

## **WUSF(FM) Rated Tops in South for Listenership**

WUSF(FM) 39.7 is the number one National Public Radio station in the South and ranks 19th among 173 stations nationally, according to a recently released survey of the American Research Bureau.

The ranking, based on total listening audience, placed WUSF(FM) ahead of NPR stations in Dallas

which ranked 22nd; Atlanta, 37th; New Orleans, 61st; Jacksonville, 90th and Miami, 72nd.

WUSF(FM) reached a weekly total listening audience of 41,700 persons during the survey conducted in April and May of 1975 as compared with 38,000 persons during the same period in 1974.

## **Criser: 'Inform Public That Doors May Be Closed'**

BOR Chairman Marshall Criser read a statement for the Board at its Oct. 17 meeting, endorsing the "Report to the People" Program, which is kicked off in Tampa on Nov. 17.

Criser said: "In the history of every organization and institution, there comes a time when that organization or institution reaches a crossroads and begins a search for new direction. Florida has now reached such a crossroad in higher education.

"The State University System and the State Community College System from their beginning have maintained an open door policy. Any student with the ability and the desire has been able to gain entry into the system and to progress as far as their ability and desire would take them.

"Enrollments in our state universities have continued to climb significantly, while state financial support has actually declined in terms of constant dollars. Now, because of critical funding problems facing our universities, we may have to curtail further enrollment growth in order to preserve quality.

"The members of the Board of Regents, the Presidents of the Universities and the Chancellor have a collective duty to inform the citizens of this state that the traditional "open door" may have to be closed. If the door is to be closed, what options do we face? Who will be given priority for admission? Who will be excluded, and what will be the consequences?

"In addition to the open door question, there are a number of other policy issues relating to higher education which need to be discussed. A great deal of misinformation about the costs and benefits of higher education are being circulated. We need to set the record straight regarding these matters.

"Furthermore, we need to find out firsthand how the people feel about higher education, about the kind of job which we as Regents and as administrators of the universities and University System are doing about the concerns of the people."

In a related development, a spokesperson of the United Faculty of Florida read a statement endorsing the "Report" Program and said the UFF will be seeking tax law revisions to obtain additional revenues for the SUS.

## **Grant Enables USF to Expand Services to 3,000 VA Students**

A \$63,981 award from the U.S. Office of Education has been made to the USF Office of Veterans Affairs.

Bob Jett, USF Tampa Campus veterans affairs director, said the funding will enable his office to expand efforts in outreach, recruitment, counseling and special education programs for veterans.

The funds will allow additional staffing at the USF Tampa and regional campuses, according to Jett and Russ Burr, director of veterans affairs for USF's regional campuses. "This, in turn, will help us certify veterans faster, as well as expand our other services," said Jett.

More than 3,000 VA students, approximately 14 percent of the student body, are enrolled at USF campuses.

"On campus, we're prepared to counsel veterans on academic, financial and personal needs, or provide referral to appropriate on-campus agencies," said Jett.


"The award will help us expand these counseling efforts and to better encourage veterans in the community to use G.I. Bill benefits," said Jett. "We also want to reach veterans lacking a high school diploma and emphasize to them that by attaining their diploma through the G.I. Bill, they may receive additional financial assistance for several educational purposes."

A \$92,632 grant from the U.S. Office of Education in mid-1973 enabled USF to open the Office of Veterans Affairs. V.A. student programming is administered through Dr. Chuck Hewitt, Vice President of Student Affairs.

Dr. John Feegel, M.D., author of the novel "Autopsy" and the textbook "The Legal Aspects of Laboratory Medicine," will be guest speaker at USF Oct. 29.

The Hillsborough County medical examiner, Dr. Feegel will speak at 8 p.m. in CBA 103. His topic is "Forensic Problems, Pathology and Crime." His talk is part of the "An Evening With" series sponsored by the Social Science Student Advisory Council.

Dr. Feegel has been with Hillsborough County since 1973. He is also chief of staff and chief pathologist, South Florida Baptist Hospital, Plant City; associate clinical professor of pathology, USF College of Medicine; consulting forensics pathologist to the state attorneys of Pasco, DeSoto, Manatee and Pinellas counties, and pathologist at Tampa General and University Community hospitals.

Associate editor of the Hillsborough County Medical Association Bulletin, Dr. Feegel, 43, holds a B.S. degree from Holy Cross, Rochester, N.Y., and M.D. from the University of Ottawa, Ontario, and a J.D. from the University of Denver.

Dr. Feegel's book "Autopsy" was published this year.

### Sarasota Lists 279 Degree-Seekers; Enrollment Tops Early Estimates

A total of 677 students registered for fall quarter courses at the Sarasota Campus of USF, far exceeding early estimates.

Registration figures show that 279 students are taking courses in pursuit of degrees, while another 398 students are taking courses without a degree program in mind.

Early estimates were that about 500 students would register for the fall term. This registration for the upper-level, graduate, and continuing education programs, added to the New College of USF registration of 443, brings a total registration for the Sarasota Campus to about 1,100.

The 677 students who are working in the upper-division, beginning graduate, and continuing education courses are taking a total of 1,028 courses. There are 41 course registrations in the College of Arts and Letters, 208 in the College of Business Administration, 535 in the College of Education and 244 in the College of Social Sciences.

### Novelist-Filmmaker Robbe Grillet To Anchor French Conference Here

French novelist-filmmaker, Alain Robbe-Grillet, who co-authored the screenplay of The Alain Renais film "Last Year at Marienbad," will speak at USF Nov. 3 at 7 p.m. in University Center (CTR) 252 and on Nov. 4 at 11 a.m. in CTR 251.

Three Robbe-Grillet films will be shown on campus Nov. 2 at 2 p.m. and repeated at 8 p.m. in the Fine Arts Auditorium (FAH 101). The films, in French with English subtitles, are "L'annee derniere a Marienbad" ("Last Year at Marienbad"), "L'homme qui ment" and "L'Eden et apres." Robbe-Grillet directed the last two.

All events are free and open to the public.

Robbe-Grillet will speak informally of his novels and films followed by a question and answer period. His appearance marks a highlight of a conference, "Recent Trends in the French Novel and Film," which is being held at USF Nov. 3 and 4.

The conference will also feature a roundtable discussion on the French New Novel to be held Nov. 3 at 3 p.m. in the Special Collections room (fourth floor) of the library. The event includes these participants: Mr. Gerard Roubichou, French cultural attache from New Orleans, Dr. Emily Glenisson, USF associate professor of French, and Dr. Raymond Gay-Crosier of the University of Florida French department.

Presently on display in the Special Collections room in conjunction with the conference through Nov. 10 is an exhibit, "The French Novel Since 1945." This is a collection of 600 novels representing 359 authors including the most outstanding works of such trends as existentialism, the absurd, escapism and the new novel. The display is sponsored by the USF foreign language department and is provided by the French Embassy's cultural services.
