USF Welcomes New Professors

With the arrival of Dr. Harris W. Dean, Ernest C. Reuning, Henry N. Robertson and Raymond F. Ferrero, the faculty will number 132. Of the 132 there will be 73 who hold doctorate degrees and several who will receive their doctorates this year.

Dr. Harris W. Dean received his bachelor's degree in education, 1929, from Illinois State University; master of arts and political science, 1936, State University of Iowa; master of education, 1946, and doctorate of education, 1947, from the University of Illinois.

Dr. Dean, who will be coming from FSU, will be a professor of education.

Dr. Dean has published several articles on education.

Reuning, who was born in Germany, received his B.A. with honors, from Swarthmore College in 1936. He will hold the position of assistant professor of astronomy.

Most of Reuning's publications have been parts of the publications and reports of the U.S. Naval Observatory.

The coordinator of student advising and assistant professor of social sciences are the positions that will be held by Robertson.

Robertson received his B.A. in 1942 from the University of Kentucky and his M.A. from the University of Minnesota. He is teaching at the University of Minnesota at the present.

Ferrero will be a part-time lecturer in business law in the college of business administration.

Ferrero received a B.A. at St. John's University and an L.L.B. at University of Florida. He is employed by Mabry, Reaves, Carlton, Fields, and Ward, attorneys.

With the arrival of new faculty members also comes new students. At the first of the semester the enrollment was 1,997 but the present total is now approximately 1,900 following semester dropouts.

Officials hope second semester registration will hit the 2,000 mark.

USF Chorus Plans 2nd Appearance

The USF Chorus will appear for the second time this semester in a "double-appearance" concert to be held Tuesday at 10 a.m. and 8:30 p.m. in Science Auditorium 100.

Professor R. Wayne Hugoborn, director of the chorus, stated that a very interesting and entertaining program has been planned. A very impressive and difficult selection, "First Choral Suite" by Gail Kubik, will be presented.

The suite, a folk opera in two acts, was composed for the Broadway stage in 1948, and is based on the life of John Audubon. It portrays his fantastic life as a frontiersman, a marksman, and tells of his friendship with Daniel Boone.

A variety of other selections, ranging from Negro spirituals to involved love songs will also be presented. Among the latter, is one of the most popular songs of a few years back, "All The Things You Are" which has also become a great favorite of the chorus. The concert is free to the students and public.

There is always a nurse there to meet any emergency or problem from 8 a.m. to 9 p.m. Dr. C. W. Mahon Jr. is there for an hour to an hour and a half every morning and is available for any emergency.

General Scholarships Loans Are Available to Students

Several vacancies exist for career in nursing, is eligible to compete for a scholarship loan. (If applicant is under 21 years of age, his parents must be residents of Florida.)

Every student who is awarded a general scholarship loan for the preparation of teachers must agree in writing to begin teaching in the public schools of Florida no later than the beginning of the first regular school term following graduation with the bachelor's degree and must teach during consecutive years for at least as many years as he received scholarship

assistance. Each student awarded a state nursing scholarship loan must begin practicing nursing in Florida immediately following graduation and continue for at least the period of time specified by the type scholarship held.

Students may obtain application forms from the College of Education Office, C 2101. Those students desiring to compete for a scholarship must register with Dean Jean Battle before Feb. 17.

Any college student who has been a resident of Florida for at least one year and desires training for a teaching career in the public elementary schools, secondary schools, or junior colleges of the state, or for a

career in nursing, is eligible to compete for a scholarship loan. (If applicant is under 21 years of age, his parents must be residents of Florida.)

Chamber Backs Package Plan Of Medical Aid

WASHINGTON, Jan. 23 (AP)—The U.S. Chamber of Commerce has proposed package retirement programs financed during working years as the best way of providing medical care for the aged.

Arthur H. Motley, chamber president, yesterday expressed strong opposition to tying medical care for the aged to the Social Security system, as President Kennedy advocates.

The Social Security approach, Motley said, "would require boosting Social Security taxes to a point where people might rebel against the whole Social Security system."

Motley said a way should be found to combine pensions, group life insurance and group health insurance into a single package. He said the chamber is urging businessmen to extend to their employees health care programs that cover them after retirement.

This approach, he said, would provide "personalized medicine" through "voluntary private plans and through local and state governments where necessary."

He was a member of the Seminole Heights Methodist Church, and a member of the Stanley Lodge, No. 348 F.A.M., Salisbury, N.C.

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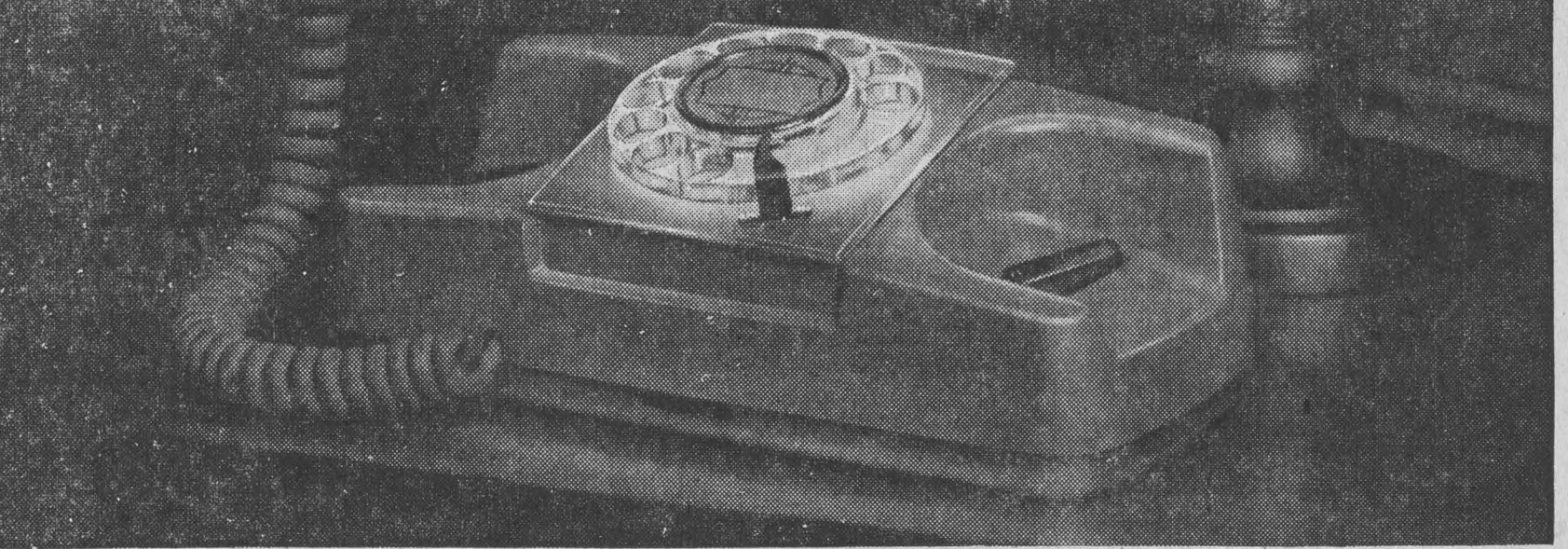
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
