## SG senate may challenge A&S budget veto

Student Government President John Goldsmith may receive support from the student senate tonight in his fight against the veto of a portion of the Activity and Service fee budget if he can convince senators that the veto was improper, according to a senate official.

During the quarter break, USF President John Lott Brown vetoed the funding for intercollegiate athletics. SG had funded the account by line item. Brown refunded the department in a lump sum.

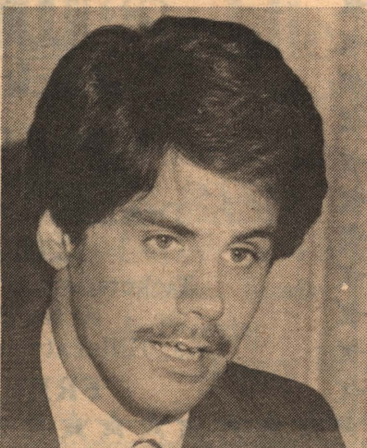
Goldsmith claims the veto is invalid because it occurred so long after the time the budget was first submitted to the administration.

"The veto is valid until proven otherwise. We have to see from John Goldsmith some sort of proof (that the veto is invalid),"

SG Senate President Peter Baronoff said.

He added that the senate is willing to cooperate with Goldsmith.

"We will, if necessary, pass emergency legislation (to support Goldsmith)," Baronoff said. At present, he said, SG could accept Brown's action or pursue legal action.



Brown has said actions Goldsmith chose to pursue during the quarter break left him with no alternative but to end the six-month negotiations over this year's A&S budget.

Goldsmith sought a legal opinion from the State Board of Education as to whether Brown had to approve the budget before it could go into effect. In an

opinion, Board of Education Deputy Counsel Judith Brechner wrote that the University president did not have to approve the budget, but if he chose to veto it, he would have to do so within a reasonable amount of time after the budget was submitted.

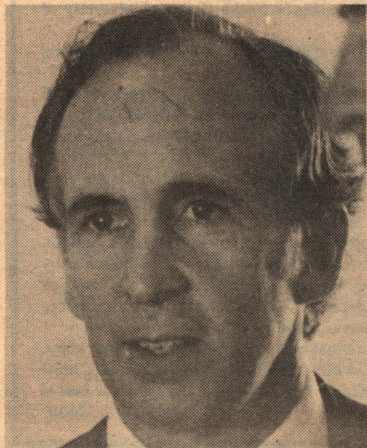
"It appears to me that a reasonable interpretation of this statute (for the A&S budget) is

that in the absence of a veto within a reasonable time, the budget is effective, since there is no statutory requirement for the president to approve the budget," Brechner wrote.

"What is reasonable time may vary in the circumstances. However, it would appear that a budget presented to the president in July, not vetoed by mid-December, could no longer be vetoed, especially if the University is issuing checks in payment of expenditures pursuant to the budget," Brechner stated.

USF lawyer Steve Wenzel said since several versions of the budget had been presented during the course of negotiations, the latest in November, Brown had vetoed the budget within a reasonable amount of time.

"President Brown did what he had to do," Baronoff said in light of the opinion.

# 104-18: UN rebukes Soviets for invasion

UNITED NATIONS — The General Assembly expressed overwhelming disapproval Monday night of the Soviet military intervention in Afghanistan. The vote on the resolution was 104-18 with 18 abstentions.

It was a stunning rebuke to the Soviet Union, which one week ago vetoed a similar resolution in the Security Council.

The General Assembly vote came after four days of debate at an emergency session called after the Soviets killed the Security Council action.

Lining up against the Soviets

were the vast majority of Moslem and Third World nations along with the Western allies.

The assembly vote meant 12 of the 152 members either were not present or did not participate. The resolution needed a two-thirds majority of those voting for adoption.

Speaker after speaker during the final session referred to the Soviet intervention as "naked aggression."

Moscow's allies repeated the Kremlin's claim that thousands of Soviet troops swept south into Afghanistan last month because that country's Marxist govern-

ment was threatened by "imperialism"

Soviet troops captured control of one of Afghanistan's two major highways and fighting throughout the Central Asian nation has slowed dramatically in the past few days, according to Western diplomatic sources in the capital of Kabul.

