## DON'T WANT A CHANGE.

The tobacco interest, as a whole, does not want any change in the internal revenue law or system. Nevertheless, its representatives must be up and doing if they would avert having a radical change forced upon them.

## SUMATRA ADVANCED IN PRICE.

One of our most reliable correspondents in Holland, referring under date of October 26 to Sumatra tobacco, says: "The last sale of Sumatra for this year has taken place here. Generally speaking, very little fine, dark Sumatra, adapted to the United States, was on the market, and for the little that was offered, the asking prices were so enormously high, that nothing was obtained at first hands under 200 cents, equal to 80 cents U. S. money, per pound. Dark seconds, especially liked in America, brought from 20 to 30 per cent. more than the brokers' highest valuation. The consequence of this situation will be to compel buyers to advance their views considerably, if they hope to secure any of the fine, dark parcels now available."

## P. LORILLARD & CO.'S TIN-TAG SUITS.

The suit brought against Dohan, Carroll & Co., of Philadelphia, as agents of James B. Pace & Co., of Richmond, Va., for using tin-tags, by P. Lorillard & Co., of this city, has been decided in favor of the plaintiffs. The suit was brought before Judge Wheeler of the Southern District of New York, and was thoroughly argued and ably defended by Mr. Boyd, of St. Louis, in behalf of the defendants, and by Mr. Livingston Gifford, of Gifford & Gifford, counsel for plaintiffs. During the trial of this case all the proofs submitted in former cases were carefully gone over by the respective counsel engaged. A great deal of new testimony was introduced, and the general details were more thoroughly examined and reviewed by the learned judge than they had been on former occasions. This decision disposes of and sets aside the adverse decision in the case of P. Lorillard & Co. against Ridgeway, where the Court held that the tin-tag patent was void by reason of prior use. In the present case Judge Wheeler decides that the patent was not antedated by reason of tin fastenings having been used as clamps on sweat bands, corks for bottles, and analogous devices. "Neither," adds the judge, "has it been shown that any manufacturer of tobacco had ever used tin-tags or other metallic substances of any kind for labelling plug tobacco prior to the use of P. Lorillard & Co.'s tin-tag patents."

We hope to lay before our readers the full text of Judge Wheeler's decision in our next issue.

As an addendum to the above, we may state that P. Lorillard & Co. have entered suit against the firm of H. Ellis, of Baltimore, in the United States Circuit Court of that district, for selling plug tobacco bearing a red tin tag, which tag, as used, is claimed by P. Lorillard & Co. to be an imitation and counterfeit of the tag used on their "Climax" brands. We understand that it is the intention of P. Lorillard & Co. to bring similar suits against all parties accused of infringing their various brands and trade-marks.

## THE ARGUMENT THAT MAY BE USED IN SUPPORT OF THE PROPOSED ATTEMPT TO ABOLISH THE INTERNAL REVENUE.

The fact must not be lost sight of in the hurry of business by those who desire a continuance of our internal revenue system, that the statistics presented by United States Treasurer Gillfillan in his annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1881, an abstract of which was published in these columns last week, furnish material ready-made for people who are advocating and propose to persistently advocate its speedy abolition. "To be forewarned is to be forearmed," is an old and measurably true saying; and to the end that such of our readers as may be interested in the preservation of the existing method of collecting internal taxes may be both forewarned and forearmed, we herein submit some of the official data on which it is probable the advocates of a repeal of all internal taxes will rely for a justification of their demands.

They will first start—they have, in fact, done so already—with the proposition that the tariff is not burdensome, and should be left alone. Their second point will be that the national debt should no longer be reduced as rapidly as it has been in the past; that future generations should bear some of the burden of the present, and that it is needed as a ready and safe means of investment. Thirdly, they will claim that even with a continued moderate annual reduction of the debt, the revenues are now and will be hereafter many millions in excess of actual requirements. There being some truth in all three of these assumptions, they will serve as a good groundwork for the arguments that are to be based upon them. In the course of the discussion arising, moreover, reference will be made to the expensiveness of the Office of Internal Revenue, its numerous attaches, and the severity of its decrees pursuant to law. As the most of our people, however, are satisfied with the personnel and management of the office, these animadversions will not count for much in the general argument.

