## Statistics of the Bremen Tobacco Market for 1884.

D. H. Watjen & Co.'s annual tobacco circular says:—

## NORTH AMERICAN TOBACCO.

Our subjoined statistics show the following movements in our market for the past year: Total imports, 32,935 hds., against 35,772 in 1883; total deliveries, 31,259 hds., against 38,785 in 1883; stocks to day, 6,729 hds., against 5,033 in 1883. Figures it will be seen that the transactions have not come up to those of the preceding year. It must, however, be remembered that in 1883 various causes influenced the business to be exceptionally large; consequently to-day we do not remain far behind the usual average figures.

Kentucky tobacco participates in these movements, with imports of 12,084 hds., against 20,825 in 1883, and deliveries of 12,514 hds., against 20,012 in 1883, which shows that the rise in prices for this sort has indeed been felt to a large extent. The high grades, i. e., medium and good to fine heavy leaf, imports and sales have been about the same as in former years, and we may add that the Paducah produce has, on account of its fine color, been much appreciated, while heavy Clarksville leaf has not been so much in demand. The great deficiency in this year's imports has been in low grades, good heavy fillers on one side and light cuttings on the other, because prices for both have all along been too high in America to allow of shipments to this market. A larger proportion of good heavy lugs and low leaf for filler use would surely have facilitated sales of Western leaf, and we are well justified in again expressing the hope of seeing more of these grades come hither next year at prices that will be able to grant. On the other hand we must not omit to mention that the position of our market has, during the past year, at different times, been strengthened by an outside demand, which set in on the part of Regie contractors. Thus again, during the first half of the last year, when fine American tobacco was sought after for Austria and Italy, a circumstance that led to some animated business at advancing prices, and left us with but a small proportion of desirable leaf at the end of the year, such stock being now held at very full prices. Toward the end of the month the market showed a quiet aspect again, as is natural at this season. The sales of Western tobacco during December sum up to 1,093 hds., including about 800 hds. medium to good leaf and 111 hds. good heavy Clarksville lugs and low leaf. The latter were sold at about 47¢ to four different prices, on receipt of the samples from New York.

Our subjoined quotations are, in accordance with prices in the United States markets, higher than at the respective dates of the previous four years, especially so for low grades; but, as new supplies have not yet appeared, they are only to be understood for old crop tobacco, and with new importations of any extent would have to be lowered accordingly. We have reduced our quotations for common colored cuttings, because these can only be sold at prices which would allow them to compete with the German produce.

In Virginia business has during the past year somewhat revived, though not reaching the figures of former years. Imports during 1884 sum up to 5,250 hds., with deliveries of 5,196 hds., leaving a stock at present date of 138 hds. The same holds true with regard to tobacco, viz., high prices in the producing country may be given with regard to Virginia for the comparatively limited business done here, and this same reason, too, applies principally to the common grades. The dearth of Virginia lugs and medium leaf has compelled our inland manufacturers to gradually use less of them, so that they now mix about one-tenth with domestic tobacco, where formerly they used to take one-half and more. Besides, trade is beginning to be very much obstructed by the reprehensible mode of packing which yearly seems to gain more ground in Virginia. For the sake of their good old reputation, all honest Virginian tobacco traders should use their influence to abolish this system, which threatens to destroy a heretofore flourishing business. Even Regie contractors who so far had rarely complained begin to feel apprehensive about such unfair trading, and will not hereafter so easily be found ready to relieve Virginia buyers of their stocks. Thus, as already mentioned, business in this market has during the whole year been rather limited, and it is the agents of the Italian contractors entered the market in November. This unexpected demand continued during the first half of December, and brought sales during this month to 635 hds., a demand which our market was enabled to satisfy, as Regie imports had taken place in October. The price that had to be paid was high, in sympathy with the Virginian markets, as will be seen from our quotations given below. Of new crop so far only some cutting tobacco has appeared that brought from 35 to 40¢, besides a few lots of primings which had to be sold at low prices.

Maryland tobacco during 1884 led to larger transactions than in the previous four years, the crop of 1883 in general finding favor here; nevertheless prices have gradually been sinking. Medium and good leaf, and especially the latter, are offered, and therefore held their own pretty well, but the large bulk of offerings consisted of common grades. Of the latter repeatedly round lots, formerly bought on speculation and owned in Baltimore and New York, were offered here, and in order to dispose of them, and to bring in low prices, as of late again during the past month. Some more lots of several hundred hogsheads from the same source are said still to follow. Common Marylands, we are afraid, will never again fetch the good prices formerly known, as they must be given in competition with the domestic growth, which latter is protected by a high import duty. Only Belgium and Holland remain good customers to our trade, but in the latter country an elevation of the duty is now again being ventilated. Sales during December, 700 hds.; stocks in first hands, 555.

