San Adams' COM 330 class was given a VOLUNTARY guided tour last Wednesday evening through St. Petersburg's Police Station by Policeman O. Murphy and police beat reporter Mike Fleischer of the TIMES.

The eight students met, as usual at the EVENING INDEPENDENT newsroom, and then whizzed to the station to view the facilities of St. Pete's law enforcers, including the new communications offices, booking area, and filing department.

Fleischer gave some insights from the reporter's view as to what news resources were available via the police department.

When asked about the "prime times" for crime, Murphy indicated that December, 6-11 p.m., in hot weather, a full moon, are times when a noticeable increase in the general crime rate occurs.

The students found the tour informative, but some stated that the station seemed cramped and quite warm, indicating that perhaps better working conditions should be provided for city police.

REVIEWING THE SITUATION

RECORDINGS

NEW MORNING is Bob Dylan's latest record and is another step in his musical evolution. Since Dylan's recovery from his motorcycle accident, his recordings have returned to a more folk oriented sound, but each display also has shown other themes outside of the folk idiom. Musically, the songs on NEW MORNING are heavily influenced by Negro traditions (gospel, blues, jazz) and by contemporary popular melodies. While the lyrics are primarily concerned with the basic emotions, thoughts, and desires commonly associated with folk music.

Despite the many styles of music employed by Dylan, he has remained essentially a balladeer throughout his career. His genius stems from an ability to convey feelings in a musical novelty and lyrical sense rather than through a complex tonal arrangement. On NEW MORNING, this synthesis of influence and personality at which Dylan is a master is exemplified in "Sign on the Window". The verse section of the song is simple, with only a piano accompaniment to the vocal, but the refrain builds with traditional gospel clarity of feeling. Lyrically, the song reveals a maturity in Dylan and an identification with the universal values of man rather than the aspiration of his own generation. In much of his earlier works, Dylan mocked the older generation and took pride in the uniqueness of his own. In "Sign in the Window" the sentiments expressed are a realization of humanistic life.

The style throughout the rest of the album varies. Two songs "If Dogs Run Free" and "One More Weekend" draw heavily from Negro blues. The vocal on the former is slow and accentuated, sounding more like a poetry reading, and is a balanced contrast to the freewheeling blues/jazz of the music. "One More Weekend" is close to country style and is reminiscent of early Paul Butterfield music.

Dylan has a tremendous ability to assimilate current musical trends into his own creations. "The Man in Me" is a spiritual brother to the songs on Paul McCartney's album McCARTNEY, expressing the light and uncomplicated happiness of true romantic love.

NEW MORNING is a beautiful album, simple, human and honest. And such honesty in a time characterized by so much falsity, does, in itself, make the album totally worthwhile.