The main dependence to show that internal taxes are not required, will be on figures such as these:—Says Treasurer Gillfillan: "The receipts of the Government

"for 1881 show an increase over those for 1880 from every source. The increase in the receipts from customs is \$11,637,611.42; from internal revenue, \$11,255,011.59; from sales of public lands, \$1,185,356.57; and from miscellaneous sources, \$3,177,702.01. The total increase is \$27,255,681.59, which, added to a net reduction of \$6,930,070.19 in expenditures, makes an increase in the surplus revenue of \$34,185,751.78. The net revenues were \$360,782,292.47, and the net expenditures \$326,596,540.69. The excess of receipts over payments was \$100,069,404.98, of which \$90,872,261.05 was expended on the redemption of the public debt. The balance in the Treasury increased \$18,667,093.93, from \$203,791,321.88 at the beginning, to \$222,458,415.81 at the end of the fiscal year. The amount expended on account of interest and premium on the public debt ran down from \$98,552,895.33 in the fiscal year 1880, to \$83,569,988.96, a reduction of \$14,982,906.37. The balance standing to the credit of disbursing officers and agents of the United States with the various offices of the Treasury, June 30, 1881, was \$24,936,307.88."

This summary refers to the fiscal year last past. For the year now entered upon, in which, when Congress convenes, repealing legislation is to be inaugurated, according to the programme, it may be successfully maintained that present indications promise larger revenues from both excise and customs than were obtained last year. Last year the excise or internal revenue amounted to \$135,000,000—it was about a quarter of a million more—and the customs revenue to \$197,000,000—in fact, also a quarter of a million more. Reasoning from the official returns from both sources for July, August, September, and October, the first third of the current year, the customs on June 30, 1882, will show a revenue of not less than \$200,000,000, and the excise not less than \$145,000,000—an aggregate of \$345,000,000, and a gain of \$13,000,000. The refunding operations of the past summer have probably reduced the interest requirement some \$10,000,000, making the outlay this year for interest \$73,000,000, as against the \$83,000,000 last year noted by Mr. Gillfillan. We have seen the interest account authoritatively figured down to the neighborhood of \$60,000,000, but leaving it where we have placed it, the gain in revenue, \$13,000,000, and \$10,000,000 saved in interest, make a total gain of \$23,000,000.

In his annual report presented to Congress December 6, 1880, Secretary Sherman forecasted the financial situation for the year ending June 30, 1882, as follows:

Secretary Sherman adds to the above these words: "Excluding the sinking fund, the estimated expenditures will be \$259,914,882.08, showing a surplus of \$90,530,395.64."

Taking now the ex-Secretary's estimate of receipts and adding \$15,000,000, prospective excess for excise, and \$3,000,000 excess for customs, the friends of repeal can make the sum total \$368,000,000. Taking, in like manner, his estimate of expenditures and deducting \$10,000,000 saving in interest, they can make the total expenditures, sinking fund included, in round numbers, \$291,000,000, leaving a surplus of receipts over expenditures of \$77,000,000.

Thus far all is susceptible of demonstration. And the repealers, or abolitionists—if that term be more acceptable—may now leave out of the estimates of expenditures, as suggested by Mr. Sherman, the allowance of \$41,000,000 for the sinking fund, which, if done, will increase the available surplus to \$118,000,000, and which is a remission that may with propriety be claimed, in view of the fact stated by Mr. Gillfillan, namely, that in the last fiscal year nearly \$91,000,000 were expended on the redemption of the national debt. Right here the repealers will ask, Why should \$77,000,000 over and above all known requirements be taken from the pockets of our tax-payers? and why should this vast amount be augmented by the sum of \$41,000,000 when there is no need for it, and when it can be more equitably provided hereafter than now?

As the receipts from customs, internal taxes, sales of public lands and miscellaneous sources increased last year over the year before, in round numbers, \$27,000,000, so will an equally large increment be predicated this year. Likewise, as there was a reduction of about \$7,000,000 in expenditures last year, so can a similar reduction be assumed for this year by those disposed to argue for repeal. Combining the increase and reduction, Mr. Gillfillan, as will be noticed, makes an increase in the surplus revenue of last year of more than \$34,000,000. If \$100,069,404.98 were collected last year than were paid out in meeting all obligations, why, it may and will be plausibly asked, may not a surplus sum sufficiently large to admit of the relinquishment of the internal revenue be confidently expected annually in the near future?—in 1883 if not in 1882? The customs and miscellaneous sources of revenue are almost certain to constantly increase their yield, and the national debt is equally certain to gradually diminish in amount.

## MINOR EDITORIALS AND NEWS ITEMS.

BURNED.—Stratton's cigar manufactory at Milford, Mass., was burned yesterday. The loss is \$12,000.

SAILED.—Mr. Kaeppl, of the firm of Weiss, Eller & Kaeppl, of this city, left for Havana on Thursday per steamer Niagara.

FROM AFAR.—All the way from Honolulu, H. I., came renewed subscriptions to THE TOBACCO LEAF yesterday. The paper goes to and is welcomed in all parts of the world.

