Summary Statement – Academic Program Performance in Fall 2015- Spring 2016

Provide a summary statement about academic program performance over the previous year including high points and low points

The ISS program continues to be a very popular degree program (6th largest on campus, including all colleges). With a very small number of faculty, we continue to provide an academic program of high quality for our students. We are proud of the intellectual performance of the majority of students in the program, as witnessed by the research papers being produced by our students in the senior seminar. Our efforts to increase student preparedness for the rigors of the senior seminar by paying more attention to analytical thinking, academic writing, development of argument, and oral presentation in the gateway course, ISS 3010, is beginning to pay off.

We have continued to work with advising to ensure that the reputation of ISS is as a rigorous, analytical degree, not as a degree of “last resort” for students who have been unsuccessful elsewhere. As Program Coordinator, I have encouraged our majors to meet with me to discuss their choice of concentration areas, their coursework, and their career goals to ensure that each student is making the most of the opportunities ISS affords.

We had record numbers of students enrolled in both ISS 3010 and ISS 4935 this year. In addition, we have started to see students coming to USFSP specifically to enroll in the ISS degree program as our reputation for both rigor and flexibility, and our student-centered approach to teaching and mentoring, increases.

Summary Statement – Impact of Changes Made in Fall 2015- Spring 2016

In 2015-2016, we completed our external review. The review was very positive, while also noting the lack of resources and faculty with which ISS operates. One suggestion that impacts our ALC and program assessment was to utilize a wider range of courses in our yearly assessment. With the arrival of a new faculty member, Dr. Byron Miller in summer 2016, we will be able to add an additional course to our assessment toolbox: ISS 3300 Social Research Methods, which Dr. Miller will teach every spring. Since all ISS majors will now take this methods course, we will be able to use it to track their progress in a more consistent and thorough manner.

In addition, curriculum revisions were approved last year to require that all ISS majors take either ISS 1102 Self and Society OR ISS 1103 Nature and Culture at the beginning of their degree. This addition to our core requirements also broadens our interaction with our own majors and gives us yet another tool for assessment. In 2016-2017, we will be integrating these two new courses into the assessments for our ALC.

External Reviewers also suggested that we increase the target achievements for some, if not all, of our assessments. This will be taken into consideration in the coming year as we rework our ALCs in accordance with our new curriculum and in consultation with our new faculty member, Dr. Byron Miller.

USF St. Petersburg’s Interdisciplinary Social Science (ISS) program is intended to provide students a broad grounding in the social sciences while creating opportunities to explore selected disciplines in more depth. Rather than being a very general, catch-all degree, ISS at USFSP is a focused program in which students work with their advisors to create a unique course of study of specific societal issues and to prepare for specific career paths. The structure of the ISS degree allows a student to pick courses in two disciplinary areas which bring different perspectives or methodological and theoretical approaches to a topic or social problem. The program is research and writing intensive.
