AFRICAN-AMERICAN HISTORY

SOURCE ADDED TO DIGITAL LIBRARY

The latest addition to our Digital Library is Joan W. Peters' work, Slave and Free Negro Records from the Prince William County Court Minute and Order Books, 1752-1763, 1766-1769, 1804-1806, 1812-1814, 1833-1865 (Broad Run, Va.: Albemarle Research, 1996). Click on the following link <http://eservice.pwcgov.org/library/digitalLibrary/index.htm> <<http://eservice.pwcgov.org/library/digitalLibrary/index.htm>> and find it under Historic Records, 1700-1800. It covers all mentions of African Americans found in those records, including registrations of slaves and free Negroes, emancipations, arrests and lawsuits. The database is keyword searchable (use CTRL+F). It does not cover persons mentioned in deeds, wills, inventories, sales or tax lists. There are also gaps in the court minutes as shown in the years of coverage. We are grateful to Joan for allowing us to post her work online.

Published articles generally use a standardized (modern) form of the surname, *except* when quoting original documents, when the exact spelling used then should be followed. If I were using genealogy software I would do the same: pick a standardized form for the main entry, but when quoting actual documents I would take care to preserve the original spellings no matter how bizarre. Besides being historical, those variants may provide clues for searching in case of a brick wall!

Another thing to consider is the state's laws regarding access to death certificates. I didn't see any restrictions during a cursory glance, but in Illinois such records are considered "private" for a period of 20 years. Certainly monument records are different, but you might use any access restrictions for death certificates as a guideline for monument records.

Other than that - old phone books do exist. So folks wanting to look up old addresses and phone numbers already have a means of doing so. (Some are appearing on various websites - so again, not an issue.) And, there is the publicly available SSDI, so even if the Social Security number of the deceased individual appears - not a problem since it is already out on the web.

Applying a bit of common sense to what was publicly available at the time of record creation to the item being examined should help in any evaluation. For the most part (probably >98%) I wouldn't think that anything could be really problematical.

You are correct Susan, I was less than precise. I meant to say that conceptually they are not a problem - at least to most genealogists. Legal requirements and state regulations can make them one. I know my own county digitally "whites out" some personal information on online versions of deeds for the same sort of reason.

I think that with a bit of familiarity with the records, a general guidance document can be developed. If that is reviewed by a knowledgeable attorney, one

should be able to digitize the monument records in question with only a few issues left for a minority of the records, which would need to be addressed singly.

I no longer have access to the originals, but when I was working our library has 3 agreements from the 1930s and early 1940s with the local historical society. They said, essentially, that the items deposited with the library remained the property of the society but that they could be cataloged and treated as if they has been normally purchased by the library. Trouble was, the agreements were never updated to even take into account photocopying, let alone digitizing and putting things on the web. What happened was, the society materials were not used for any library projects, online exhibits and the like. They had to be left on the shelves. <Much relevant history snipped out here!>

So if you do draft any agreement, make sure that it spells out exactly what each party can and cannot do, methods of repatriation, and allows for

technologies "as from time to time may become available" to give the library or the society an out to digitize, sell copies, allow publication, etc.

It looks like Sager to me also, and definitely wasn't an "L" since you can see a clear capital "L" in "Leesburg" right next to it, and the letter with a down loop looks like the "g" in the sample and not an "l". Others beat me to it in searching for meanings for "sager." Country Lawyer made the most sense anyway, so since "sager" means lawyer, I think your problem is solved. The family may not have been very respectful since like many in his time period he did not start a career as a lawyer in his youth. He was a "meat merchant" in the 1880 census at age 30, and an "attorney at law" in the 1900 census, while his sons were listed as farm laborers.

As a user and librarian, what I hate about BISAC is that it places Genealogy together with Heraldry and under Reference rather than History.

Now, if you really mean BISAC-type, there are many adaptations of Dewey used in genealogy collections which focus on gathering materials together by location and subject.

Second level - sub-location (county or non-US 'state')

General subjects include: MISC (How-tos, general reference, genealogy-in-print series, etc.); FAM HIST - our surname collection

I used to work at a preservation/conservation lab at a university and this would come up quite frequently. Often, what the patron envisioned was that their book could somehow become like new again-which it could with a complete retooling. Not every old book is valuable (monetarily), so if it was a department that still needed the book, sometimes we would rebuild the book. For a family heirloom that a patron wanted to continue to have passed down, we would recommend repairs if they were minor. Torn spines can often be fixed as well as ripped or torn pages with little invasion. We would often give all the options and then let them make up their mind to what extent they wanted to fix it. If a book was valuable, we would recommend that a professional conservator be hired (we had one in house). Our conservator worked on rare books from a special collections department, but again,

he made repairs that would be considered minimally invasive such as tightening hinges, resewing loose signatures, deacidifying, etc. If repairing was not an option, we would build an enclosure for it. A good example of this would be the bible that the university owned that every president had been sworn in with. Some minor repairs were done to stabilize it and then a very elaborate box was built for it. It was recommended to be stored away and only taken out when being used for the swearing in.

As a former Christian Bookstore owner who is now an MLIS student, I can add that it often depends on the usage and future intentions of the owner. If it is an heirloom piece, then conservation and storage provisions are certainly recommended, but if it is a Bible that a pastor has used for years and intends to finish a career with, then more extensive repairs may be warranted IF and it is a big if, the individual is willing to give it up long enough for the job to be accomplished properly. I kept a list of a few reputable book binders who also dealt with court record books, etc. and encouraged the customer to contact those for time and price information. Bookbinding for the oldest items is a disappearing skill best left to those with the highest skill levels, such as those at museums or universities. A responsible bookbinder with less polished skills will gladly refer the patron to one with that level of ability. The question of giving up the item, long enough to allow time to accomplish it, is one the patron must answer.

