Nixon swamps McGovern

WASHINGTON (UPI)—President Nixon, the classic political "loser" just a decade ago, defeated George S. McGovern for re-election last night by demolishing the old Democratic coalition and heading for an apparent landslide victory of historic dimensions.

In accepting victory, Nixon said, "We are moving swiftly toward that great goal (peace). We are on the eve of what could be the greatest generation of peace ever known."

Moments earlier McGovern conceded. "We will shed no tears because all this effort, I am positive, will bear fruit for years to come. I want every

single one of you to remember and never forget....if we brought this country one day closer to peace, every moment in this entire campaign was worth it," he said.

Nixon surpassed the required 270 electoral votes for the triumph of his long and stormy political career at 9:25 p.m. EST when he won Maryland's 10 votes.

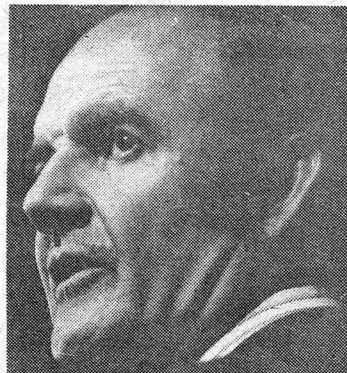
At that point, his Democratic challenger still had won only the three electoral votes from the predominantly black District of Columbia. Nixon maintained a 2-1 margin over the hapless McGovern throughout the early evening.

Nixon soaked up blue collar

and suburban support in the populous industrial states of the North and Middle West. And he gave the Republican party its first sweep of the South since Reconstruction, winning even

an Arkansas which had eluded the GOP's grasp throughout the modern era.

With 18 per cent of all the nation's precincts reporting, the unofficial vote was:

Nixon-9,541,236-65 per cent.

McGovern-4,963,982-34 per cent.

Schmitz-166,149-1 per cent. But while Nixon piled up GOP victories in states unmatched since Dwight D. Eisenhower's glory years, his coattails apparently proved too thin to give Republicans control of the 93rd Congress. The GOP was headed for some gains in the Senate, but not enough for the net pickup of five seats needed for control.

By mid-evening, Nixon had taken Maryland, West Virginia, Texas and Pennsylvania all of which had not gone Republican since Eisenhower won his second term over Adlai E. Stevenson in 1956.

West Virginia was one of only two states-the other was Massachusetts-which Nixon's campaign managers figured he might lose in their predicted landslide.

Nixon's campaign director, Clark MacGregor, predicted the President would break Lyndon B. Johnson's 1964 record of capturing 61.1 per cent of the total national popular vote.

There were indications that Nixon might also approach-if not exceed-the modern-day record of 523 electoral votes captured by Franklin D. Roosevelt in his famous 1936 landslide over Republican Alf Landon.

Fifth sexual assault reported

A 19-year old woman raped Monday brings to five the number of sexual assaults around the USF area reported to police within a month.

The woman, raped after she hitched a ride with a stranger from a lounge near USF, told officers she met the man at the lounge, he drove her to a deserted area and raped her, police report.

Two attempted rapes and three rapes near here have been reported since Oct. 1. Also, over the weekend, a woman was raped near Clearwater and a woman, 48, was raped in the Seminole Heights section of Tampa.

Police attitudes on the assaults varied with different departments.

"I guess they (the rapists) are

horny," said Sgt. Ralph J. Mills, Tampa Police Dept. Detective division, when asked yesterday about motivation of the rapists.

When asked what prevention methods could be taken to prevent rape, Mills replied, "They (the women) should keep their legs together."

Mills said he believed there was no increase in the number of rapes in the Tampa area.

"We get reports of maybe 3, 4 or 5 a month," he said, adding that this number has held steady for over a year.

Capt. S. E. Ezzell, also a Tampa policeman, attributes the rape rash to women "getting picked up...asking for it."

"It's their 'don't-care' attitude; they're out asking for it," he said. "Most of them invite that kind of thing."

Jack Prehle, University

Police chief, said to prove rape, a pathologist need only prove penetration.

"If you are assaulted," he said, "Mark him up. Scratch him so we can identify him."

He said he thinks women are more aware of potentially dangerous situations since the USF woman was found murdered and raped early in October.

According to Lt. James Miller, member of the Hillsborough County Sheriff Department, nine of ten of sex complaints on the national average are not valid because of circumstances.

