STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

MEETING of May 19, 1972

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m. Those present were:

Members: Lou Kubler, Winston Bridges, Robert Burke,  
Judy Wilhite, Tom Ford, and Jackie Guthrie

The minutes of the April 28 meeting were read. Bob Burke made a motion that they be accepted as read. The motion was seconded by Kubler & passed by a unanimous vote.

Correspondence:

Wayne read a letter from the General Council of the Board of Education with regard to day care, summarizing the main points which were as follows:

- If the University so desired to, it could set up a day care program for University employees as part of fringe benefits.
- Day care support by student activities money is an acceptable program.
- The University may contract with a day care center for services in the same manner that it does for food services.

Committee Reports:

Beer Committee - Wayne reported that a letter has been written and sent and will be heard at Tuesday's meeting with the Student Affairs Staff in Tampa. Wayne will report on this matter at the next meeting of our Student Affairs Committee.

Budget Committee - Kubler reported that the total of requests turned in last year was \$8,000; this year student organizations have requested \$31,000. Kubler has recommended between \$5,500 and \$6,000 for student organization budgeting based upon the expected budget for next year. Lou's recommendations were as follows:

\*The Photo Club does not actually exist, but marine science wishes some equipment and photography work, and since the dark room is all set up, Lou recommended the \$100 for chemicals and paper.

Wayne Hoffmann reminded the committee that all work done by the budget committee must be approved and that we can expect a meeting to be called requesting a review of recommendations made by the budget committee whereby each club must justify the money request made.

Lou has also requested funds for special interest groups (softball, baseball, basketball, and volleyball). He reported that there has been some static because of budget cutting, but he feels that some of the requests have been absurd.

Old Business:

One of the major tasks of the Student Affairs Committee is to establish a policy for funding an agency budget Wayne Hoffmann reported. Several meetings ago we outlined the present policy in operation and the question was raised as to what happens to money of part-time St. Petersburg students who pay full fees. The present procedure is that the campus on which a student takes most of his hours receives the \$29.50 activities fees. It was decided by the S.A.C. that this was not an equitable distribution and that we recommend another policy. It was suggested something like .5% of the entire university agency dollars budget be provided for this campus, but it was later realized that this was incorrect--it should have been 5% instead of .5%. Now a recommendation needs to be made with regard to the policy for funding an agency budget. The floor was made open for discussion and it was finally decided that we invite Vice-President of Student Affairs, Joe Howell, to the S.A.C. meeting next week so that he can be addressed personally on this matter.



**USF-St. Pete**  
*A Rags To Riches Story,  
 But They Are Winners*

Somebody passed off the University of South Florida-St. Pete as a genuine baseball team. It is as bogus as the fellow who turns out \$20 bills in his cellar or one who makes grape wine out of grape Kool-Aid.

Even the schedule was fictitious. It listed only two games and one of those was canceled.

The school had no athletic budget and hence no coach. And no nickname.

Explain, then, a 9-6-1 record. Examine those engraving plates. Check that wine.

What about co-captains Greg Hunsinger and Jim Neader? They hit .404 and .310 respectively and batted third and fourth in the order.

Games were arranged by letter or by phone. During an Easter break with northern teams in the city, the two knocked on motel doors making more schedule additions and subtractions than an accountant.

Most of the baseballs were Neader's. He had been hoarding 15 or so for the last half-dozen years. Hunsinger brought the catching equipment. If you had a bat you made the team.

Practice was held by claiming a deserted field, usually at Northwest Youth Center. Once the club practiced on a diamond set aside for the Florida Little Major League -- a facility built for the 8-12 year olds.

One player so impressed Husson, Maine, with his pitching he was awarded a baseball scholarship to the school. That was Mike LaRocco of Bishop Darry who hadn't thrown in better than a year but still struck out 12.

After an 8-0 loss to a well-drilled University of Tampa team, USF president, Cecil Mackey, wrote the St. Pete Campus student president, Lou Kubler and told him the team had to change its name. Maybe he wanted the players to wear football uniforms?

The University of South Florida already had a team representing the student body of 18,000. The campus in St. Pete had a token enrollment of 1,400. The only scheduled game between the two wound up USF 6-1 over USF-St. Pete. The second game was canceled. Too close, maybe.

MIT also whipped USF-St. Pete. That score was 5-4. Washington & Lee University wasn't so fortunate. It came out on the wrong end of a 9-6 finish.

Hunsinger missed a game. His wife had a baby. Neader was called in as an umpire after a car crash stalled the regular men in blue. "I got more boos from my dugout than theirs."

The team made a road trip to Melbourne to play Florida Tech. There was no money. Florida Tech agreed to put the players up and feed them. Big favor. USF-St. Pete took two out of three games.

Two players sitting on the bench for USF in Tampa, jumped the club to play for St. Pete. One of them -- Joe LaMascolo -- won his last three starts as the team took its last four games.

Kubler, somewhat out of character for a student body president, was also a member of the team. "I told them I couldn't play regularly. I'd be available for pinch-hitting duties but I wouldn't slide if it came down to it. I can't. I've got shin splints."