One Western informant in Kabul said fighting had stopped "almost everywhere." Others said it was continuing in the rugged, snow-covered mountains in northeastern Badakhshan Province, near the Soviet border, and in Paktia, southeast of Kabul

and near Pakistan, where Soviet troops reportedly were backed by missile-firing MiG warplanes and helicopter gunships.

The reports from Kabul could not be confirmed independently, but hundreds of Soviet army trucks that restocked occupation

forces met no resistance Monday as they rolled northward to the Soviet Union under a light guard. Associated Press correspondent Marcus Eliason accompanied the Soviet troops for the first 50 miles of their journey before he and other reporters were turned back.

## U.S. reporters expelled from Iran

TEHRAN, Iran — Iran's Revolutionary Council ordered the expulsion of all American reporters Monday because of what it called "biased reporting," and demanded that U.S. news organizations "immediately" close operations.

Earlier, Foreign Minister Sadegh Ghotbzadeh warned that some 50 American hostages might be held "more or less forever" if the United States refused to extradite the deposed shah. He also warned that other governments would "blur" their relations with oil-rich Iran if they went along with the United States in imposing sanctions.

Meanwhile, Islamic militants who have held the Americans hostage at the U.S. Embassy since Nov. 4 were quoted as saying spy trials will begin for the hostages as soon as revolutionary leader Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini gave the word. They also said

the hostages would be allowed to hear a recorded broadcast of the American Superbowl football game this Sunday.

"The foreign American journalists have been misusing our kind cooperation and freedom we have given them," said a statement from the council read by council spokesman Ali Akbar Moinefar, who is also Iran's oil minister. "They have used this against our revolution and we are going to expel all American correspondents effective immediately."

The 15-member Revolutionary Council debated and then approved the decision to expel the Americans during a three-hour meeting Monday night, after which Moinefar read the statement.

Moinefar, deputy spokesman of the council, said that for the time being, French, British and West German reporters were being allowed to remain.

### Florida bank forced to close

LAKE HELEN — Federal banking agents Monday closed accounts at a tiny Central Florida bank whose former executive officer was accused by a grand jury of embezzling nearly \$350,000 from its accounts.

The Bank of Lake Helen, a relatively small, state-chartered institution with \$3.3 million in deposits, was closed over the weekend on orders from State Comptroller Gerald Lewis, officials said.

It becomes only the sixth bank in Florida to be closed since 1934. Lewis' aide, Mark Ives, said in Tallahassee that the last bank closure in Florida was in 1967.

"General economic conditions were not the cause for this bank's problems," Ives said. "Conditions at the bank were the sole problems."

### Presley's doctor confronts media

MEMPHIS, Tenn. — Elvis Presley's former physician went before the Board of Medical Examiners on Monday to face malpractice charges with his lawyers charging the hearing had turned into a media event.

Indeed, before the board could begin hearing charges against Dr. George C. Nichopoulos, the presiding officer ordered 14 television cameras moved aside so the audience could see the proceedings in the Memphis City Council chamber.

Nichopoulos, who was Presley's physician for 11 years before the entertainer's death in 1977, is accused of indiscriminately prescribing a variety of addictive drugs for Presley and 15 other patients.

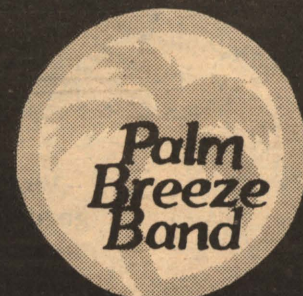
### Gilvin sentenced to death

BROOKSVILLE — A 26-year-old Kentuckian was sentenced to death Monday for beating a minister to death with a hammer — a crime the judge called "heinous and atrocious."

Hernando County Circuit Judge L.R. Huffstetler overruled the jury's recommendation of life in prison and sentenced Billy Howe Gilvin to die in Florida's electric chair. "God have mercy on your soul," the judge told Gilvin, who showed no emotion. Gilvin had said before the sentencing that he hoped to preach the Gospel if he were sentenced to prison instead of the electric chair.

Gilvin was convicted Saturday by a seven-man, five-woman jury in the slaying of the Rev. John Hunt, an Episcopalian vicar.

