This book is about where the cemeteries of Oregon are located. Not lists of who is buried in them. Those are only listed for the small sites on private property with 12 or less burials.

The book is 8.5" X 11" X 2" 1,200 plus pages and weighs in at about 8 lbs in the shipping carton. Fully alphabetical by county and site, each county is indexed, Black and White photo's for a general idea of what monuments are in each county, with a state wide index in the back. This is a must for those researching Oregon using death certificates. We tried to pick up all the also known as names to the sites. There are about 2500 burial sites in the 36 counties of Oregon. This material is updated and corrected, not like the material from the old ODOT book that has been put up on the web. So no this is not on the web.

An Idea to consider:

Don't be succumbed by the apparent low-cost of transforming our libraries into an electronic storehouse. The real cost will become apparent after data is gone.

Yes, I am one of those "Do It Yourself" guys.
Who strongly believe the current trends to preserve data of a Historic Nature in an electronic media is short sighted and will not last more than a few generations.

Memorials, in bronze, iron, stone, wood are also prone to destruction.

Data that will last, many hundreds of years, will be found in archives, libraries, etc., in a published printed format. Of course the storage area has to be controlled and fire proof or resistant.

Wide distribution of worthwhile historic data in a number of Archives, and suitable libraries will assure some locations will survive.

For example, During WWII, there were more than 3,600 Men lost on US Submarines. Monuments have been erected in every state, and in my 90 years, I have observed many of these memorials, even with very limited data, have been damaged or destroyed.

As a "Do it Yourself person," all the men's basic genealogy with his historic records were researched, recorded and published, with many WWII era photos.

A few dozen or so, sets of these six volumes have been donated to various Archives and Libraries with the intent of preserving as much data on each man as reasonable, for future researchers, family members, etc.

Work is continuing to add photos needed of these men. Librarians throughout the US have been most gracious and generous with their research time and many photos have been recovered from selected home town publications, families, researchers and communities. Which we are thankful for.

Our library had the same situation with our local historical society. The society originally had space in the basement of our local library. The historical society opened a museum in the late 1980s, but had left some of their collections at the library. In the early

1990s the society was asked to remove the last of their collections that had been stored in the basement. The society, after several reminders to remove the items, and then a final ultimatum, removed the file cabinets. They then accused the library of stealing some of their collections and an almost insurmountable rift began.

I began working as a reference librarian in 2002. For the first several

years the local society would not work with us at all. To illustrate our situation, we had applied for a local LSTA grant in 2007 to digitize parts of both collections. Their response to my request for collections information was, "you get the grant, we'll let you in and not before." Luckily, a historical society board change in 2008 brought new opportunities. Since that time, we have received two digitization grants and have worked together, not without growing pains, on several projects. I work as a volunteer at the museum digitizing collections for them and have given lectures there on preserving heirlooms and genealogy. They work with the library to support local community goals and are much more open to sharing details about their collections. By no means are we "home free" but we have built up a mutual respect and have torn down the decades long animosity that existed between both organizations a little at a time. My best recommendation is to persevere, cautiously, and be willing to give more than you get at first. Offer to volunteer so you can familiarize yourself with their procedures and give them the opportunity to get to know you. They will probably have lots of fears, either justified or not, about your library "stealing" information or trying to "take their stuff." Working for them will let both you and the society get comfortable with the idea while working towards a mutual goal.
