STRICT ENFORCEMENT

Campus Traffic Violations Subject to County Courts

Regulations governing the use of vehicles on campus have been set up, to be administered by the committee of traffic and parking and enforced by the university office of security and communications. Appeal may be made to the committee of appeals.

"Enforcement of the new regulations will be strict," warns J. D. Garner, head of the campus police.

Rules prohibit speed in excess of 30 miles per hour, driving on grass or side-walks, U-turns, noisy mufflers, excessive use of horns, double parking and overnight parking.

Alleged violators are to be reported to the office of security and communications to pay fines, or to post bail while the cases are on appeal. Appeals are made by submitting a written report to the committee of appeals for study. The committee's decision is final. Fines are payable at the office of security and communications.

Failure to respond to a ticket or summons issued on campus will cause the case to be referred to County Traffic Court. Serious traffic violations, such as accidents and improper licenses will also be handled by county authorities.

Fines range from \$1 to \$25, depending on the nature of the offense and the number of previous offenses. In addition to cash fines, campus driving privileges may be suspended for repeated offenders.

Vehicles which are to be driven on campus must be registered at the booth downstairs in the Administration Building. Decals given as proof of registration and copies of the campus traffic regulations are given out at the time of registration.

Campus To Get Phone Booths

"There will be seven more pay phones located on campus," announced J. D. Garner, superintendent of security and communications. The orders have been placed and it is now up to the phone company as to when the phones will be installed.

THERE IS A SPORTS PROGRAM

Phys Ed Facilities Benefit All

"The welfare of the entire student body comes first in the university's long-range physical education program," Dr. Gilman W. Hertz, director of physical education and intramurals, explained in an interview with a student reporter.

Dr. Hertz received his education at the University of Wisconsin, where he earned his masters degree in health and physical education. He gained his doctorate at the University of Indiana in 1956.

Before coming to South Florida Dr. Hertz held the position of director of physical education and athletics at High Point College, N.C., for three years.

"Too many students have the impression that our goal is to build a stadium and produce a champion football team," Dr. Hertz said. "Our plans call for the building of those facilities which will benefit everyone on campus."

We have planned our physical education program with the purpose of teaching the student to gain proficiency in a wide range of sports. Students will then be able to use the facilities available to keep in top physical condition."

Locker, Shower Facilities

Under construction at the present time is a \$100,000 physical education building. The two-story structure, located northeast of the University Center, will consist of locker and shower facilities for approximately 1,000 students. It is scheduled for completion in December.

Outdoor handball courts, volleyball and basketball courts, and six tennis courts are scheduled for immediate construction and should be completed by the beginning of the second semester. Plans also call for construction of a field to be used for touch football and soccer in intramural events.

A bill up for approval before the 1961-62 Legislature calls for the appropriation of \$600,000, part of which will be spent for an Olympic-size swimming pool, running track and additional tennis courts. This also will provide for proper fencing around areas of activity, and bleachers for a proposed softball field. Golf facilities are expected to come from this appropriation also.

The \$1,600,000 physical education building, still in the planning stage, will be designed to offer a liberal amount of facilities for student use, rather than just house a vast sports arena. Included in the plant will be handball courts, facilities for wrestling, judo, gymnastics, and office space for faculty members. This is not scheduled to be completed before the charter class graduates.

When asked to predict a date for the first intercol-

legiate contest involving a team representing USF, Dr. Hertz stated, "I could not make such a statement. We are aiming first for a strong and well balanced P.E. program. Our athletic program will develop from this."

Dr. Hertz's statement reiterated the overall school policy. President John S. Allen, in an editorial carried recently by The Tampa Times, stated his belief in this way:

"Dr. Allen insists that progress in making the university a genuine center of learning must have priority," the article read. It then continued, "There will be plenty of time later for development of a sports program in addition to the present intramural recreational activities. Efforts should be concentrated on such fields as building a faculty that is strong in quality as well as numbers, providing books and laboratories that are needed and

maintaining high standards of scholarship."

Intramural Meeting
Student groups are scheduled for meeting today to make initial plans for intramural activities on the campus.

Those interested in organizing activities of this nature are urged to bring them up for discussion during these sessions.

Dr. Hertz also gave a tentative plan of the professional physical education program in the future.

"Courses will be offered in health and safety, P.E., recreation, and athlete coaching. Those majoring in P.E. will receive instruction in these four areas, thus providing development of a thorough background in this field."

At least one thing can be counted on, the University of South Florida will be undefeated on the football field, for several seasons at least.

Astronomer To Take USF Audience on 'Space Trip'

Levitt To Speak During Free Hour Wednesday

A noted American astronomer will conduct a University of South Florida audience on a "journey into space" Wednesday in the first of a year-long series of 29 special events scheduled for the USF campus.

The first of a year-long series of special events will begin Wednesday with a noted American astronomer's talk on a "Journey into Space."

Dr. I. M. Levitt, an authority on space travel and inventor of the first interplanetary timepiece, will inaugurate the events program, which includes 18 separate performances in the next 10 weeks.

The lecture will be held in one of two large lecture-demonstration rooms of the Science Building at 2 p.m. The public is invited to attend.

Levitt will discuss the problems and dangers to man's survival in outer space. He has been recognized for his original research in this field, and has popularized his findings through a television series called "The Universe Around Us."

Among Levitt's accomplishments is the invention of the Hamilton space clock, which shows comparative passage of time by the day, hour, month, and year on earth and on planets in outer space. His writings include two books, "A Space Traveler's Guide to Mars" and "Target for Tomorrow."

Levitt has been director of Philadelphia's Fels Planetarium for the past 11 years. He has been associated with the Franklin Institute, where the planetarium is located, since 1933. His weekly column on space travel is carried by newspapers in 60 American cities and eight foreign countries.

The USF Special Events Program during coming months will feature musicians, lecturers, artists, plays, movies, exhibits and films. Dr. A. A. Beecher,

director of the University's Division of Fine Arts, is in charge of the programs.
