Registration Topic Of Heated Debate

A heated debate on the subject of registration took place in an open forum last week. The forum was to be a question and answer session between the students and Dean Howard Johnson, but the topic finally became so involved that moderator Dr. Thomas Wenner

19 although the governor had referred the matter to them. Johnson was quick to point out that this was an internal problem not to be handled by the Board. Another professor said that since 500 plus students had petitioned for a change, and the governor had referred the matter, then the Board should have made some sort of inquiry.

Dean Johnson's opening remarks referred to the gap between students and administration. He feels that the general attitude on campus is in error. "We are not here just to attend a university but to build one."

Stop Beating Around Bush
The students led in with the suggestion that their questions be answered in a clear and concise manner rather than the usual run around the side issues.

To the Dean's reply that this is sometimes necessary to push the questions back into proper channels, one of the students remarked that this appeared to him similar to the procedure of channels followed by Medieval courtiers.

The discussion then moved into a session on the legal responsibilities to the top authority, the State Board of Control, by the president and his staff. The student feeling was that this was a "top to bottom" approach to democracy. A professor in the audience remarked that the Board was responsible to the citizens of Florida and the students through their parents.

Board Said Remiss
It was brought up that the Board was remiss in not taking up the registration question at their meeting on campus Jan.

Experiment Up for Trial, Verdict in Thirty Days

The big topic on campus this season is the new registration system and its current results. There still seems to be some confusion among the ranks of those whose schedules pose unusual problems, and those who have not had their schedules approved.

A list of students who have their schedules and have been approved for change will be posted on a bulletin board by AD2096 today. These are to use the following schedule of days between the hours of 8:30 and 11:30 a.m. in AD2096:

E-H—Jan. 29 I-L—Jan. 30
M-F—Jan. 31 Q-S—Feb. 5
T-Z—Feb. 6 A-D—Feb. 7

Any student who applied for a change and whose name does not appear on this list may secure an appointment with his dean for further discussion on the matter. Students whose names do not appear on any of the posted lists but who turned in packets by Jan. 10 are asked to follow the above schedule for room AD2096. No other requests for change will be considered until Feb. 19.

Feb. 14 Important Date
Students who did not turn in packets by Jan. 10, will register Feb. 14 in the Ballroom 8:30 a.m.-2 p.m. Evening students will register 6:30-9 p.m. on this day. New students register Feb. 15 from 8:30 until 2 p.m.

In an interview, Dr. Frank Spain, registrar, said: "Last fall, with the student and adviser working together, there were 864 out of 2,900 who requested change and 185 who returned more than once. This led to the new plan. The new plan was strictly an experimental project. We will hope to constantly work toward improvement."

45 Per Cent—Special Handling
Students who wanted at least 12 or more hours and whose schedules could not be arranged in such a fashion have had their cards held over. If a student's approved schedule has fewer hours than requested, he can list alternative courses immediately with his dean and may have additions made to his schedule.

The best way to test the quality of a system is a service index. This system has not really been proven until 30 days after registration and then a comparison can be made of the number of requests for changes with those from the preceding registration.

This registration period, 45 per cent of the student requested special consideration due to extenuating circumstances.

PREVENTION OF POLIO

Oral Vaccine Offered Free

Oral polio vaccine will be administered to students beginning tomorrow at 10 a.m. until 2 p.m. in the UC Gallery Lounge. The feeding will continue through Thursday, Feb. 1.

The vaccine, which is described as a pleasant-flavored liquid preparation, will be given in two doses eight weeks apart. It will be administered free of charge, and is recommended to all persons under 40 years of age. The vaccine, designed to prevent all three types of polio, will be given to all interested persons, despite previous vaccination.

The program in which the university is participating is a countywide attempt to immunize 250,000 persons in an effort to stamp out polio in the area.

The Hillsborough County Medical Association and the Hillsborough County Health Department are working together in the project.

Night students may receive the vaccine during the hours listed for day students if they wish to use the facilities to be provided on campus.

A consent form must be filled out by parents or guardians of students under 21 years of age, before the vaccine can be administered to them.

European Tour Offered To Students

A summer trip to Europe is being offered to students in cooperation with the Bowen Travel Agency of Tampa.

Members of the tour will leave New York June 28 and travel to Tours, France. In Tours, on the Loire River, students will be enrolled in the Institut de Touraine.

The period of enrollment will last one month, after which the group will take a two-week bus tour of Germany, Switzerland, Italy and France.

While at the Institut de Touraine, which is a part of the University of Poitiers, students will receive instruction in French on all levels. For beginners, this four-week course will provide a good background for first-year French. If a student had had one year of French, he may, with his instructor's permission, go immediately into third-year French, after completing the summer course.

Classes will be held in the mornings, leaving the afternoons free for the numerous activities available. Activities include tennis, swimming, tours of the area, and many others.

The Institut de Touraine is for all foreign students from outside France; thus, members of the tour will have the opportunity of meeting students from many other countries. While in France, the students in the tour will live with French families.

The price of the tour is \$995, which includes all traveling and living expenses. If interested, contact Mrs. Valette in the library, or the Bowen Travel Agency.

Communications Breakdown

What's the matter with USF?
The answer seems to be the age-old excuse of a breakdown in communication between students and administration. It's high time to expose this fallacy. The truth is many do not want to communicate. It is much easier to scream in disunion about supposed slights than to do something about them.

The registration groups of the charter class failed from lack of student support and the civic units of the present student government draw a fraction of the student body.

The officers of the student association even demonstrate a remarkable objection to communicating with the students. The election of the five student senators to the University Senate has been so delayed that there has been no representation on the Senate for at least a month, yet these senators who can no longer sit on the University Senate still make their presence felt at meetings of the Executive Council and the legislature.

Interest areas or councils which are called for in the student association constitution to send representatives to the Executive Council to facilitate communication between interest areas on campus and the Student Association are another area of extreme neglect. The only comment Student Association officers make is "we encourage these councils to form." However, in practice, the story seems to be the opposite. The student association has operated for the better part of a year without representation from major interest areas.

The constitution is sufficiently vague to enable the present student administration to operate indefinitely in the interest of a minority without being forced to be a government of the majority.

Someone must take the initiative. Interest groups who haven't insisted that they be represented are as much at fault as the Student Association. Are they waiting for engraved invitations? The answer to USF's problem then is for students to take an active interest in the established means of communications and take advantage of them.—W.B.

Campus basketball powers face stiff competition this week as the Intramural League heads into quarterfinal play, and the last action of the fall semester.
