... wants confederacy of three countries

Peace activist calls for united states of the Middle East

Israeli peace activist Joseph Abileah called yesterday for the confederation of three countries into a united states of the Middle East. The secretary of the Society for Middle East Confederation, Abileah outlined in a speech on campus the society's proposals for the confederation of Israel, Jordan and the Palestinian people.

The society, whose membership is made of Arabs, Israelis and other Jews, proposes a union of the three separate states which would be called "The Union of Jerusalem." The Old City and the part of Jerusalem known as East Jerusalem would be the capital. Each state would preserve its own system of government.

MUCH OF THE controversy in the Mideast arises from the question of where to put the multitudes of displaced Palestinians who were left without a country when Israeli borders were established.

Under the confederation, "People will have the right to settle wherever they want," Abileah said.

"It must become a free democratic country."

Citing the Syrian desert as one of the greatest areas of the Middle East problems, Abileah explained the history of struggle for the resources of the Jordan River: "We have many deserts and very little agricultural resources, and this has been a cause for war."

STANDING ALONE as three independent sovereign states, these countries cannot exist, the society maintains. "Jordan can not develop without a way to the Mediterranean, while Israel and the West Bank cannot live without the hinterland of Jordan," Abileah said.

If the countries unite, they would pool resources and could be more self-supporting, Abileah said.

The people of these countries agree that cooperation is necessary but they haven't gotten together yet, he said. Governments will not do anything if they do not feel they have public support.

"That is the work of our society." To promote unity and cooperation the society visits Palestinian

State senator drafting graduate restriction bill

State Sen. Jack Gordon, D-Miami, is drafting a bill requiring persons accepted to education masters and doctorate programs in the state's nine universities to have three years prior teaching experience.

If passed, it would be the first restriction of that type on admissions to graduate programs in the nation, William Taft, USF director of Graduate Studies, said.

"I think it would be disastrous," Taft said.

GORDON SAID his bill is modeled after the British system, in which students without enough classroom experience "simply aren't admitted to masters programs."

"The value of the credentials in our society is more than the actual value of the credentials in the work," Gordon said.

He said a Wall Street Journal survey has shown that only 2 per cent of Ph.D.s have ever published anything besides their dissertations.

"Nobody is willing to say it's worth anything," Gordon said.

"Most Ph.D.s who are in academics talk about their union cards."

TAFT SAID he objects to the bill because the education field is asking for more and more training at higher levels.