CIGAR-MAKERS' STRIKE.—Chicago, Nov. 8.—The strike of the cigar-makers at Milwaukee has resulted in arrangements whereby over 400 cigar-makers from San Francisco will be brought to Milwaukee, via the Union Pacific and Rock Island Roads, at an early date.

PERSONAL.—We had the pleasure of a call during the week from Mr. Alex. Harthill, tobacco broker, of Louisville, Ky. Mr. Harthill will sail during the coming week for Europe, and intends making an extended tour of the Great Britain and the Continent, both for recreation and business purposes.

OUR old patron and correspondent, Emery Dennis, Jr., of Boston, informs us that he has just put up a large and improved sweating apparatus, and is now prepared to sweat tobacco for manufacturers and dealers. He can produce any color required, from medium to very dark. The tobacco comes out tough and handsome in one week's time.

ATTORNEY-GENERAL MACVEIGH OVERULED.—Last July cigars were unloaded from the steamer Saratoga without a customs permit. The steamer was libeled to recover a penalty of \$400. Exemption was claimed under an act which provided that a vessel should not be liable in such cases when the act was done without the consent of the master. The master, Attorney-General MacVeigh decided that the act did not apply to seizures under process to impose a penalty for smuggling. Wednesday, in the United States District Court, Judge Brown overruled the decision and directed a verdict for the owners of the Saratoga.

SHARING THE PROFITS.—Charles Giebert, of Sea Cliff, L. I., is in conversation with a certain chewing tobacco manufacturer by O. M. Arkenburgh & Co., 404 and 406 Pearl Street, New York, this week brought in a local cigar store a package of his favorite brand, and in it found an order for fifty dollars, which was promptly cashed. A Mr. Holmes, of Paterson, New Jersey, also found an order for fifty dollars this week in a package of his brand. The money for the order was at once sent to Mr. B. Feeney, a jobber in manufactured tobaccos in that place. Still another lucky consumer of the same tobacco is reported from Williamsburg, L. I., the latter finding in his purchase an order for twenty dollars. That consumers are sharing in the profits of this firm is an established fact.

## BUSINESS MENTION.

On Tuesday last, election day, most of our tobacco houses were closed, and very little business was transacted.

We learn that the two great tobacco houses of Petersburg, Messrs. S. W. Yenable and C. A. Jackson & Co., cannot begin to fill their orders on time, notwithstanding their factories are kept running day and night.

## BUSINESS TROUBLES.

TOBACCO dealer, is reported to have failed, with liabilities amounting to \$27,000. It is said that his capital has not been sufficient for the business he has been doing. He has always borne a good reputation, we learn. It is stated that he is offering to compromise.

Our special correspondent writes as follows in regard to this failure: "The creditors' meeting held at the office of Peck & Hargis November 4, a proposition was received from Mr. McGuire of 20 cents on the dollar, which was rejected, and the meeting decided to await the action of W. J. Quan, who had stated that if the creditors desired he would make them a proposition, which he would do at once, at 12 o'clock, or so, at an adjournment was made to the time specified. The creditors convened again, November 5, at the same place, and a proposition was received from Mr. Copland in behalf of W. J. Quan, wherein he stated that if they should appoint him (Mr. Copland) as assignee, he would close out the estate satisfactorily to the creditors. He would close the business, and the bank and the estate should pay all legal expenses, store rent and insurance; would work exclusively under a committee appointed by the creditors, and when put in possession of the estate would pay 75 per cent. of the mortgage claim, so the assignment could be made charging interest at 6 per cent. per annum; and as recompense for his services 10 per cent. on all collections; giving W. J. Quan as bondsman."

The proposition not covering sufficient ground, was rejected, and the offer of 20 cents from Mr. McGuire was entertained, and the sense of the meeting was that if it was increased to 25 cents it would be accepted. The meeting then adjourned.

Since the above meeting the offer has been increased to 25 cents, three and six months, secured by good endorsers, all the creditors signing off on the presentation of the paper.

—The absconding book-keeper of Mr. McGuire has not as yet been heard from. His speculations will probably reach \$10,000.

## Our Lancaster Correspondence.

LANCASTER, PA., Nov. 10, 1881.

Our market is still quiet, and it was made even duller than usual by the elections just passed. In old tobacco some few small lots were sold to manufacturers, and the sale of one lot of 200 cases is reported. Terms were private, but the prices were entirely acceptable to the seller, as may be supposed from the state of the market—large sales prevented by the fact that holders asked prices that were too high for the ideas of the buyers. Sampling of the crop is nearly done, and it has turned out splendidly all around. Some heavy shipments were made to New York and other markets last week.

For the past ten days we have had cloudy, foggy and rainy weather, which dampened the new tobacco, and many of the farmers seized the opportunity to take down part or all of their crop and prepare it for market. But they need be in no hurry, as it is not probable that there will be any delivery before Christmas, the dealers objecting to the taking of the tobacco purchase in the fields from the poles until after at least one or two heavy frosts. Some few sales of the new crop are reported at the same old high figures.

