PRESIDENT'S ACTION OPPOSED

Lecture Cancelled As Inappropriate

The American Idea course lecture scheduled for Feb. 27 and also open to the public was canceled by the USF administration. Dr. Jerome Davis, former professor at Yale Divinity School, was judged by pressure groups to be unfit to lecture because of a past appearance before the U.S. House Committee on Un-American Activities.

Dr. John S. Allen, president of USF, took responsibility for this cancellation by explaining that in the light of Davis' past career, it would not be appropriate for him to speak at a meeting where attendance is mandatory. It would be all right if Davis were invited by a group who would sponsor a lecture independent of courses, according to Allen.

What They Say
Here are the opinions of the "man on the street" in regard to this administrative move.

Celeste Provenzano, special student, Tampa: "Despite his background, Davis possesses freedom of speech and should have been allowed to give his lecture."

Ron McCraney, freshman, Lithia: "The administrative was justified in cancelling his appearance at a required lecture, but should not object to a public lecture held at the university."

Cheryl Beckner, freshman, Tampa: "The man is innocent until proven guilty, and I think we should be given the right to hear Davis and think for ourselves."

Prudy Vallejo, freshman, Tampa: "A lot of people have appeared before the committee. This does not make them Communists. The lecture should not have been cancelled on this basis alone."

AAUP Takes Note
Linda Wanamaker, freshman, Tampa: "The lecture should not have been cancelled. At a university you should be entitled to hear all sides of a question."

Meanwhile, a member of the USF AAUP chapter said the administration has not heard the end of this and predicted some resolution may be forthcoming opposing the action taken.

More News Wanted In USF Edition

The executive committee of the Student Association met with the executive committee of the university again last week in a discussion of the Campus Edition of The Times. It was recommended that the edition expand with more pages as soon as possible.

Meanwhile, George H. Miller, advisor to the Campus Edition, said, "Expansion will be impossible until additional support is gained from the instructor of the journalism class and class members and an increased budget is obtained from student affairs."

Eligibility of student officers and senators was also discussed. President Allen said that the three senators that are still eligible should attend the senate meetings until new senators are elected. Problems that will involve the Student Association in the change to tri-semester were also discussed.

Robert Dennard, business manager, gave a breakdown of how the student fee is used. From the \$113 total, \$63 goes for incidentals, \$20 to the student building fee, \$30 for student activities, which include health service, UC activities, the fine arts series, the newspaper, the Student Association, and recreational equipment.

The coming Chinesegut Hill Conference was discussed briefly. The tentative date of April 7, previously decided by Student Association officers still stands. About 60 people will attend. Of these, 35 will be students and 25 administration and faculty.

At the close of the meeting President Allen said that the officers of the Student Association may request another meeting any time it is needed.

Student Rights Topic of Next USF Forum

"Student Rights: Inherent or Imposed?" is the topic of the next forum in the University of South Florida's Search for Truth series to be held Tuesday, March 6, at 11 a.m. in CH111.

Robert L. Dennard, USF business manager, will speak on the legal framework constructed by the State Legislature and the Board of Control within which the University operates. Following his presentation, Dr. Robert A. Warner and Dr. Robert J. Decker will speak on the application of student rights within that legal framework. Warner is chairman of the university's course in the American Idea and Decker is associate director of student personnel. Thomas B. Wenner, lecturer on the American Idea, will be the moderator.

On the panel of students are Dick Davis, Don Gordon and Frank Hancock, who will continue the discussion. The remainder of the program will be devoted to questions from the audience.

The collection was believed to be a success.

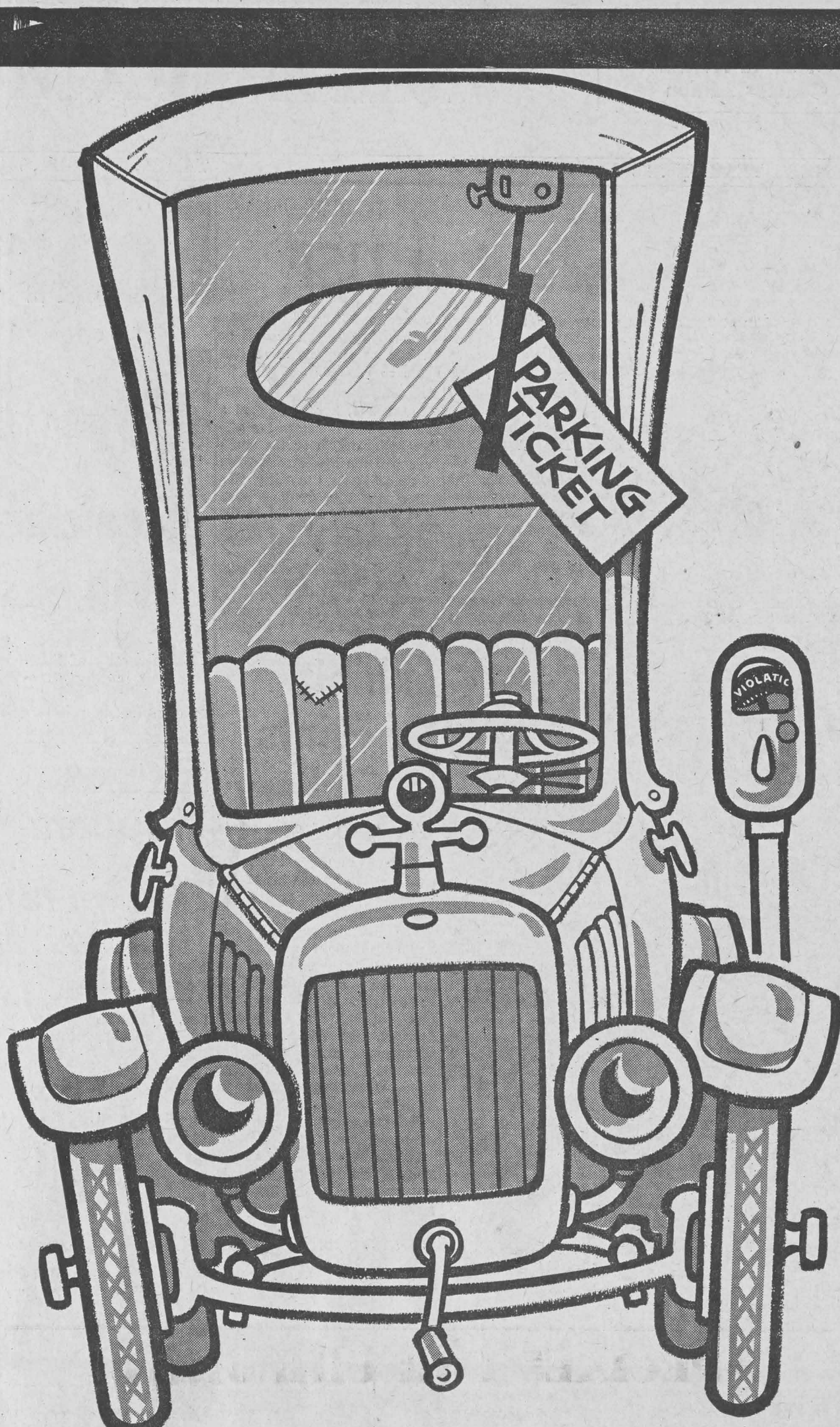
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