"People scream rape after they get themselves in a tight situation," Miller said, adding probably half or more sexual assaults are never reported.

"And eight out of ten reported can't go to court because of fear, force or the

other elements of rape can't be proved," he said.

"The increase of crimes reported in your area," Miller said, "is that people are becoming aware and concerned."

Miller emphasized that women should not hitchhike.

"That's been the cause of several of the assaults," he said. "Also, women walking alone at night is very dangerous."

"These kind of people (rapists) have lots of hang-ups," Miller warned. They get kicks from any number of things.

Rapists said more prone to aggression

Susan Ross of the Rape Crisis Center in Washington D.C. told a group of about 40 women at the Women's Center last night that "men who believe in the double standard and virginity are the most prone to commit rape."

She said the only difference between a rapist and a "normal" person is that he is more prone to aggression and violence.

She said if a woman has been raped she should call the police, then call a friend to wait with her. She should not take a bath because "that destroys evidence."

The woman cannot prosecute for rape unless she indicated at the "crucial moment" that she did not desire intercourse, said Ross, and she must also be able to prove penetration.

H. Allen Wood, Tampa Police Department detective, said a woman's best action is "to take one finger and go for an eye."

He said to fight the impulse to resist, as this will surprise the attacker. Do not try to kick the testicles, Wood said, because they are not usually in a vulnerable position.

He said the rapist is not interested in a particular woman, he's looking for any female.

Ross concluded, "The only way women are going to be able to be free to do what they want is to change the whole nature of man. Until then the best thing is to learn self-defense."

Phys. Ed home in question

Student members on the Physical Education task force said yesterday they fear the death of elective physical education courses and the decline of intramurals.

The task force, appointed by Vice Pres. for Academic Affairs Carl Riggs to study the future of Physical Education, will meet today in an attempt to finalize their recommendations.

Students Debbie Norton and David Olsen both said any move to place physical education in the College of Education or under Student Affairs would cause a general decline in the PE program.

Based on a memo dated Nov. 2 from J.C. Dickinson, acting dean of the College of Education, Olsen fears the present staff would be partially dissolved.

Dickinson said education is reluctant to incorporate the Physical Education Program for fear of stifling development of experimental education programs.

Ben Johnson, SG secretary for Academic Affairs, said that as priorities shift, the PE staff will be cut, but how much had not been determined.

The quality of the PE staff is also of major concern to Olsen and Norton if Physical Education is placed under Student Affairs. Norton stated that the staff would not be granted academic rank or

tenure because they would not be within a college.

"Any new staff member would be hired through career placement. They wouldn't really be professionals," said Olsen. He also cautioned this would not affect Professional Physical Education which is located in the College of Education and is concerned with educating physical education teachers.

Should the Physical Education Program be placed under Student Affairs, Norton sees a trend toward intercollegiate activities at the expense of elective courses.

"Students want to maintain electives but the Administration is not taking this into account," stated

The wife of Rep. Nick Begich, D-Alaska, missing with Boggs, arrived last night

to campaign for her husband. She was greeted by 20 supporters some of whom wept as they hugged her.

U.S. jet disappears

SAIGON (UPI)-Another \$15-million U.S. Air Force F111 jet disappeared over North Vietnam yesterday and its two crewmen were reported missing. Ground and air fighting elsewhere in Indochina was markedly light on U.S. election day with no major Communist attacks.

War protest still on

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-The National Coordinator for the Student Mobilization Committee said yesterday he'd like to turn mass anti-war demonstrations Nov. 18 into a "mass celebration" for the end of hostilities in Vietnam.

But Fred Lovtreen, 22, New York City, said during a visit to the campus of Florida State University that the peaceful mass marches in 20 cities, including Atlanta, will go forward unless there is a complete pullout of U.S. troops and involvement.

State Prisons 'Jammed'

TALLAHASSEE (UPI)-Florida's prisons are so jammed that the state plans to lease an old motel to handle some of the overflow, and the parole commission is being urged to turn loose more inmates that are safe risks.

The prison population reached an all-time record Oct. 31 of 10,293 inmates, which is about 1,800 over capacity.

Guilty: Slavery Charge

JACKSONVILLE (UPI)-A Pomona Park migrant farm operator pleaded guilty yesterday to one count of a seven-count indictment charging him with keeping farm workers as slaves.