All but four of the games were played on the road. "We couldn't afford the umpires or the two new baseballs so we couldn't play at home."

But it cost about \$5 apiece for equipment. Everybody had to chip in. Neader tried to make do. The bat he used for the last half-dozen games was one discarded by New Hampshire College.

"It had just a little crack in it. A couple of nails and a little tape and it was all right."

What the team lacked in finesse it made up for in desire. Neader stole 16 bases in 17 attempts. Eight players batted better than .300. Gary Calhoun didn't make an error in 21 chances, but the team made 19 in three games.

Everyone played. It was almost a throwback to the old days when baseball was 100 per cent fun, the time when six guys got together and picked sides. A time before rigid regimentation, scholarships and budgets.

And Neader and Hunsinger had to play. If they didn't they might have taken the equipment and gone home. Then, where would the team be?

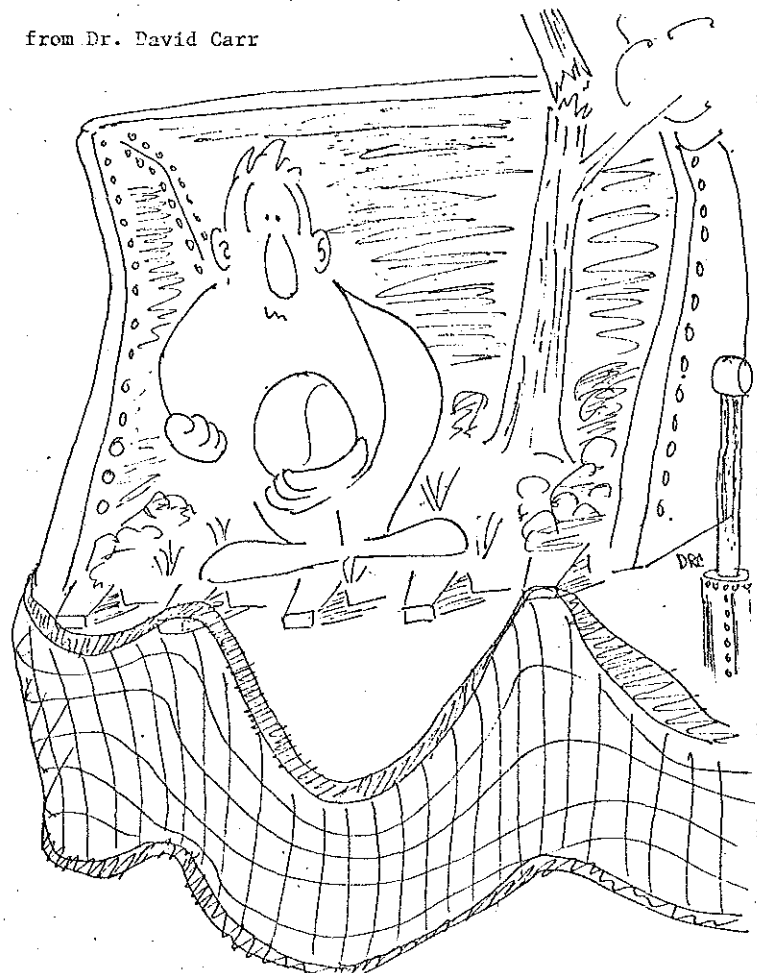

The University of South Florida at St. Petersburg boasts of an unusual baseball team which concluded its first season of college play with an impressive 9-6-1 mark. Winning six of its last seven games, USFSP was able to overcome some of its earlier setbacks.

Team hitting leaders included catcher Greg Hunsinger and Jim Neader, outfielder.

In pitching, the ERA leaders were Larry Black and Mark Crissman. Mound workhorses were Joe Lomascolo with 36 innings of work and Jim Merrifield with 26 innings.

In fielding, centerfielder Gary Calhoun took the top glove honors with 1.000 average, errorless ball. He was followed by Jim Neader and first baseman Joe Withrow.

The USFSP team was unusual in the college ranks--it was managed by two players, Jim Neader and Greg Hunsinger. Using all their players in the games, USFSP tried to stress the fun in baseball as well as strong competition.

# STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE

**Day Care Report** - Winston Bridges reported that in talking to his colleagues he found that they could arrange to have education students participate in working at the day care center on this campus on a volunteer basis. He is not sure, however, that they can fill the needs for help completely.

Wayne reported that we have been in conversation with the junior college program but the director is out of town and we will meet with her personally in June to possibly arrange something for the fall but not the summer. Wayne met with the day care personnel yesterday and it was decided that one of the teachers there now will be in charge for the summer and we are in the process of finding another student to help. Budgeting salaries will take \$2,000 for the summer program plus the fees collected from parents. Funding will include:

Primary Teacher	\$3/hour for 40/hours a week for 10 weeks = \$1,200
Other Teacher	\$2/hour for 40/hours a week for 10 weeks = \$ 800
<b>TOTAL</b>	<b>= \$2,000</b>

These teachers could be placed on OPS (other personnel service) rather than line positions. It would come out of next year's agency budget.