Ground leaf also had its share of a larger business in 1884, if compared with former years, and, being much appreciated on account of fine color and good quality, in the beginning found ready sale. But when the first success in connection with the importers buyers became more reserved, and wished to purchase at lower prices. Holders, on the other hand, saw no reason for selling at a loss, and thus business came to a pause. Only of late some small lots were closed out at somewhat lower rates. Sales for the month, 119 hds.; stocks, 381.

the fundamental principle of "Look out for No. 1." Whatever the moral effect may be, the statement of the tobacco trade in human nature has to be recognized.

My opponent claims in closing that I do not seem to realize that I am decrying the merits of Seed Leaf by continually protesting against the importation of Sumatra. In support of this he says that two-thirds of the manufacturers would never have tested its merits if they had not been continually reading about them in the never-ending objections to their importation. Now it seems that he is giving the importers credit for very little energy in placing their goods before the trade, and trying to secure a profitable market, if the manufacturers, after being posted by New England farmers, had to seek them out in order to get a trial sample of Sumatra leaf. According to these arguments, then, silence should have been the great and effective weapon with which to combat Sumatra leaf, and to protect domestic. This is a strange view of the case indeed.

One word more with regard to the point made in Mr. Burke's editorial, that the growers are making more profit than the jobbers. Perhaps this may be an unjust representation of the case, as it may prove the exception, but it is all the figures I have at hand. I have just received a price list of tobaccos, addressed by a large New York house to their patrons, and calling their attention to the extremely low prices of their goods. In this list fine Seed Leaf tobacco from East Hartford, is stated in the circular as offered at 55¢. This is the '83 crop. Now, taking the highest price paid by a dealer for any crop in East Hartford in '83 tobacco, which is 22¢ through, and allowing one-third second (the usual proportion of good leaf, which this time we need not consider), we have 22¢ x 2 = 44¢. On the latter the profit would not be more than 5 or 6¢ per lb., or a profit of 40 percent. On the wrappers, after allowing 4¢ for cost of packing, transportation and interest on the investment, there remains a clear profit of 10¢ per lb. more than the grower received for his crop with all expenses included, or a profit of about 50 percent. The circular further offers Havana Seed at from 25 to 65¢, Pennsylvania leaf 30 to 45¢, East Hartford 35 to 55¢, binders 13 to 20¢. In all probability this dealer is not asking more for his goods than his cost, and his patrons—W. F. A. Hartford county, Conn., in the New England Homestead, Jan. 17.

Cuba Tobacco in Florida. In a recent number of the *Floridian* H. J. Wiet says that the production of Cuban tobacco is in its infancy in our State, and a great deal of care and attention must follow to bring it to its proper stage. He further states that the tobacco of Cuba is of a great success, and tobacco made it. The value of its tobacco production surpasses that of cotton, far, pitch and turpentine combined. This ought to be equally so of the Cuba tobacco of Leon and Gadsden counties. The similarity of the soil and climate, and effects to that of the island of Cuba, with the same management, must and will bring a like tobacco. (The tobacco on the island is grown from October to February). It is not perishable like the orange crop or early potatoes, but improves by age. It is not contingent on quick sale, and the result is a poor, industrious man's crop as well as the bondholder's. Our only competition to-day is the island of Cuba, and the case stands thus: Her tobacco is getting poorer and scarcer every year. The lack of American ingenuity to keep the soil in the highest condition of the Spanish Government; the emancipation of slave labor; and the uncertainty of commercial matters will keep her tobacco on an upward tendency for years to come, and adding to this our protective tariff, will certainly show our advantages over her.

Horses to be Watered Before Fed. Bearing in mind that the stomach of a horse is not a stomach, but a large intestine, he requires feeding often, and though three times a day is sufficient, four times is better. Unlike human beings, horses should drink before they eat, because, owing to the conformation of the stomach, water does not remain in the stomach, but passes through it into the large intestine called the cecum. If a horse be fed first, the water passing through the stomach will be likely to carry with it particles of food, and thus bring about colic. Whatever a groom may say, let a horse drink just as much as he likes. If he be watered four times a day, he will require very little food, or too much to be good for him. A horse, it must be remembered, is fed on dry food, and this, with the strong work done by a hunter, always produces a feverishness, which a sufficiency of water tends to allay.—*London Field*.

FOREIGN TOBACCO NEWS. (Translated for the Tobacco Leaf.) A correspondent furnishes a statistical statement of the tobacco trade at the port of Bremen during the past year, from which it appears that the imports of Seed Leaf from the United States during the year amounted to about 6,000,000 kilos, against 5,000,000 in 1883. The imports of West India and South American leaf during the same period amounted to 23,500,000 kilos; the exports to 2,000,000 kilos. About 5,900,000 kilos of stems were received. The cigar manufacturing business is flourishing. The exports of cigars during the year amounted to about 39,000,000.

The old town of Osnabrück (province of Hanover) has of late years made considerable progress as a cigar manufacturing centre. Some of the finest quality of goods for the export trade are manufactured in that city, and business is steadily increasing. A correspondent reports that good workmen are in demand, and there is no need for cigar-makers in that locality to emigrate to the United States.