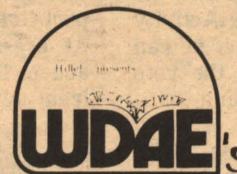

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# UF Iranian students unable to pay fees

GAINESVILLE, (AP) — Dozens of Iranian students at the University of Florida were unable to pay tuition on time and faced slim chances of arranging delayed payments, officials said Monday.

"All of the Iranian students here, or at least most, don't have any money to pay their fees with, except checks they can't get

American banks to honor," said Hugh Cunningham, assistant to UF President Dr. Robert Q. Marston.

A late fee of \$25 will be charged for students paying after Monday. And if tuition is not paid by Feb. 4 registration will be revoked.

Foreign students, veterans and students on federal aid programs

routinely are granted fee payment deferrals at the start of an academic term when they demonstrate the money will be forthcoming, Cunningham said. But many of the estimated 100 Iranians at the Gainesville campus faced the Monday fee payment deadline without acceptable forms of payment.

"In the past the Iranian

students have been given fee deferrals when it was known that they were going, indeed, to get the money," Cunningham said.

However, only checks drawn on one Iranian bank, the Bank of Melli, will be honored at the university under an arrangement with the U.S. Treasury Department.

"Others have their checks on other banks but we are not giving deferrals to these students simply because of the uncertainty of whether or not their funds will be forthcoming," he said.

Meanwhile, officials for the State University System headquarters in Tallahassee said the eight other tax-supported institutions had not reported any problems with Iranians unable to pay fees on time.

## FAMU students to march on capitol

TALLAHASSEE — Florida A&M University students, angry that Congress again failed to make Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday a national holiday, will march to the Florida Capitol today, a student spokesman said Monday.

"We feel that Martin Luther King Jr.'s birthday is a major

holiday," a group of students said in a statement to the press. "This drum major for justice deserves the honor that Abraham Lincoln and George Washington are given, if not more," the group, called Concerned Students for Social Welfare, said.

Almost every year since April 1968 when King was assassinated there have been attempts in Congress to pass bills observing the civil rights leader's birthday

on Jan. 15. This year's effort failed in the House in December after opponents argued against creating another mid-week holiday.

King's admirers at the predominantly black FAMU plan a morning rally on campus with speeches by students and black commentator Roy Wood. They will march to the Capitol at about 12:30 p.m.

FAMU, with an 18 percent white enrollment out of about 6,000 students, has the largest black enrollment in the state. About 30 percent of the faculty is white.

"Our goal is to try to get people to see that King's birthday is important not only to the black race — but to everybody," said FAMU senior Isadore Bowers. "He made people see that organizing is important to individuals," Bowers said.

## Tampan refuses extradition

TAMPA, Fla. (AP) — A 24-year-old man charged with the Dec. 14 murder of a New Jersey police officer refused Monday to waive extradition from Florida.

James Boatwright, charged in New Jersey with fatally shooting Hillside, N.J., police officer J. Anthony Lordi, told a U.S. magistrate he is afraid to return to New Jersey.

"I wouldn't like to go back because I'm in fear of my life," Boatwright told U.S. Magistrate Thomas Wilson.

A hearing will be held later this week in Hillsborough Circuit Court to determine whether Boatwright will be extradited, the sheriff's department said.

Robert Mello, a Union County (N.J.) prosecutor, said Boatwright also faces charges in

Newark stemming from two other killings.

Mello said Boatwright apparently fled to Florida after the three killings. He was traced to his mother's home in Bradenton on Thursday and was arrested there by the FBI on Friday.