## PHILADELPHIA NOTES.

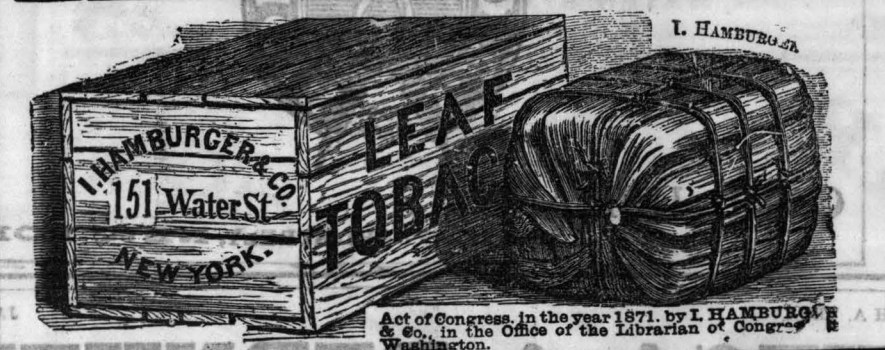

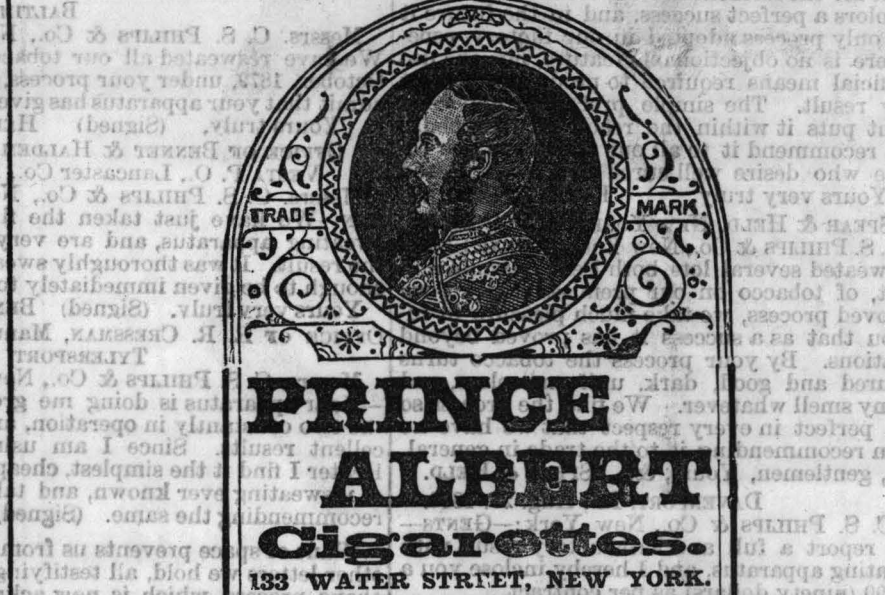

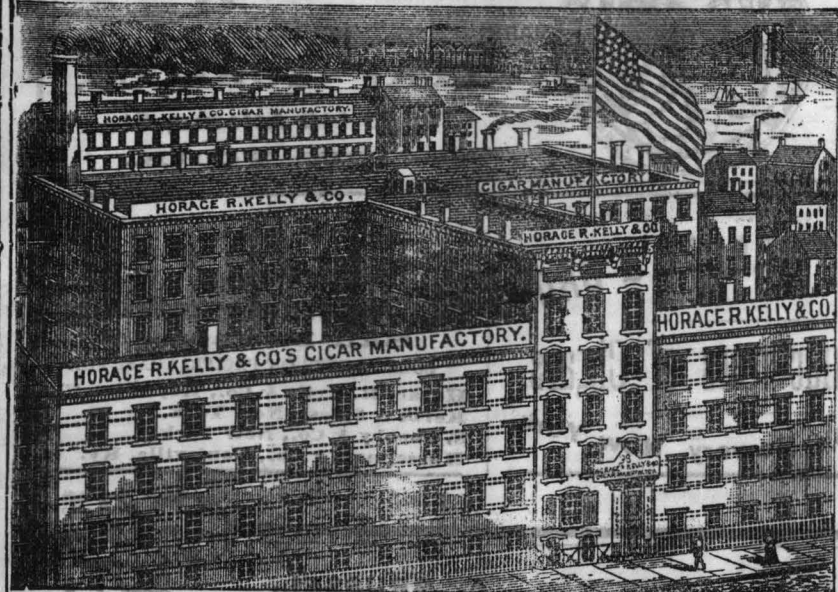