We are lucky to have a "retired" bookbinder in our area who concentrates on
repairing family Bibles. He has been featured in the local newspaper more than
once, so people usually go straight to him without contacting us.

We have a family Bible collection that has increased over time as someone donates
all of mom or dad's or Aunt Mary's books and papers to the Archives. We do not
repair them, but keep them in archival boxes. We are planning to work with this
collection in the near future, copying the family history pages included in most of
them, as well as family records written inside covers and on fly leaves, to make
them accessible without handling the fragile books.

We had a fund for conservation of our more valuable rare books at one time, but I
doubt if we will ever see such funds again. Although an expertly conserved book
with a leather binding and gilt lettering actually increases in monetary value, I

personally prefer to keep original bindings whenever possible. (The Archives won't be selling anything anyway, so increasing the value is pointless.) My Library Science courses in "The History of Books and Printing" left me with enough knowledge to appreciate each stage and type of printing and binding over the years, and I make an effort to preserve at least one copy of West Virginia histories, etc., in an original binding.

One of my own family Bibles is falling apart, but I would never replace the covers that my grandmother held every morning to begin her day for as long as I could remember. Similarly, at work I like knowing that I am holding the same book that others have held, notable personages or not.

We have a Xerox Workcentre Bookmark 40 which has a sloped side to support the binding of the book and to prevent patrons from smashing down the bindings when they make copies (I think these are called "book edge" copiers). I was told by the Xerox folks that they were phasing out these copiers because no one bought them anymore and that ours was leftover from last year (this was at least a year ago now). You sacrifice the feeder when you get the attachment with the book edge. It does seem to help the books but frustrates those patrons who want to make many multiple copies of a document or do double sided copies because it doesn't do this easily. Works great for a few pages out of a genealogy book.

As a former Christian Bookstore owner who is now an MLIS student, I can add that it often depends on the usage and future intentions of the owner. If it is an heirloom piece, then conservation and storage provisions are certainly recommended, but if it is a Bible that a pastor has used for years and intends to finish a career with, then more extensive repairs may be warranted IF and it is a big if, the individual is willing to give it up long enough for the job to be accomplished properly. I kept a list of a few reputable book binders who also dealt with court record books, etc. and encouraged the customer to contact those for time and price information. Bookbinding for the oldest items is a disappearing skill best left to those with the highest skill levels, such as those at museums or universities. A responsible bookbinder with less polished skills will gladly refer the patron to one with that level of ability. We are lucky to have a "retired" bookbinder in our area who concentrates on repairing family Bibles. He has been featured in the local newspaper more than once, so people usually go straight to him without contacting us.

We have a family Bible collection that has increased over time as someone donates all of mom or dad's or Aunt Mary's books and papers to the Archives. We do not repair them, but keep them in archival boxes. We are planning to work with this collection in the near future, copying the family history pages included in most of them, as well as family records written inside covers and on fly leaves, to make them accessible without handling the fragile books.

We had a fund for conservation of our more valuable rare books at one time, but I doubt if we will ever see such funds again. Although an expertly conserved book with a leather binding and gilt lettering actually increases in monetary value, I personally prefer to keep original bindings whenever possible. (The Archives won't be selling anything anyway, so increasing the value is pointless.) My Library Science courses in "The History of Books and Printing" left me with enough knowledge to appreciate each stage and type of printing and binding over the years, and I make an effort to preserve at least one copy of West Virginia histories, etc., in an original binding.

One of my own family Bibles is falling apart, but I would never replace the covers that my grandmother held every morning to begin her day for as long as I could remember. Similarly, at work I like knowing that I am holding the same book that others have held, notable personages or not.

We have a Xerox Workcentre Bookmark 40 which has a sloped side to support the binding of the book and to prevent patrons from smashing down the bindings when they make copies (I think these are called "book edge" copiers). I was told by the

Xerox folks that they were phasing out these copiers because no one bought them anymore and that ours was leftover from last year (this was at least a year ago now). You sacrifice the feeder when you get the attachment with the book edge. It does seem to help the books but frustrates those patrons who want to make many multiple copies of a document or do double sided copies because it doesn't do this easily. Works great for a few pages out of a genealogy book.

Subject: Re: [Genealib] Repairing an old Bible

We are lucky to have a "retired" bookbinder in our area who concentrates on repairing family Bibles. He has been featured in the local newspaper more

than once, so people usually go straight to him without contacting us.

We have a family Bible collection that has increased over time as someone donates all of mom or dad's or Aunt Mary's books and papers to the Archives. We do not repair them, but keep them in archival boxes. We are planning to work with this collection in the near future, copying the family history pages included in most of them, as well as family records written inside covers and on fly leaves, to make them accessible without handling the fragile books.

We had a fund for conservation of our more valuable rare books at one time, but I doubt if we will ever see such funds again. Although an expertly conserved book with a leather binding and gilt lettering actually increases in monetary value, I personally prefer to keep original bindings whenever possible. (The Archives won't be selling anything anyway, so increasing the value is pointless.) My Library Science courses in "The History of Books and Printing" left me with enough knowledge to appreciate each stage and type of printing and binding over the years, and I make an effort to preserve at least one copy of West Virginia histories, etc., in an original binding.

One of my own family Bibles is falling apart, but I would never replace the covers that my grandmother held every morning to begin her day for as long as I could remember. Similarly, at work I like knowing that I am holding the same book that others have held, notable personages or not.