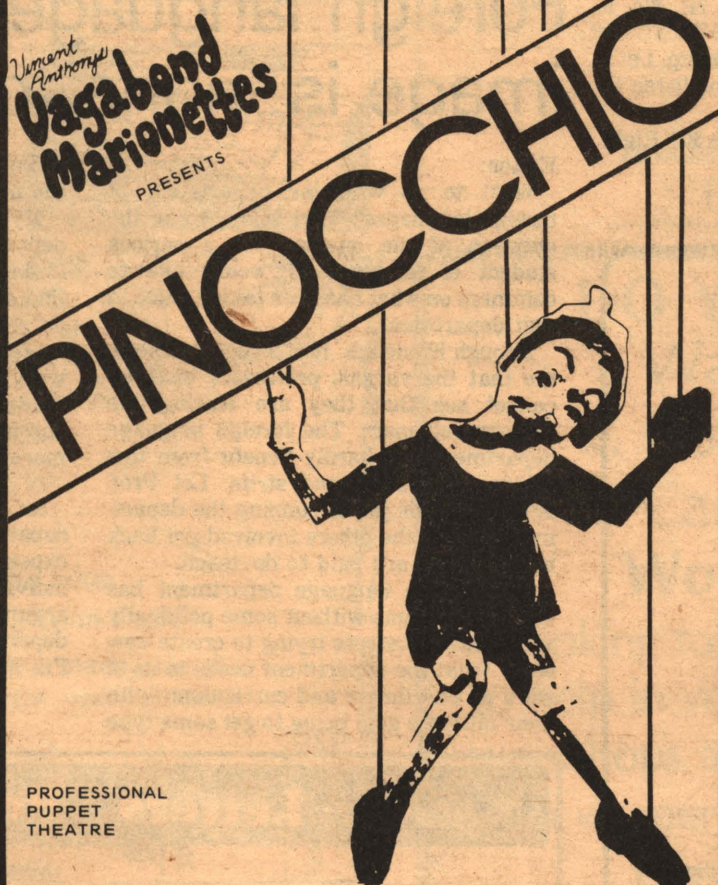

## Making it tougher for the student

Right now we pay approximately 20 percent of the overall cost of our education, while the other 80 percent comes from state funds. But we are, in a sense, paying that other 80 percent as well, since it is derived from our tax dollars.

The new State University System budget proposal being discussed by a consultant team seeks to keep the relative percentages the same so that the students and the state will maintain the support of their respective shares of the total cost. For the next five years, student tuition and fees would increase at the same rate as state appropriations.

Bert Hartley, vice president of finance and planning at USF, said he does not know why this is necessary.

We don't either.

If the increase of the budget funds is found to be enough to

cover inflationary costs, why should it already be demanded in law that student tuition costs must rise accordingly each year?

Richard Merrick, a former official from the Florida Department of Education, said last spring, "We have more than enough money in the budget... They're sitting on a \$500-million surplus; they don't have to increase tuition."

Yet Florida universities have the second highest tuition in the Southeast, according to Board of Regents Chancellor E.T. York.

York said, "Undergraduate fees are 60 percent higher than the University of North Carolina and 110 percent higher than the University of Texas, two institutions with very high-quality programs."

"While Florida is ninth in the nation for total wealth, it is 47th in its total commitment to higher education," student Regent John

Goldsmith said. That is a sad commentary on Florida's lack of concern for the quality of public higher education. Not only that, but the Legislature passed a bill last spring providing Florida private higher-education institutions with \$750 for each Florida student enrolled at a private college. The consultant team now recommends increasing the public university tuition. We thought the public system was supposed to be government funded.

While it is true that inflation increases the cost of education to the University, it is also true that it increases the burden on students to pay even a stable tuition, much less a tuition that will increase yearly. We think this would most drastically affect the student from a middle-class family or the self-supporting student. The proposal emphasizes the increased availability of grants and scholarships, but this is for the student from a low-income family. Those from high-

income families will not be affected much by a possible 8-12 percent yearly increase. It will be the student from the middle-class family who is forced to postpone his education or work doubly hard to meet the increasing cost. This would be unnecessary if the surplus Merrick said exists was utilized to support the State University System.

Finally, the proposed super-board would just be one more tax-eater to be added to an already overcrowded bureaucracy. The Board of Regents, according to Tampa Regent Terrell Sessums, has the overwhelming support of Florida's citizens both inside and outside of educational circles. The super-board would put one more barrier between the faculty and the control of programs that the faculty would like to achieve. Since the professors teach the courses, they should have the right to select and organize the appropriate materials for those courses.

Dear Editor:

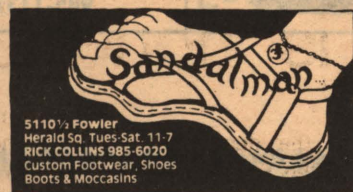
Having read in the Miami Herald that Prof. John "Knocky" Parker is being investigated, I am compelled to write in defense of him.

