the Board of the Florida Geographical Society and serves with Dr. Barnali Dixon, Board treasurer, and ESP&G department chair and founder of the Geo-Spatial Analytics Lab at USFSP.

"Mr. Terrano's first place success at this statewide Geography conference is one further example of the high caliber of research and scholarly work being conducted by our faculty in ESP&G," said Frank Biafora, dean of the College of Arts and Sciences.

Joey Vars Speaks on Mars (Really)

Space enthusiast and USFSP senior Joey Vars was a guest speaker at St. Petersburg's SciCafe this week, sponsored by the Dali Museum. Vars spoke on one of his favorite topics: "Location, Location, Location: Space Is the Place!" Specifically, Vars addressed the Mars One space mission and the possibility of colonizing the planet.

"We're still figuring out how human beings will fare on a planet with no magnetic field to protect them from the elements," said Vars, who is a regular at the Kennedy Space Center. "This would be like an eternal camping trip. And it's unclear how the atmosphere would affect us longterm, whether we'd be able to procreate and sustain a colony."

Vars, a History major, graduates this year and is considering several options for continuing his education of space, including Embry-Riddle Aeronautical University and the Air Force. He recently completed a NASA internship.
