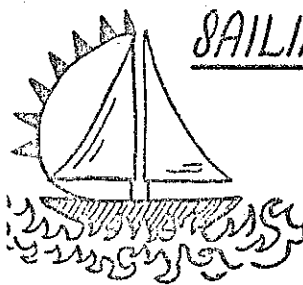

## STUDENT AFFAIRS COMMITTEE MEETING

July 7, 1972

NOT OFFICIALLY APPROVED

The meeting was called to order at 10:00 a.m.

Tom Ford asked if sailing is a function of the school and W. Hoffmann replied that it is.

Prof. W. Bridges questioned the number of hours the Dockmaster Rick Harts works and who monitors his hours. W. Hoffmann replied that Sue Lutton, the Intern, is responsible for this. Prof. Bridges then suggested that the boat needs repairs and Sudy Tschiderer stated that Rick Hart is making an inventory of materials needed.

Lou Kubler questioned if the Sailing Club is going to let Rick Hart do all the work. W. Hoffmann replied that if Rick Hart does it he will be responsible to W. Hoffmann.

Tom Ford questioned how often the boats are being used and W. Hoffmann said "every day."

W. Hoffmann mentioned that it is possible that we can earn more than the \$61,000, depending upon the number of students and hours taken at St. Petersburg Campus. He also stated that we had \$4,000 of C.W.S.P. money, but that it has been difficult to find students who qualify for C.W.S.P.

W. Hoffmann asked for an area report from H. Brames. Mr. Brames said that the progress on the auditorium is self-evident; that it will be ready in all probability by next week, but that the carpet will not be installed for another two weeks, and the new screen will not be in until September. Mr. Brames further reported that he hopes by July 15 to put together enough money to renovate additional class rooms in the north-west wing of B Building; and that there are plans to do some work in the library - central air and heat for the library, plus four small rooms: one to be a conference-type room, another for small groups to sit down in the library and use materials available that cannot be taken out, one room to be used for machines, i.e., typewriters and calculators, and a room for microfilm storage. Effective in September any student on this campus will have 24 hour access to any book on the Tampa campus, by requesting the microfilm. Mr. Brames also said that requests had been made of the State Roads Dept. and the City of St. Petersburg to install signs to direct people to this campus.

L. Kubler suggested that the efficient use of the snack bar requires a different system, that people stand in a long line to get just a beverage - waiting behind several who are waiting for a hamburger which has to be cooked. Mr. Brames suggested that signs could be put up to better direct the traffic at the snack bar at busy times.

J. Wilhite inquired about the availability of First Aid Kits and W. Hoffmann said that L. Kubler had initiated efforts to get three kits and W. Hoffmann had followed it up a week ago. It will be taken care of. Sudy Tschiderer said that Al Garrison of Physical Plant had suggested that possibly a small room now used as a storage room could be converted into a First Aid Room.

W. Hoffmann stated that this was the last meeting until Quarter I and that the next Student Affairs Committee meeting will be with the newly elected students and newly appointed faculty representatives and he hoped there would be volunteers.

At 10:55 a.m. upon motion to adjourn, the meeting was adjourned.