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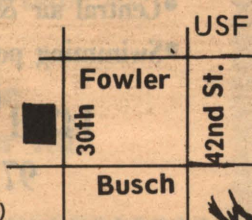
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# Political pressure influences grant aid

WASHINGTON, D.C. — A U.S. Senate probe has shown that political pressure still plays a large role in determining which colleges are eligible for federal aid to "developing" institutions.

A Senate judiciary subcommittee has revealed at least 200 incidents of efforts by members of Congress to persuade, Health, Education and Welfare officials to award grants to colleges in their districts. The probe also revealed 175 cases in

which staff recommendations for grants were overruled by program administrators without explanation.

An amendment which would

eliminate much of the administrators' discretion in awarding the grants and make the entire process more public has been attached to the House

version of a bill to continue the aid program. In fiscal 1979, the federal government awarded \$110 million in grants to about 400 colleges.

Administrators of the aid program say the problems uncovered in the probe were originally discussed in a General Accounting Office report a year ago, and have been rectified by new regulations, but the sponsor of the House amendment says the problems have not been solved and legislation is needed.

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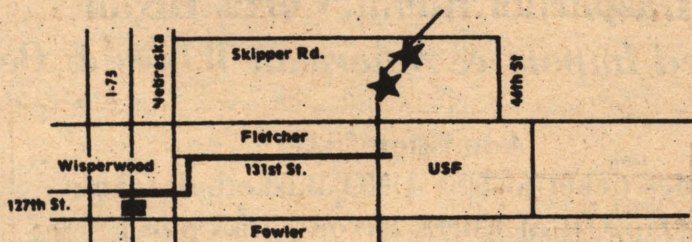
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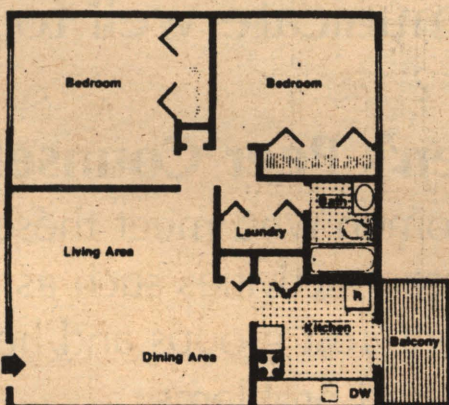

I.E. Nickols says the university could be liable if a student was injured by one of the frisbees frequently tossed around the Cassell Coliseum during VPI games. He is therefore considering working with the student

affairs office and resident advisers to find students willing to quietly police their peers.

It is otherwise virtually impossible to identify frisbee-throwing students in a large crowd, Nickols says.

\*\*\*

LOS ANGELES, Calif. — An outdoor clarinetist attracted quite a bit of attention at the

University of Southern California recently, but it wasn't his music that drew the crowd.

The male student was playing his clarinet atop a campus building, unaware that an anonymous tipster had informed the Los Angeles Police Department that a man with a rifle had been spotted on a USC rooftop. The LAPD dispatched a helicopter, and the University Security office also launched a search, but they succeeded only

in drawing a crowd, to the area before deciding the sniper report was a hoax.

The false report could have had more serious consequences, the campus security chief admitted.

"What if officers hadn't been able to tell the student was just playing a clarinet?" he wondered.