Willie Charles Simmons, 30, was charged with placing his workers in involuntary servitude in the indictment returned in June. He pleaded guilty to one count charging he kept James Owen Lairy as a

slave and the government said six other similar charges involving other workers would be dropped.

The Government charged the men picked up penniless persons, put them to work picking fruit and vegetables

and kept them in debt so they could not leave the farm.

Lansky Surrenders

MIAMI (UPI)-Meyer Lansky, the aging reputed financial wizard of the Mafia's gambling empire, flew to six nations seeking asylum from U.S. prosecutors, but when all closed their doors to him he surrendered quietly here yesterday to the flash of FBI badges.

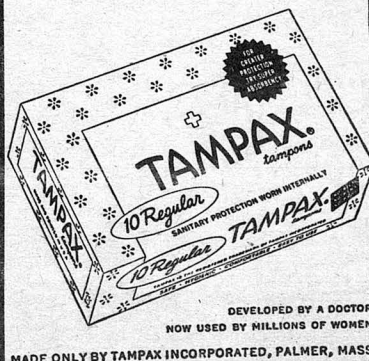

According to Deer

USF officials stifle communication

Dr. Irving Deer, president of the local chapter of American Federation of Teachers (AFT), complained Tuesday

that he does not have access to University officials to discuss problems related to University's grievance procedures.

In a letter dated Aug. 2, Deer inquired as to whether he could discuss the matter with Dr. Carl Riggs, vice president for Academic Affairs.

Deer received a reply from Larry Robinson, USF general counsel, stating that this would be impossible since University officials cannot engage in collective bargaining.

Robinson that any discussion with AFT members constitutes collective bargaining, which is prohibited by current state policy.

"We can't deal with them (AFT) unless they just want to come in to talk about ball scores," Robinson said.

The situation is really very vague when applied to public employes, Robinson said. He said it made no difference whether an AFT member wanted to talk about collective bargaining or about something like procedures, it's all collective bargaining.

"I didn't want to talk about collective bargaining, just about procedures," Deer said.

"The Administration keeps talking about communication with the faculty and about not wanting legalistic barriers, but fall back on legalism to stifle communication," he concluded.

The legalism to which Deer refers is an apparent attitude by

Royalties committee picked

Faculty Senate Pres. Dr. Jesse Binford yesterday announced the names of those serving on the newly-formed committee to review University policies on faculty royalties.

Binford said Dr. Graham Solomons, associate professor of chemistry, Dr. G. Hartley Mellish, associate professor of economics, and Richard Taylor, assistant professor of philosophy will serve, along with a student yet to be named. Questions concerning

policies on royalty are vague and need updating. He said the current regulation was written in 1964.

"Faculty members should be more conscious of the students' economic situation," Binford said.

Binford said the committee will examine policies and regulations to check fairness to both faculty and students, but will not investigate specific faculty members currently publishing.

"We are not going on a witch hunt," Binford said, "because we don't feel there are widespread violations."

"We are very sensitive to student feelings," Binford said.

Norton. "Because of student interest we are trying to find a place for the program where it will survive, stated Olsen.

To insure survival of the program the student Task Force members recommend physical education be allowed to remain an autonomous unit titled the "Division of Physical Education and Developmental Awareness," Olsen said in order to provide

academic rank and tenure for staff members, the staff could be incorporated into an existing college without affecting the independence of the new division.

"Essentially, the Physical Education Program would be operating in the same manner as it has been since the College of Basic Studies was dissolved if our plan is adopted," Olsen said.

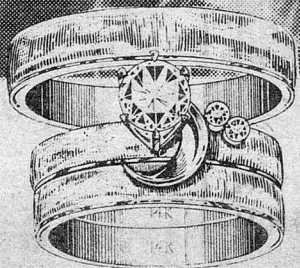

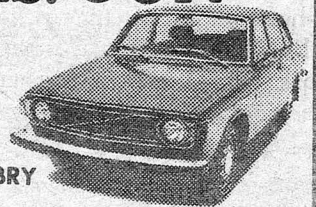

Planning solutions

Hillsborough County is one of the fastest growing regions in the entire country. And in case you hadn't noticed growth tends to cause a few problems.