Bill Hable reported that he has looked into the possibility of contractual service. In talking with several day care centers in the immediate area he found that slot would be interested in working out a contractual agreement. The vacancy arrangement is pretty doubtful, however. Costs and meals were within reason. Most don't take children on a half day or hourly basis unless there are vacancies, and then only on a half day basis, none on an hourly basis. Therefore, the situation is not good for setting up a contractual arrangement at this time. Winston Bridges asked if he had contacted the main campus on this matter since the women activists there were interested in day care service. Apparently they have made some contractual arrangements with a Catholic student center. Wayne asked for confirmation of the Committee for continuing the day care program during the summer and that a program beyond the summer will be decided upon after next year's budget has been received. Bob Burke made the motion that \$2,000 of the student agency budget for '72/'73 be appropriated for summer day care salaries. Tom Ford seconded the motion, it was voted on and passed unanimously.

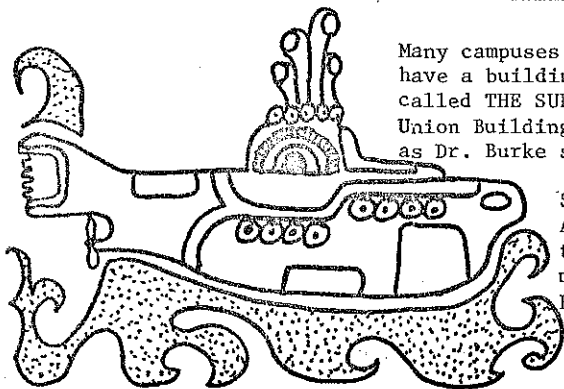
**Criteria for budgeting and appropriation** - Wayne suggested that we hold our decision as to what we want to consider priorities until we know what the resources are and then review the priorities and assign dollars to them. Everyone agreed.

**New Business:**

In last night's Independent there was an article on the baseball team referring to a letter from Cecil Mackey to Lou Kubler saying that USF/St. Pete had to change the name of their baseball team. Lou said there was no such letter but that verbal communication had transpired and that the athletic director, not Mackey, wants the name-change because of the NCAA rules. Lou is writing a memo to clear up the misprint that appeared in the article in the Independent.

Bob Burke reported that the submarine in Bayboro Harbor may be moved to Tampa and suggested that we lease the submarine from the Navy to keep in Bayboro Harbor for possible classroom use. Burke further moved that a committee be formed consisting of Kubler, Tuttle, Hofmann, and Wilhite to investigate the leasing of the submarine followed by an investigation of the feasibility of using it as a classroom. Kubler seconded the motion and it was brought up for discussion. Burke called for a vote after discussion, Kubler seconded, the motion was voted on and passed.

Bob Burke made a motion that the meeting be adjourned, Kubler seconded it, and the meeting was adjourned.

# SHORT TERM LOANS

The DEADLINE for processing SHORT TERM LOANS for the St. Petersburg Campus for Quarter IV has been changed to MAY 26, 1972. Applications must be IN Tampa by this date and so allow a few days for completion and notarization after picking up applications. Do not expect to pick up an application on May 26 and turn it in the following Monday --no exceptions will be made. Short term loans are available in \$25 increments up to \$200. Anything above \$100 can be approved only for registration. Amounts of \$100 and under can be approved for other uses. These loans are due July 21, 1972, with interest at the rate of 6% per annum until paid.

# ROBERTS LEAVING

Eugene L. Roberts, former Director of Admissions of the University of South Florida, and now Director of Admissions & Records of the University of South Florida, St. Petersburg Campus, resigned effective June 1, 1972.

Roberts, who has spent eighteen years in the education profession, is leaving the University to enter private business and politics.

He first came to the University in 1965 as Admissions Counselor, and in 1967 was named Director of Admissions. In 1970 he left the Tampa Campus to go to St. Petersburg to organize and set up an Admissions and Records Office.

Roberts, who served on a number of statewide committees for higher education, was instrumental in bringing about the one application for all Universities. He is also a member of the Florida Association of Registrars and Admissions Officers, a member of AACRO, Past President of School Relations Committee, has served in a number of civic activities, Past President of Citrus Center Kiwanis Club, charter member of the YMCA, charter member of Halfway House in Polk County.

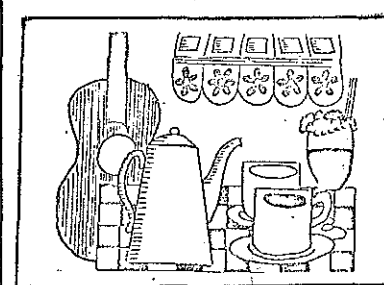
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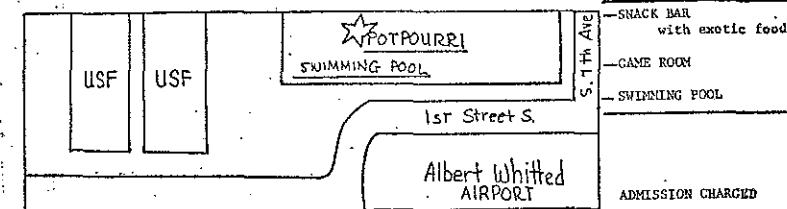
