Delayed Registration To Hit Many; Allen Gives Details

Those OK Get Word Jan. 22; Others To Register Feb. 14

Students in overlooking some registration instructions have brought more than a few headaches to faculty and administrative personnel. And a number of students will find they are not getting the classes or class load they requested. This was brought out in a faculty meeting last Wednesday in CH111. To a lot of people Jan. 22 is now "D" Day. You do register on time or you don't, depending on what you have done by Jan. 10.

Dr. John S. Allen, USF president, asked the faculty to help spread the word on the details of registration. He pointed out that instructions must be followed by both the students and the advisors to make the system work.

Problems Revealed
President Allen said, "Student and staff cooperation in the registration approach is much appreciated." He added, "It is hoped that the experimental plan now in use will save students and advisors much time in schedule making, and thereby provide increased opportunity for discussion of the student's long-range educational plans and career objectives. The university should also be enabled to more evenly distribute enrollments in classes and sections—a must for the maximum utilization of facilities as the student body rapidly increases."

"During the holiday," President Allen explained, "screening of the packets turned in revealed significant problems which prevented the completion of the entire scheduling process. In some cases incomplete information or the extenuating circumstances given by the students, such as jobs or car pools, precluded the completion of schedules. While recognizing the necessity of part-time jobs in some instances, the university also takes cognizance of the rigorous demands of and the top priority which must be assigned to the academic program. The students whose schedules could not be made should consult the Jan. 22 and 29 issues of the Campus Edition. It will have the details for the students at that time."

Important Dates
"Among the instructions most frequently overlooked," Dr. Allen added, "were those pertaining to proper signatures on the Independent Study application, designation of the type of Humanities Laboratory, listing of one or more alternate courses and securing the advisor's signature."

All this has brought about a new set of dates that is most important to students. Dr. Allen explained them as follows:

"All evening students, who are not scheduled early, are registered between 6:30 and 9:00 p.m. Wednesday, Feb. 14, in the University Center Ballroom. "New day students, after orientation and testing Feb. 14, will register Thursday, Feb. 15 in the UC Ballroom."

"Scheduling and registering for those students whose packets were not picked up on schedule or returned by Wednesday, Jan. 10, will be completed on Wednesday, Feb. 14."

Names To Be Posted
"A list of the students who correctly followed instructions and whose packets have been processed will be posted by the cashier's door, on the official bulletin board in the University Center, and by the registrar's door, Monday, Jan. 22. Since these students will have priority so far as course and section assignment is concerned, they can make payment to the cashier beginning Monday, Jan. 22, and receive their schedules. Later supplements to this list will be posted, also."

Take Good Look
Right now students should remember these dates:
Wednesday, Jan. 10—Last day for returning packets on time for regular registration.
Monday, Jan. 22—Lists to be posted of those who may complete registration and payment of fees. Listing of details of registration in the Campus Edition of The Tampa Times.
Monday, Jan. 29—Same as Jan. 22 plus possible supplementary lists, and additional instructions.
Wednesday, Feb. 14—Testing and orientation for new students, cleanup registration for old students (those not returning their packets in proper order by Jan. 10).
Thursday, Feb. 15—Registration of new students.
Monday, Feb. 19—Acceptance of request for changes in schedule. (See detailed instructions referred to earlier.) This is, also, first day of classes.

Scholarship Grant Given University

An annual scholarship grant was recently given to the university by one of Tampa's oldest firms, Knight and Wall Co.

The grant, to be known as the Knight and Wall Scholarship, was presented by Frank Cooper, executive committee chairman, and Frank Cooper III, president of the company. It was accepted on behalf of the foundation by Judge John Germany.

The scholarship is to be given to sons and daughters of Knight and Wall employees and customers and amounts to \$301 yearly, according to Dale Purcell, director of development. In the event no one affiliated with Knight and Wall qualifies for the scholarship, it will be given to some other deserving student.

Yesterday marked the opening of the Faculty Show in the university gallery in the library. Represented in the exhibition were a variety of artistic mediums: pen and ink, water color, collage, oil, etching, lithograph, and ceramics.

Profs and Art
The professors whose works are on exhibit are: Dr. Herbert J. Burgart, assistant professor of education; Harrison W. Covington, associate professor of fine arts; Claude W. Houk, instructor of fine arts, and Dr. Hans Juergensen, assistant professor of humanities. All four professors joined the USF staff in Sept. 1961.