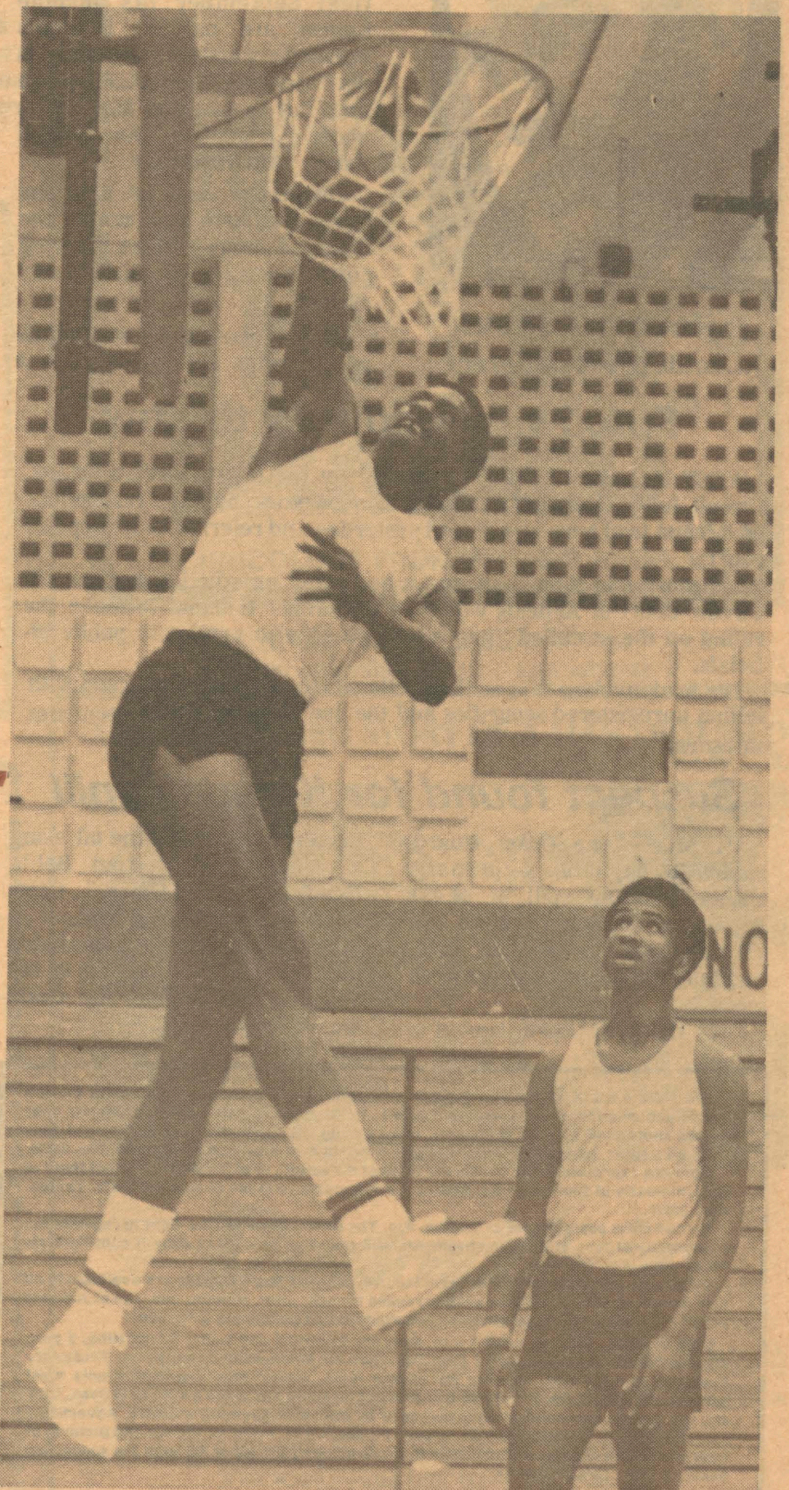
If a person must get a job before he or she is accepted to graduate school, and employers are only looking for persons with graduate degrees, the results "would be disastrous," Taft said.

"Why buy a person with a bachelor's degree when you can get a masters?" Taft said.

According to new report

Pardon saved Nixon from certain prosecution

WASHINGTON — Authorities were convinced they could prosecute President Richard M. Nixon for the Watergate cover-up, but elected not to indict him

for fear of triggering a constitutional crisis that could impede impeachment, it was revealed yesterday.

Once Nixon resigned, ac-

ording to the first public report of the prosecutors' work, his criminal indictment virtually was assured—then President Ford pardoned Nixon for all crimes committed during his presidency.

The nearly 300-page report, issued on the eve of the departure of the third man to hold the special prosecutor's job, broke no new ground in the massive political scandal that rocked the nation and drove Nixon from office 14 months ago.

White House orders crash report

WASHINGTON — The White House yesterday ordered the Secret Service to explain how President Ford's limousine crashed with another auto in Hartford, Conn., Tuesday night, and police in Washington began using sirens to clear Ford's way through traffic.

Of the Hartford collision between Ford's Lincoln limousine and a 1967 Buick holding six teenagers, Press Secretary Ron Nessen told a White House briefing Chief of Staff Donald Rumsfeld "has asked the Secret Service to send a report here to explain how this could have happened."

"The White House is wondering how in the world a thing like that could have happened," Nessen said.

In Hartford, police officials said they neglected to have officers manning the intersections where Ford's motorcade zipped through a red light as the yellow Buick came through, smashing into the President's \$500,000, heavily plated and bulletproof limousine, damaging its right front fender.

Ford escaped injury but Connecticut Republican State Chairman Frederick K. Biebel, seated next to the President, injured a hand. None of the occupants of the other car — whose front end was pushed far back — immediately reported being hurt.

Spending cuts called impossible by Democrats

WASHINGTON — Democrats argued yesterday it is impossible to tie federal spending cuts to tax cuts and President Ford knows it. But they invited him nevertheless to expand on his idea.

Ford has proposed that taxes be cut \$28 billion and that federal spending be reduced correspondingly.

"We are asked to buy a pig in a poke," Rep. Al Ullman, D-Ore., chairman of the House Ways and

Means Committee, said in Washington on a radio interview CBS' Capitol Cloakroom.

Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine, chairman of the Senate Budget Committee, said Budget Director James T. Lynn will appear Tuesday to discuss the Ford program.