Traffic control, land use, environment and community facilities are just a smattering of the vast number of problems facing us in the future.

The problems are complex and interrelated. If they are to be solved with any degree of success it is essential that careful long range planning be utilized. A little known organization, the Hillsborough County Planning Commission, is the chief planning group for the county and they would like your help.

The survey currently being conducted (by means of questionnaires) attempts to obtain some concrete data

about the nature of the kind of community people of Hillsborough County would like to live in. In the words of Barbara Taylor, a member of the Planning commission staff, the questionnaire helps to determine "what's on the minds of the citizens, what they perceive the problems to be."

Thus far response to the survey has been poor. It is a shame because the Planning Commission needs these opinions to establish priorities.

You need not answer all the questions. But the commission would like your opinions and comments about what you feel are the most serious problem areas of the future. Do you feel traffic congestion needs top priority? Or do you think problems related to land use and the types of business which will make up the area need urgent attention?

Whatever your feelings you should take a few minutes to look over the questionnaire on this page and send in some comments. The problems of growth aren't going to solve themselves.

Planning Questionnaire

The Planning Commission is in the process of formulating the 1990 Comprehensive Plan of Development for Hillsborough County.

We would like you to comment on any or all of these study areas. These comments may concern major problems you feel exist or are apt to emerge, or goals toward which the community should strive.

Please return this questionnaire to the Hillsborough County Planning Commission by Nov. 10. Your cooperation will be greatly appreciated.

Part I

Land Use and Urban Growth-This involves the geographic distribution of industrial, commercial, residential, agricultural, open space (recreation and conservation) and other uses of the land; the interrelationships between these uses; the location, timing, and coordination of urban growth; and controlling measures such as zoning and subdivision regulations.

Transportation-This pertains to the movement of people and goods. The overall network includes the street and highway system, pedestrian walkways, the public transit system, and the numerous motor freight, air, rail and port facilities.

Population-Topics to be covered here are population growth, geographic

distribution, density levels, and characteristics of the population.

Housing-This includes the availability, location, density, quality, and financing of housing, as well as the different types of housing (townhouses, condominiums, trailers, high rise apartment building, single family homes, etc.) and the quality of the neighborhoods in which the housing is located.

Environment-This segment of the Plan deals with air, water, noise and visual pollution; preservation of the ground water supply, ecologically sensitive areas, and endangered life forms; flood control; and the planning implications of geological and soils data.

Economy-Studies here discuss present and future characteristics of the labor force, types of employment, income levels, and costs of living.

Community Facilities and Utilities-Included here are schools, libraries and cultural facilities, parks and recreation areas and facilities, municipal buildings, health care facilities, law enforcement and fire protection facilities, sanitary and storm sewage systems, solid waste disposal facilities, power systems, and water supply systems.

Central Business District (CBD)-This study will examine the future functions of downtown Tampa

(cultural, financial, entertainment, governmental, retail, residential, etc.) and its role as the central hub of Hillsborough County.

Local Government-The major issues here are centered around the organization, responsiveness, and efficiency of local governmental units.

Community Involvement-This includes such things as interest and participation in local issues, pride in different aspects of the community, and support of local projects. This could be termed community spirit.

The Hillsborough County Planning Commission is currently conducting a survey to determine what is a desirable future for Hillsborough residents.

A questionnaire has been mailed to 6,500 Hillsborough residents as part of the Planning Commission's process for updating the 1990

Students who wish to comment on the areas included on the questionnaire may refer to the copy of the questionnaire on page 4, Taylor suggested. The return date for the questionnaire is Nov. 10 (address below).

The questionnaire asks for comments on the planning of land use and urban growth, transportation, population, housing, the environment, economy, community facilities and utilities, the Central Business District (Tampa), local government units and community involvement and spirit.

Taylor said the questionnaire is also designed "to inform them (Hillsborough residents) that we (the Planning Commission) exist and what we're doing."

A letter from Planning Commissioner Director John A. Crilip accompanying the questionnaire states the proposed solutions obtained from citizens "hopefully will

be implemented through the decision-making process of the government."

Taylor added that students are welcome to make use of

information in the office of the Planning Commission located in 401 Courthouse Annex, Tampa. Questionnaires should also be returned to this office.

'Clowns' drill Fellini skills

Federico Fellini's "The Clowns" is definitely a moderate exercise for the supple director, but no less nimbly executed than any of his better known films.