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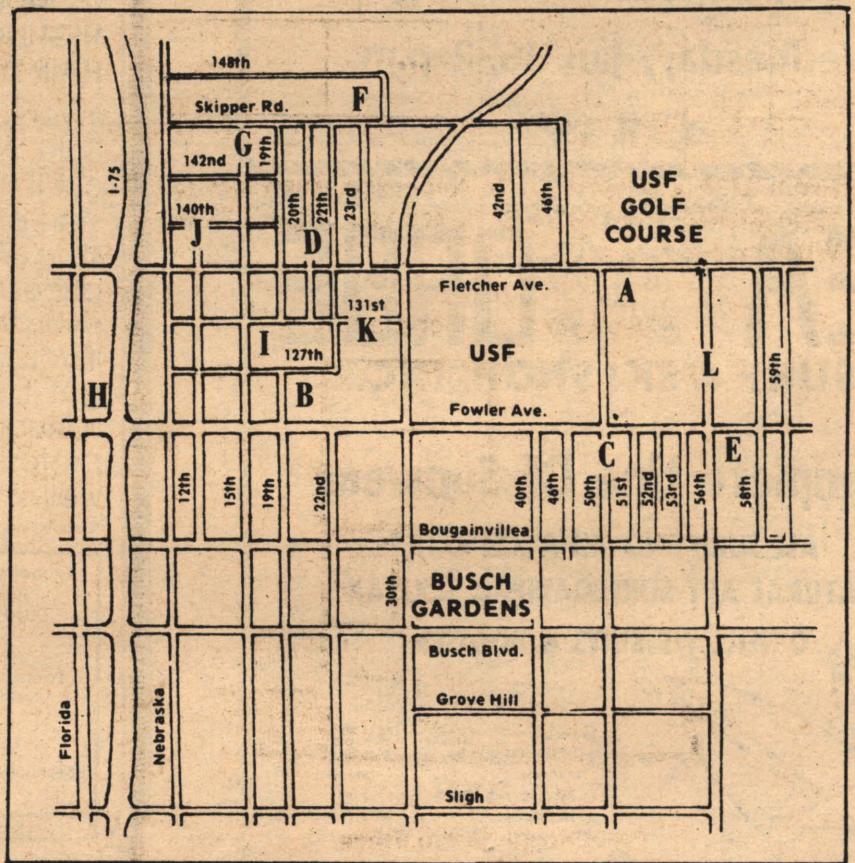
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## Peaches and Herb are not '2 Hot' on 'Twice the Fire'

### "Twice the Fire" Peaches and Herb (Polydor)

By way of mutual agreement, the original Peaches and Herb, after completing a successful reign in the '60s, decided to go their separate ways.

Herb Feemster went on to become a Washington, D.C. policeman in 1971, which he remained until last year when he teamed up with Linda Green to record the highly successful "2 Hot!" LP. (Remember "Reunited," the song that saved soul music?)

It would be unfair to compare their latest, "Twice the Fire," to their previous platinum platter because of the simple fact that it's just not as good.

There are many more electronic effects in this album than in their last, which seems to have a detrimental effect on the group's pure vocals.

On "Roller Skatin' Mate" and

"Howzabout Some Love," the lyrics don't help, either; synthesizers abound in "Roller Skatin' Mate" and seem to put the duo's voices in a corner where they should not be. The chorus of the tune exemplifies the overall juvenile lyrics of many of the album's songs:

"Gee, I'd like to be your roller skatin' mate;  
I can see us gettin' down on a roller skatin' date."

The best songs on the album are those without heavy-duty accompaniment. "I Pledge My Love" is an enchanting ballad that has a good chance of doing well on the pop and soul charts. "Love Lift" reminds one of a duet with Jerry Butler and Betty Everett in the '60s. "(I Want Us) Back Together" almost compensates for the cadaver-like melodies of "Gypsy Lady," thanks to its optimistic tempo and overall class.

Nonetheless, there are noticeable faults with the album. It's sad to note that these flaws are due to the producer, Freddie Perren, not to P and H (he and Dino Fekaris of "I Will Survive" co-wrote all of the songs). Many of the album's lyrics are unimaginative; some of them leave you with an "I can do that!" feeling. Indeed, you could. You could probably do it better.

"Twice the Fire" should gross enough to keep P and H living high on the hog, but it is far from being an album of outstanding quality. It's like cooking fried chicken in a cheaper shortening instead of in Crisco.

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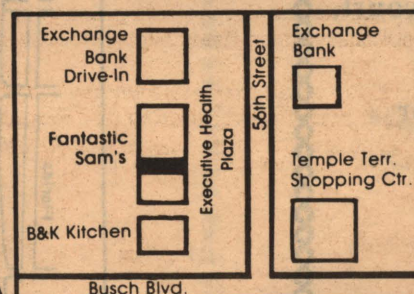
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Coming at you

KINGSTON, R.I. — The University of Rhode Island student senate has strongly denounced a call for the URI president's resignation by a university maintenance workers' union.