White House Press Secretary Ron Nessen said Ford has given some department heads the guidelines for spending cuts but cannot disclose them to Congress

right now "because it's the only way you can put the damned budget together."

Ullman said his committee hopes to complete within a month legislation that ties and extension of tax cuts into tax reform. But as for tying the tax relief to a federal budget limit, "What the President is asking is impossible," Ullman said. "To do it before you even see the budget is just totally irresponsible."

TALLAHASSEE — Although final September tax income figures are not in, Florida's economic situation "certainly is not improving" and total revenue may fall as much as \$50 million under expectations, Gov. Reubin Askew said yesterday.

But Askew said he still has hopes the state can handle the financial crisis without freezing enrollment in the university system.

Fraud trial gag rule to stay

WEST PALM BEACH — A request by the Miami Herald asking Circuit Judge Russell McIntosh to remove news coverage restrictions on a fraud trial here was denied yesterday and referred to an appeals court.

McIntosh told Herald attorneys he lacked jurisdiction and the 4th Circuit Court of Appeals would be the proper tribunal to make the ruling on the so-called "gag-rule," which also applies to public officials.

The trial involves Wayne Hartwell and two associates charged with selling unregistered securities and the use of unregistered securities salesmen.

Suspect found for Keys oil spill

MIAMI — The Coast Guard said yesterday it has a "primary suspect" in the spill of 40,000 gallons of oil that befouled the Florida Keys shoreline last July, and may file formal charges next week.

"We think we have located a

tanker that dumped the oil along a 25-mile stretch from Bahia Honda to Boca Chica," Capt. William Montgomery said.

"Legal groundwork is being laid prior to the charging of the owner of the vessel," the Coast Guard said.

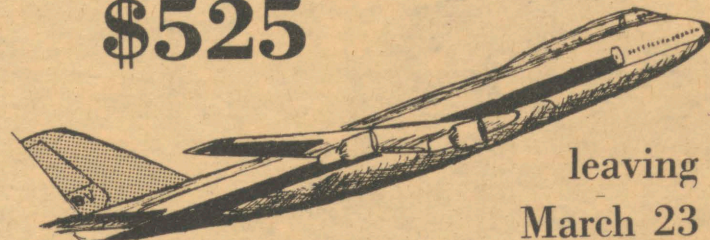

Criticism fails to alter course

USF's Human Sexual Behavior course will not be altered, despite recent criticism of what some consider unusual content and teaching methods, Dr. Juanita Williams, Women's Studies chairwoman, said.

In the Tampa Times Monday, State Sen. Richard Deeb labeled the teaching methods — which include use of "explicit" sexual films and chanting of words denoting sexual acts — "downright immorality."

But adjunct instructor Etta Breitt, who has taught the four-hour course with Mark Tyson for one year, defended it strongly:

"THE MOVIES are either made by medical societies or

narrated by physicians, and the chanting is an extremely minor part; only five minutes during the very first class session."

Breitt said the chanting by students of such words as "fellatio" desensitizes the students so they will be able to use the words in discussions and lectures.

"The people who call the films pornography are not attending the whole film or the lectures afterwards," Breitt said. "Pornography is subjective, but these are educational films."

Dr. Travis Northcutt, dean of the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences, said a faculty member who taught a class in the immediate area objected to the chanting.

WILLIAMS SAID the faculty member, who has not "come forth," took exception to the content of the chanting rather than the loudness.

"When we did it, it was 9:30 p.m. and I was pretty sure the building was empty," Breitt said.

Northcutt and Breitt said they have never received a complaint from students or their parents about the course.

Students receive information about contraceptives, venereal diseases, sexual dysfunctions, prenatal sexual differentiation and alternatives to heterosexuality, Breitt noted.

"WE NEVER advocate anything," she said.

Northcutt said the course was beneficial to persons interested in nursing, medicine, sociology and the behavioral sciences.

"The irony is that some leading people in the field of religion have lectured to the class," Northcutt said.

Faculty senate plans to offer aid to Board of Regents

The state Faculty Senate Council plans to come to the Board of Regents' aid in soliciting support for faculty salary increases from the legislature.

Dr. Jesse Binford, USF professor of Chemistry and council chairman, said the 18-member group will make itself available to the regents to "help them present the best possible case to the legislature."

Several legislators, including Education Chairman Phil Lewis

and Ways and Means Chairman Jack Gordon, have come out against faculty salary increases.

