From WBBA's President

Identification, Sexing and Ageing

These are critical concerns and challenges in bird-banding, which are critical for the intrinsic value of our recorded observations, and the data sent to the Bird Banding Laboratory (BBL). There is however a somewhat schizophrenic aspect about all of this. On one hand we are encouraged to research and test criteria for identification, sexing and ageing birds at different times of the year and in different populations and geographic regions. Yet we are held to the standardized criteria in volume 2 of the North American Bird Banding Manual, when we report our banding activities to the BBL. This seemingly arbitrary guideline nevertheless remains essential for maximizing the consistency and reliability of the data in the BBL's database, and for the sound interpretation of data drawn from the database, for research, management and other kinds of projects.

Periodic review and updating of the BBL's criteria for identification, sexing and ageing occurs. But it is an increasingly complex and challenging task because of the accelerated accumulation of new information and reevaluation of criteria. The task becomes even more complex as new techniques and technologies contribute to our expertise, and as computer based multifactorial evaluation of criteria gain in usefulness.

"Worksheets" for particular species have been a helpful intermediate step in the review, testing and evaluation of criteria for identification, sexing and ageing. They will continue to be important. However, for passerine birds a consolidated and efficiently organized guidebook of criteria is now available. This is the recently (1987) published *Identification Guide to North American Passerines* by Peter Pyle, Steve N.C. Howell, Robert P. Yunick and David F. DeSante (published by, and available from, Slate Creek Press, P.O. Box 219, Bolinas CA 94924). This is a most timely and useful volume for banders. It will serve as a consolidated basis for further advances by each of us in discovering new and testing new and old criteria. Similar concise guides for banders covering other major avian groups, are certainly needed. They will aid in bringing together the widely scattered, and sometimes practically forgotten, published information, as well as facilitating more rapid and coherent advances in our identification, sexing and ageing of birds belonging to these other groups. There is plenty for each of us to do and ways by which all of us can contribute. Peter Pyle and his coauthors deserve our praise, not only for providing this milestone guide for North American banders, but also for giving us such a worthy model of collaborative work at the core of bird-banding science.
