CHURCH OF CHRIST BUYS \$65,000 OF PROPERTY IN TEMPLE TERRACE FOR COLLEGE

SALE INCLUDES 150 ACRES, T.T. APARTMENTS, OLD COUNTRY CLUB, TENNIS COURT

A new college, the Florida Christian college, is being founded in our fair city. The Church of Christ bought from Mr. Sherman K. Smith for \$65,000 the following: the old Temple Terrace country club hotel, the new Temple Terrace Apartments building, the three cottages, the two tennis courts, the 18 acres on which this property stands, and 150 acres on the far side of the river.

On this property the Church of Christ intends to establish the Florida Christian College. The courses offered at the new college will be theology courses to prepare a student for the ministry, and regular academic courses in arts, sciences, and languages.