"THE LEGISLATURE has to be made aware that the quality of university education is going to deteriorate very badly very shortly if something isn't done," Binford said yesterday.

That "something," he said, is finding new sources of revenue for increasing funds to higher education.

If funds aren't provided, "the university system will be worse than mediocre," he said.

The faculty council will compile a list of faculty members statewide who have left Florida

this year because of financial uncertainty, Binford said.

IT WILL ALSO make a statistical analysis of how other states pay their faculty.

"If we show that comparable faculty positions in other states receive raises that put them well ahead of us, that may carry weight with the legislature," he said.

"Our best faculty are going to leave because other states are paying more for comparable people.

"If they (legislators) think we're just going to sit back and take it, the legislature is going to take the easy way out (raise no taxes)," Binford said.

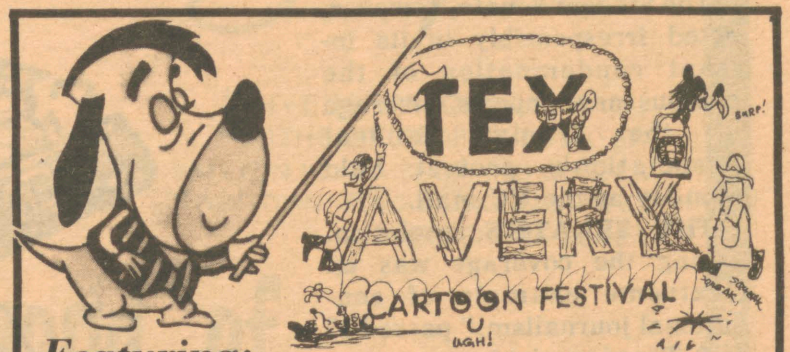

Senate's irresponsibility is showing

The Oracle always has and always will welcome criticism from responsible sources.

The Student Senate, however, acted irresponsibly in its instant condemnation of the campus newspaper's coverage of the Iranian Student Association's protest held Monday at the UC mall.

THE SENATE'S resolution, saying the coverage was an "extreme example of sensational journalism," passed 17 to 9 Tuesday night.

The resolution passed after lengthy debate, but the Oracle was not consulted about the issue nor was the editor or any staff member involved asked to present the paper's side of the story.

The senate resolved to reprimand the Oracle and did so with only the testimony from one witness to the incident.

It appears that the senators seem to think that because SG dishes out activity & service fee money — some of which goes to the Oracle — they have some control over the content of the newspaper.

THEY DO NOT.

And the implication that the senate should dictate policy to the paper is abhorrent.

One of the senators even commented that he might try to

reduce the allocation to the paper when the next funding process begins.

Sophomoric actions like this must stop if the senate ever hopes to create an air of

responsibility.

The senate is notorious for its spur-of-the-moment passing of condemning resolutions. Rarely is anyone present at meetings to offer an alternative

to the senators before they vote.

And now the Oracle is the recipient of one of those ill-researched resolutions, although we have not yet been officially notified of the move.

Newsman criticizes senate

The Oracle's coverage of a campus news event, a demonstration by a group of Iranian students, has become the target of two groups: supporters of the Iranian students' cause and the Student Senate.

Both groups are wrong, but for different reasons.

The Iranians staged a public demonstration. But when Oracle staff members tried to photograph the event, they were ruffed up by the demonstrators.

I think it's no accident that our founding fathers included two basic, fundamental rights in the same amendment — the first — to the Constitution:

"Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of

religion or prohibiting the free exercise thereof; or abridging the freedom of the press; or the right of the people peaceably to assemble, and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

SO WHILE THE Iranians had a right to demonstrate, the Oracle had a right — and a duty — to report the event. And I must point out that the demonstrators resorted to force in trying to prevent their pictures from being taken.

Now impassioned pleas have been made objecting to the publication of pictures of the Iranian demonstrators. It is charged that the very lives of the Iranians and their families have been put in danger.

If this be true, then the answer is clear, simple and direct: these demonstrators should not have chosen this avenue to express their views.

THE IRANIAN group chose to demonstrate in public. And by so doing, left no option to the Oracle editor. He had to cover the event. He made the same choice that I or any other newsman would have made.

To agree not to cover the event, or to treat the protest differently from any other event, would reduce the Oracle's stature as a free, unbridled source of information for the student population.