The British film satire concerning a small Scottish island faced with the problem of a shortage of whisky—"Tight Little Island"—will be shown tomorrow, Jan. 9 at 8:30 in TA. Oddly enough, the box office is

Meet Author
The last of the Meet The Author series for this semester, features Dr. Frank G. Slaughter, Thursday, Jan. 11 at 2 p.m. in UC264. The series is sponsored by the Cultural Committee of the University Center.

Born in Washington, D.C., in 1908, Slaughter graduated from high school in Oxford, N.C., at the age of 14, as class valedictorian magna cum laude from Duke University at 18, and received his M.D. from Johns Hopkins four years later. In 1935 he took up writing as a hobby, and sold \$12 million worth of fiction in the next five years.

Variety in Novels
Among his better known works are "Touch of Glory," "The Galileans," "The Song of Ruth," and "Lorena." His two latest books—"Epidemic" and "The Curse of Jezebel" were both written in 1961.

The unique American Dance Drama Company will perform in TA Friday, Jan. 12, at 3:15 p.m. and 8:30 p.m. in a program presenting a series of works of comedy, satire, and jazz.

Coming Friday

The program for Friday includes a contrast of three one-act plays in dance styles. First, in a contemporary vein, "Always Pierrot"—a modern spoof of the old-fashioned Harlequin plays set to music by Elmer Bernstein, a movie and jazz composer. The second play is the romantic classical "Romeo and Juliet," created by the Tchaikovsky "Overture Fantasia." The third, "Portrait of a Summer Sunday," is based on the Tennessee Williams play, "Summer and Smoke."

But the top honors, both team and individual, went to sports-minded students.

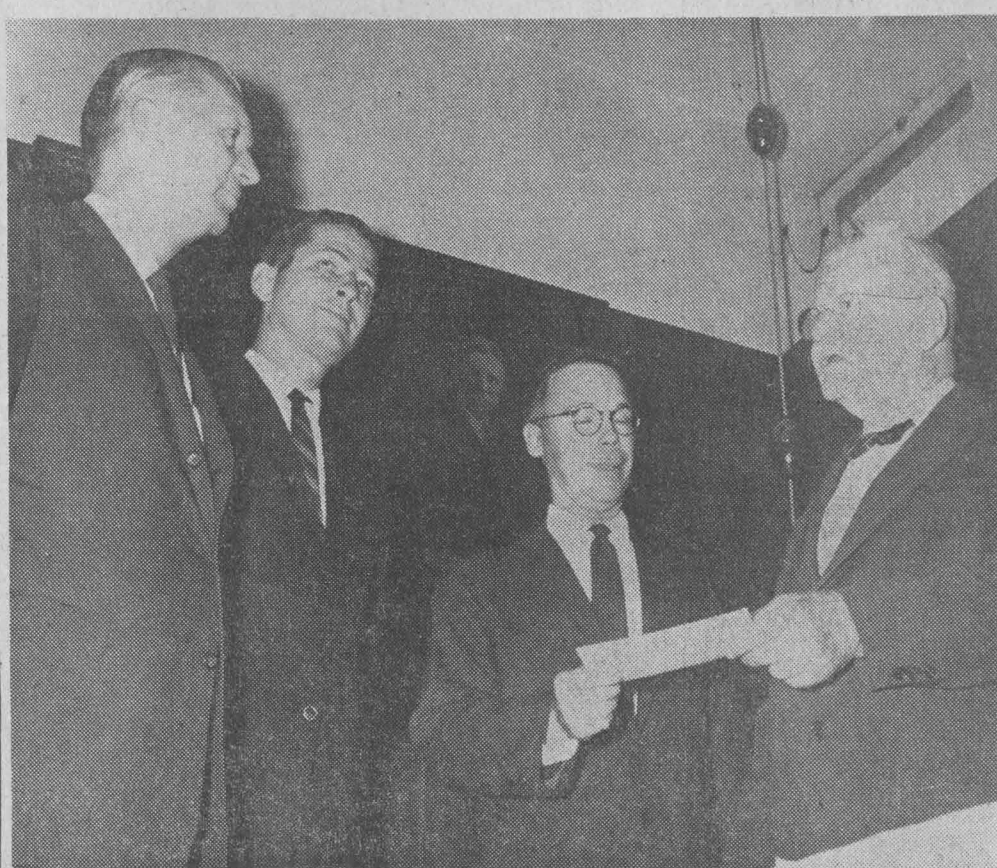