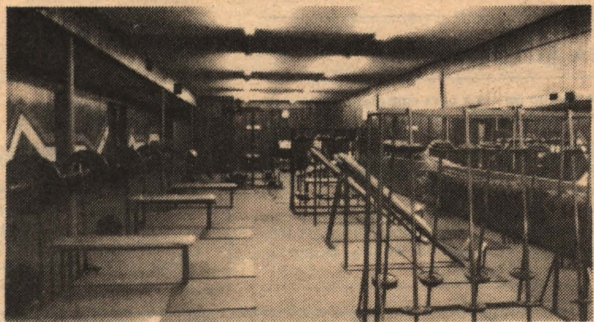
The students praised URI President Frank Newman for showing "consistent concern for the students' input into almost all University affairs" and said students have suffered enough from disruptive labor disputes this year. URI classes were halted for 13 days in September because of a faculty strike.

"It is time the University stops running for the unions and starts running for the students," said

one senator during debate on the resolution.

The maintenance union workers circulated a petition calling for Newman's resignation, saying he had failed to address internal problems of the university. The workers also staged a protest in Newman's office after a union member was suspended without pay for 10 days for allegedly using "gutter" language to a supervisor.

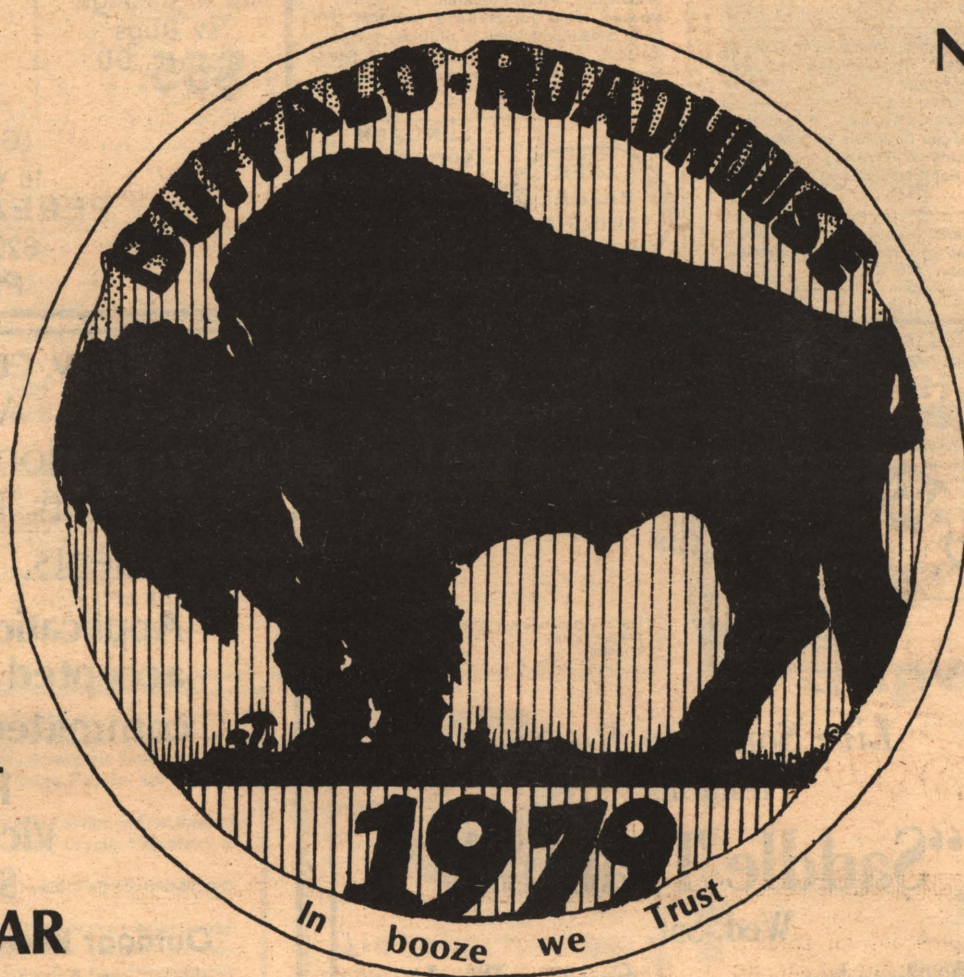