The Iranian group could have chosen a different means to present its

position, and still have the group's members retain anonymity, if that is what they wished. They could have written a letter to the editor of the Oracle stating their position. While the letter must be signed by an individual before it can be printed, the name of the author can be withheld from publication. In such a matter the editor does have some latitude.

SO IT WAS the Iranian demonstrators themselves who dictated the events that transpired. The Oracle then carried out its duty: supplying a maximum flow of information to provide a basis for rational decisions by the readers. Freedom of speech and of the press are considered by most Americans as indispensable to the life of a public capable of self-government.

I'm perplexed as to how such an august body could have been swayed by emotional pleas to judge an issue without consideration of the hard, cold facts of the case.

WHO AMONG YOU thinks he or she has the wisdom — or the right — to determine what part of a news story should be reported to the public? Such folly! Is not the best course the one that was followed — the straightforward reporting of the truth?

As to the Iranian group's right to privacy, I contend they surrendered that right by their own actions. The

courts have held that persons who seek fame, public office, or otherwise willingly bring themselves to public notice give up, to some extent, their right to be "let alone."

So my advice and admonition to the Iranian students is don't seek out the public spotlight and then not expect to be caught by the glare of publicity.

Additionally, I ask that the Student Senate reconsider its stand. Does not your true responsibility lie in protecting the basic freedoms of the press, which stems from the very hearts and minds of those whom you were elected to represent?

I ASK YOU to turn away from the edges of that dangerous precipice named censorship.

In a landmark U.S. Supreme Court decision on privacy — *Time Inc. v. Hill* — Justice William J. Brennan wrote the opinion for the court:

... the risk of this (public) exposure is an essential incident of life in a society which places a primary value on freedom of speech and of the press... Those (constitutional) guarantees are not for the benefit of the press so much as for the benefit of all of us. A broadly defined freedom of the press assures the maintenance of our political system and an open society...

Let us make a commitment to keep the press a public servant and not a slave to private interests.

Journalism group supports Oracle

Editor:

As members of Sigma Delta Chi, The Society of Professional Journalists, we must condemn the actions of the Iranian Student Association for attempting to restrain the freedom of the press by objecting to and resisting Oracle photographers at Monday's ISA rally.

In a free press society, the First Amendment implies the press has the right and responsibility to cover and publish any public event.

The ISA made its rally and the ensuing scuffle with photographers a public event when it chose to hold the event outside the UC with a public address system and distribution of pamphlets. If certain members of the ISA wished to go undetected by any incognito Iranian secret police, they showed a glaring lack of forethought.

We also feel that some members of Student Government showed a great lack of understanding about the responsibilities of the press by labeling the Oracle's reporting of the event "sensational journalism."

The event was worthy of the front page coverage it received. When restraints on a free press are attempted by a minority or high government official, that press should indeed be alarmed and the people informed.

There is much ululation over the cessation of hard news broadcasts on WUSF-FM. The outcry has been raised in the valid belief that a valuable learning situation has been lost along with the news.

It is also believed when job opportunities are fullest when there is a blending of experiential and academic knowledge in broadcasting.

We are told the decision to eliminate the news was an economic one. Unlike the Oracle, which can advertise and is bolstered by an expansive student activities fee fund, WUSF-FM is funded by the university and is prone to the harsh fiscal realities of the recession-inflation economy. So, the decision to drop hard news was just good fiscal policy.

With good fiscal policy as our

guide, maybe it is time to look at the radio station in terms of cost vs. educational value. At present, there is a modicum of student involvement with the station. When news was dropped a potential, not actual, learning situation was lost.

Ideally, students should be immersed in the operation of the station from top to bottom, of course, with proper supervision.

A similar situation exists with WUSF-TV: very little educational value to the students and a whopping price tag to the university. Although, unlike with WUSF-FM, there is another noncommercial TV station to provide service to the community if operations ceased at WUSF-TV.

It is unfortunate that the broadcast stations and the Mass Communications Department are so remote from each other. The educational advantages that would accrue from a cooperative effort between the two are staggering.

Being a Mass Com major, I obviously would not like to see the stations cease operation. However, the stations must be utilized for more than institutional prestige or their budgets are going to be increasingly difficult to justify.

'Tribal Eye' explores forms that shaped modern art

Matisse, Picasso and other artists in early 20th century Paris explored dusty junk shops and were astonished by their discoveries. Masks and statues, brought back by explorers from Africa and the Pacific, revealed realities that European artists had seldom considered.