As a child, Fellini fell victim to a familiar ambivalence toward the grotesque masks and hideous distortions of form of circus clowns. Intrigued, he was also greatly frightened by their leering grimaces or bizarre grins.

The repulsive attraction they held for him as a child has perhaps survived the transitional period of many years, though exhibited with less of the childish horror in "The Clowns."

Originally produced as a 60 minute television documentary on the old clowns and their modern counterparts (if there are such), Fellini extended the film to 90-minutes and released it as a feature.

Fellini has split his study into a plunge into the Pierrots and the Augustos; the "white" clowns, or arrogant and gawdy wearers of white cone hats, and the scruffy brunts of every joke.

Dario Argento's

photography could be called innocent or perhaps conspicuous in the way that a child must view his dwarfing environment.

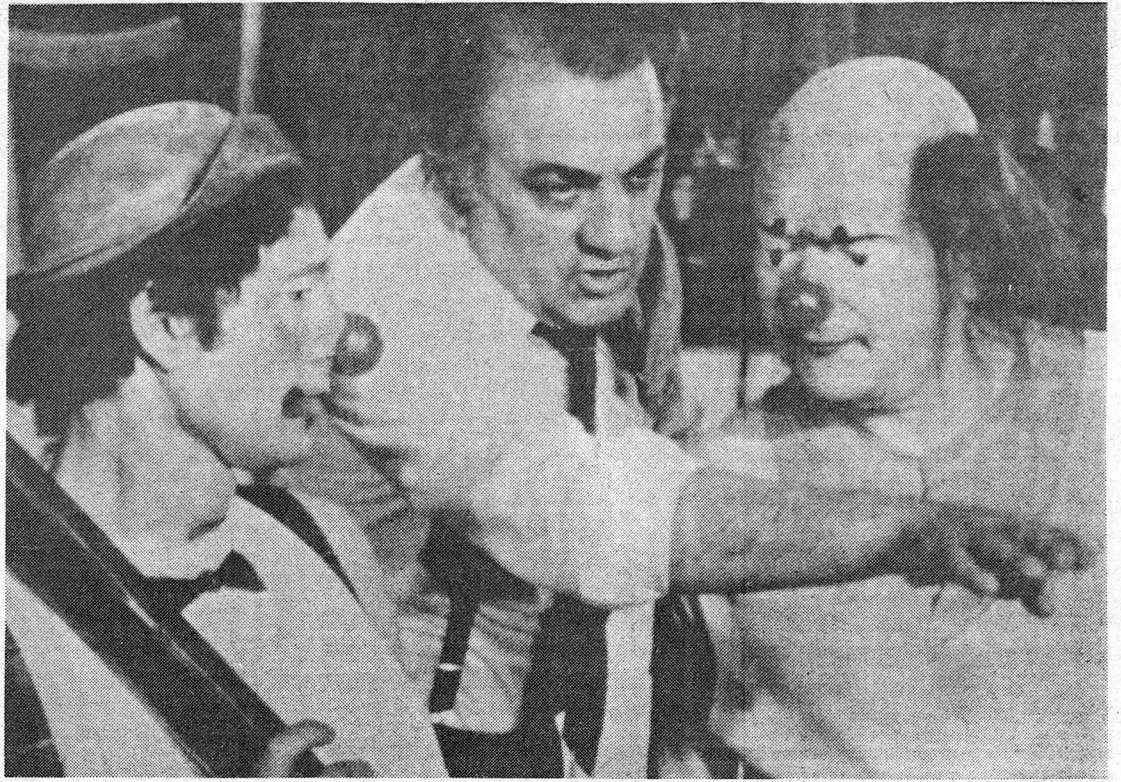
Neither of the two epithets arbitrarily attributed to clowns ("laughing on the outside, crying on the inside," or "always the comic") is exploited to any offensive degree-- Fellini effects the peculiar balance of a well-practiced cyclist in his tempering of those subjects.

"The Clowns" will be presented as a Film Art offering tonight and tomorrow night at 7, 9, and 11 in LAN 103. Admission is \$1.

The way it now looks, USF should be host to the 1972 College Division Southern Regional Soccer Play-offs.

"We haven't heard anything official," said Coach Dan Holcomb, "but we've got some feelers from the selection committee."