From the Philippine Islands a correspondent reports that an export duty has been established by the Government of the islands, which imposes a duty of 30 pesetas per 100 kilos on leaf tobacco, exported from the provinces of Cagayan, Isabella and Nueva Visayas; 15 pesetas on leaf tobacco imported from the provinces of Visayas and Mindanao; 24 pesetas on cigars per 100 kilos.

According to the report of the German Consul at Havana, no correct statement can be made as to the quantity of tobacco exported from Cuba. Large quantities of leaf are exported, of which no entry is made in the export lists, to avoid the payment of the export duty. Cigars and cigarettes are also exported in large quantities without the payment of the export duty, and no estimate can be furnished of the amount of the export business.

NEW YORK.

G. A. G. Jr., Elmira, N. Y., writes to the *Country Gentleman* of Jan. 20:—In this State there has also been some activity, and several houses are slowly but steadily loading up with Chemung and Onondaga goods. Prices here, although not so favorable to growers as those paid in Wisconsin and Ohio, are all that could be reasonably expected, in view of the fact that the tobacco has developed an unusually large number of white veins. From 14 to 15¢ is being paid for running lots in Onondaga county, while in the 14 to 15¢ range, and from 10 to 11¢ in the bundle. A very small part of the product of this valley has as yet been bought, yet dealers are riding and inspecting crops, and the volume of purchases each week is all the time increasing.

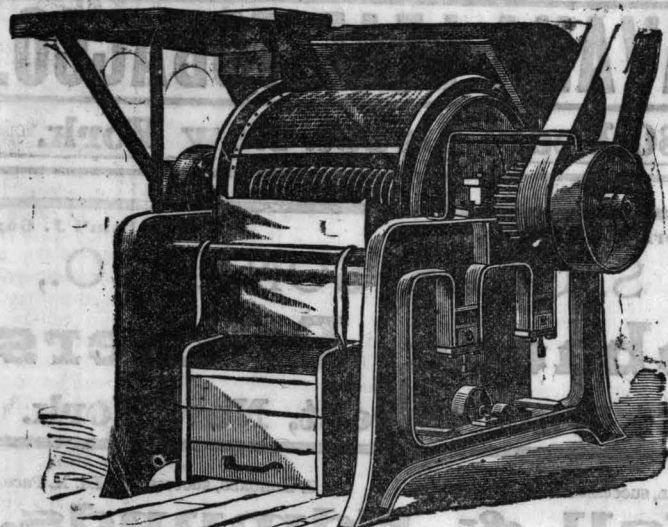

**The Tobacco Trade of San Francisco for the Past Year.**  
The San Francisco (Cal.) Grocer and Country Merchant says:—Notwithstanding the fact that the Northern Pacific road has cut off a portion of the Northern trade from this city, and that Los Angeles and portions of the south are supplied direct from the East, overland receipts of manufactured tobacco in this city for the past year make a fair showing. At the close of 1887, tobacco in taking stock found themselves with a heavy accumulation of unsalable goods. They consequently began the year 1888 by ordering lightly and only the brands necessary to fill in. For this reason overland receipts in January, 1888, aggregated only 45,711 pounds. After that date receipts increased gradually, working up to 364,578 pounds in August, the largest amount received during any single month.  
The total receipts reported for the year by rail aggregate 2,410,359 pounds.  
Few notable events occurred in business during the year. The most important was the announcement in May by Messrs. P. Lorillard & Co. of their discontinuance of the contract system.  
During the year a perceptible falling off in demand for fine-cut chewing was noticeable, and the course of trade has shown that the high-priced cable coils and Virginia light-pressed twists are fast giving place to the more convenient cut plug for smoking.  
The year was characterized by no business changes of note in the tobacco trade. Messrs. Esberg, Beckman & Co. opened a branch house in Portland, Or. Rinaldo Bros. of San Jose, formed a partnership with Robert Lowenberg under the style of Rinaldo Bros. & Lowenberg. Mr. H. Heynemann was appointed agent on the coast for Blackwell's goods, consisting of the celebrated Bull Durham and Lotter's plug tobacco, and L. & E. Wertheimer accepted the agency for Horace R. Kelly's Key West cigars.  
Little of an encouraging character occurred in this department of trade for the period under review. The well-intended philanthropic enterprise started during the year by a number of prominent cigar manufacturers to educate white boys and girls in the trade of cigar-making, contrary to the anticipa-

**tion of the projectors, failed.** Considerable money, it is said, was lost by the experiment. Receipts of Key West and Eastern cigars were not equal to that of 1887. This decline we attribute to the same cause that has affected receipts of manufactured tobacco. The overland receipts reported for 1884 aggregate 1,608 cases.  
The internal revenue receipts last year in the First District on cigars, cigarettes, snuff and tobacco amounted to \$559,253.  
Contrary to all predictions, statistics for 1884 show that cigarette smoking is on the increase on this coast. This is indicated by the receipts for that period, which aggregate 1,832 cases.  
Notwithstanding the fact that cigar manufacturers complain of a dull year, there has been no perceptible decrease in the demand for leaf. The amount reported as being received overland to December 30, 1884, aggregates 2,940,424 pounds.


