Commentary on the 1977 Annual Report

A record 444 species and hybrids were reported banded by W.B.B.A. members and cooperatives in 1977. This total represents an 11% increase over the previous ten-year average and includes the first reports of banded Eurasian Green-winged Teal (311), Aleutian Terns (85), Thick-billed Murres (193), and Sharp-tailed Sparrows (1) in the

W.B.B.A. area. Also contributing to the increase are 19 species from the Hawaii-Pacific area and 7 hybrid forms: Mallard X Black Duck—3; Widgeon hybrid—1; Glaucous-winged X Herring Gull—22; Myrtle X Audubon's Warbler—4; Indigo X Lazuli Bunting—1; Oregon X Slate-colored Junco—9; Slate-colored X White-winged Junco—1.

In contrast, the overall total of 147,739 individuals banded fell 22% below the previous ten-year average, perhaps reflecting a reduction in birds banded in the Hawaii-Pacific Island area as Speich (1977, NABB 2:143) suggested. However, other trends are becoming apparent and may also account for the lower total. Banding activity seems to be shifting northward, as exemplified by an overall 40% reduction in individuals banded in California, Nevada, Utah, Oregon, and Washington and a 125% increase in those recorded from Alaska and western Canada, when compared to the previous ten year average.

From the 460 forms sent out, requesting banding summaries, 330 responses were received. Seventy individuals and stations indicated inactivity during the year, while 223 master permittees and 37 sub-permittees submitted summaries. The total of 260 active reports reflects a gradual increase in recent years, though fewer birds (564) and fewer species per bander (12.1) were indicated.

Point Reyes Bird Observatory reported the largest number of species (108, Farallon Islands and 98, mainland), followed by Edgar Jones, Edmonton (83), and Charles Chase of Colorado Fish and Wildlife (74). Douglas Benning banded the largest number of individuals (9,923), topping Point Reyes (Farallons and mainland, 8,737) and Calvin Lensink, Anchorage (8,341). Again in 1977 there were over 100 summaries reporting less than 100 birds banded per bander.

The ducks and geese continue to be the most prominently banded group, representing 41% of the total. Included are 24,926 Mallards, 11,518 Pintails, and 10,057 Canada Geese. In addition, large numbers of shorebirds, gulls, pigeons, and doves were banded and, as in previous years, this has been largely due to the efforts of various state and federal agencies. Noteworthy totals are 1,566 Dunlin, 1,737 Western Sandpipers, 2,236 Glaucous-winged Gulls, 2,030 Western Gulls, and 4,031 Band-tailed Pigeons. Overall, 28 species were reported for which over 1,000 individuals were banded. Twelve of these 28 species were passerines, which—when totaled—made up 33% overall.

For almost two-thirds (64%) of the 444 species, one bander or agency accounted for at least one-half of all birds banded. This figure, coupled with a decrease in birds and species reported per individual, reflects a continuation of a trend toward directed banding studies noted in last year's Annual Report (Speich, 1977). This has been shown to be a profitable form of banding, resulting in useful data and various papers in NABB, as well as several other journals.

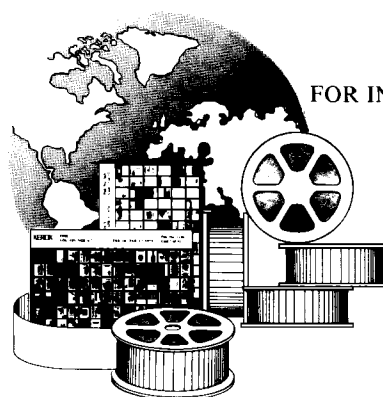

American Wigeon. 716-39904. Banded as AHY-M at Benton Lake NWR, Black Eagle, MT on 10 September 1968. Shot at Mecca, CA in May 1977. At least 10 years old.

Gray Hawk. 816-13235. Banded as L-U by R.L. Glinski at Amado, AZ on 27 June 1976. Shot at Navolato, Sinaloa, Mexico on 21 December 1976.

Golden Eagle. 599-05509. Banded as L-U by Joseph R. Murphy, 16 km southwest of Lakeside, UT on 10 June 1973. Caught injured 22 km northwest of Temecula, CA in fall of 1975.

Osprey. 608-14832. Banded as L-U by Daniel W. Anderson near Kino Bay, Sonora, Mexico on 17 April 1972. Found dead at Manhattan Beach, CA on 9 November 1975.

Prairie Falcon. 987-21928. Banded as L-F by Michael N. Kochert, 13 km east of Murphy, ID on 31 May 1976. Found dead at Chandler, AZ on 17 January 1978. Died from ruptured heart. First AZ recovery of this population.

Mountain Plover. 702-83259. Banded as L-U by Roger L. Boyd, 13 km north of Nunn, CO on 20 June 1975. Band number read with spotting scope 1 km from banding site on 14 July 1977. Female with 2 chicks.

Dunlin. 721-50137. Banded as AHY-U at Bolinas Lagoon, CA on 27 October 1968. Netted by Robert Gill at Nelson Lagoon, AK on 7 October 1977. Male, 10 plus years old.

Dunlin. 721-50187. Banded as AHY-U at Inverness, CA on 30 March 1969. Netted by Robert Gill at Nelson Lagoon, AK on 30 August 1977. At least 9 years old.

Forster's Tern. 1113-88915. Banded as L-U by L. Richard Mewaldt at San Francisco Bay, CA on 11 June 1973. Found dead at Ocean Beach, CA on 4 January 1977.

Caspian Tern. 645-38668. Banded as HY-U by L. Richard Mewaldt at San Jose, CA on 22 May 1971. Collected as scientific specimen at Whitcomb Island, WA on 3 June 1976. 6 years old.

Band-tailed Pigeon. 635-44555. Banded as AHY-M by Arizona Game and Fish Dept. at Lakeside, AZ on 18 July 1967. Shot 24 km south of Whiteriver, AZ on 2 October 1976. 10 plus years old.

Barn Owl. 816-00598. Banded as U-M by Peter H. Bloom and Richard Jackson at Camp Pendleton, CA on 23 December 1972. Found dead at same location on 26 August 1977. At least 5 years old; 1 previous return.

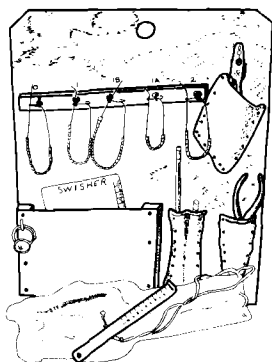

McCamey Chickadee Trap: \$9.00 F.O.B. Eugene.

This trap is precision made and is designed to take birds the size of jays, grosbeaks, and cardinals. It is illustrated in EBBA Workshop Manual #5, 1975, p. 22.

It is sensitive to birds the size of chickadees and a 5 gram weight will trip the door. The main features are the sensitive treadle, a door lock for feeding when not activated, and a large handle for a gloved hand in winter. The back is fastened on with clips for easier access in case the treadle gets worked over by a squirrel.

Hundreds of these traps have been sold to nature schools, universities, and individuals in the States and Canada over the past ten years.