Holcomb was pretty sure

that his team would be rated the top college division team in the South when the official results come out today, thereby bringing the regional play-offs to Tampa for the first time.

University of Baltimore and Loyola of Baltimore should end up second and third respectively with Madison College of Harrisonburg, Va. fourth.

The way the play-offs are structured, the Brahms would entertain Madison sometime before Nov. 20 with Baltimore playing Loyola in Baltimore.

If USF survives its first contest, the Brahms would then host the winner of the Baltimore-Loyola game prior to Nov. 27.

Should USF win that game it would become the Southern champs and play the victor of the Pennsylvania-New Jersey-Delaware region.

After that the only thing standing between the Brahms and the college division title would be the top team from the New England, New York or Far Western regions and the winner in the Midwestern area.

Although the 6-3-1 Brahms don't own the best college division record in the South, its losses and tie have come against strong major

university schools. A total of just five goals spelled the difference in the Brahman defeats, with two of the games lost by scores of 1-0.

USF plays its biggest game of the year Saturday at 2 p.m. when it entertains Howard University here in its season finale.

Cyclers on road again with cross-country race

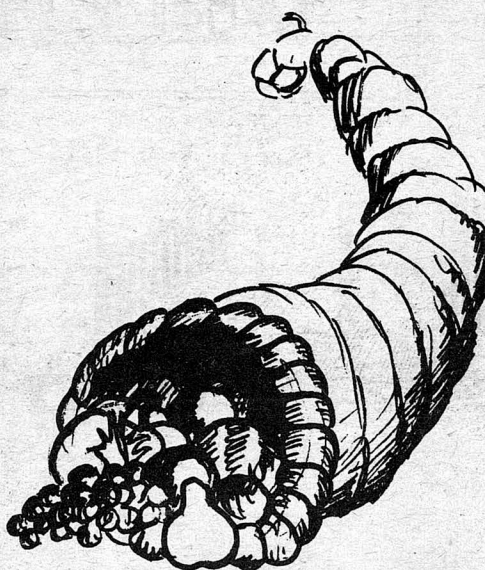

Florida delegation

Democratic rep's remain

MIAMI (UPI)—Democratic incumbents held all of their congressional seats yesterday and Democrats won two out of three new seats to keep a firm grip on Florida's delegation to Washington.

Florida's lineup in Congress will be 11 democrats and four republicans, only a one-seat gain for the GOP over the present 9-3 ratio. Population gains gave the state three new seats in Congress.

Among the Democratic winners was Bill Gunter, a state senator from Orlando, who filed a complaint with the Justice Department last week charging his opponent used "dishonest and illegal" tactics in distributing "McGovern-Gunter" posters in the district.

Gunter, 38, who defeated Republican Jack Insko of New Port Richey in the 5th district, will be one of the new faces in Congress.

Others are Democrat William Lehman, 58, a

millionaire businessman and former school board member from Miami, and Republican L.A. "Skip" Bafalis, 43, a former state senator from Palm Beach.

Lehman defeated Republican Paul Bethel, a free lance writer in the new 13th district, while Bafalis dashed the hopes of Democratic newcomer Bill Sikes of Clewiston in the re-mapped 10th district.

There were no upsets for incumbent congressmen, although Republican Miami Beach Attorney Ellis S. Rubin gave veteran Rep. Dante Fascell a scare in the 15th district. Three Republicans were re-elected.

Running unopposed were Democratic Reps. Bob Sikes of Crestview in the 1st district and Don Fuqua of Altha in the 2nd, and Republican Lou Frey Jr. of Winter Park in the 9th.

Following are the results of other congressional races:

3rd district--incumbent Democrat Charles E. Bennett of Jacksonville easily defeated Republican John F. Bowen, also of Jacksonville.

4th district--incumbent Democrat Bill Chappell of Ocala turned back a challenge from Republican P.T. "Bud" Fleuchaus of Daytona Beach.

5th district--incumbent Republican C.W. "Bill Young of St. Petersburg won by a

wide margin over Democrat Michael O. Plunkett of Clearwater.

7th district--incumbent Democrat Sam M. Gibbons of Tampa defeated Republican Robert A. "Bob" Carter of Tampa.

8th district--incumbent Democrat James A. Haley defeated Republican Roy Thompson Jr. Both are from Sarasota.