While painting in Paris dealt mostly with outward appearances of the world, art from the jungles and islands clearly attempted to do no such thing. The grotesque and curious distortions of "tribal art" gave shape and form to inner realities and made visible the invisible.

"THE TRIBAL Eye," a television program which examines tribal art, airs today at 9 p.m. on channel 16. The production is a seven-part series and will be presented on Thursdays at the same time.

David Attenborough, 49, a former administrator for the BBC, narrates the series.

During the two years of filming, he received many gifts from native officials: a pig, a rooster and a half ton of yams and bananas among others. Local custom dictated that he accept the gifts, even though to do so often caused inconvenience.

But, when an old chief in Benin, Nigeria, offered his 48-year-old daughter as a wife, Attenborough steadfastly, but diplomatically, refused.

THE "CROOKED Beak of Heaven," the opening program of the series, will depict America's Northwest Coast Indians, who were probably the wealthiest of all people who have lived without either agriculture or industry.

Next week's segment, "Behind the Mask" explores the customs and traditions of the Dogon people just south of the Sahara Desert in the parched wilderness of Mali, West Africa.

"The Sweat of the Sun," the third program, was the name given gold by the Incas because it was plentiful. The Museum of Gold in Bogota, Columbia, now buys golden artifacts from grave robbers, even though the thefts are illegal.

To reach the Nambas tribe on Yabgitas in the New Hebrides of the Southwest Pacific, Attenborough and his crew had to across the same river 26 times. Once there, they witnessed Nambas' offerings to memorial sculptures made from the skulls of the men who were commemorated. The program is entitled "Man Blong Custom."

"THE WOVEN Gardens," fifth in the series, was filmed in Iran.

The nomadic Persian tribe, noted weavers, and subjects of the film, were almost perfect subjects. Attenborough said, "If you are unobtrusive...you are known simply as those crazy guys who are living over there."

"Kingdom of Bronze" was filmed in Benin, Nigeria, called "The City of Blood" because of massacres exchanged between the British and the natives in 1897. The Oba, or king, allowed filming of the palace where his harem stays and where previously no cameras had been allowed.

The last program of the series, "Across the Frontiers," examines the reactions of tribal cultures to the encroachment of other cultures.

'Damned' explores decadence

Luchino Visconti's 1969 film, "The Damned," is a complex work of movie art made, miraculously, without compromises. Nazi decadence has become a chic subject in the cinema with films like "Cabaret" and "The Night Porter."

In this film, Visconti has used Nazism as a metaphor for bisexuality and mayhem.

His genius is evident.

PATTERNED AFTER the Krupp dynasty, "The Damned" explores on a spectacular level the greedy, animalistic passions of a wealthy German steel family in the early 1930s.

For his centerpiece Visconti has the massacre of Roehm's elitist homosexual SA squad by Himmler's SS squad. The emotions concerning this and other violent events are seen through the eyes of the family members.

The great Ingrid Thulin (superb in Ingmar Bergman's "Cries and Whispers" a few seasons back) heads the cast as the ruthless Baroness von Essenbeck.

IN CAPTURING the lust for power and money of this tyrannical fag-hag mother, Thulin is devastating. Helmut Berger appears in the central role of the ambisexual son Martin, who resents his mother and her deliberate emasculation of him.

From his opening drag act as Marlene Dietrich (which his mother has made him perform) to his eventual triumph as controller of the vast family empire, Berger gives an intricate, striking performance.

Dirk Bogarde is somewhat miscast as Thulin's Macbeth-like lover, but his sensible readings prevent him from becoming too tiresome.

CHARLOTTE RAMPLING (who later starred with Bogarde in the promising but hopelessly dull "Night Porter") is cast as the innocent Elizabeth. As the naive girl who tries to escape the band of Wagnerian Little Foxes, Rampling provides a nice contrast to the coldly beautiful Thulin.

Also starring is Helmut Griem, who later played the bisexual Baron Maximilian in "Cabaret," as a menacing family Nazi. Renaud Verley is featured as the unassuming schoolboy Gunther, and Umberto Orsini is the wronged cousin Herbert.

Albrecht Schoenhals has a tiny role as the dying grandfather, and Rene Koldehoff is excellent as the coarse, vulgar uncle Konstantin.

THOSE WHO ARE fond of Nazi history will find "The Damned" quite to their liking. It is not a cynical film.

On the contrary, it is one of the few clear-eyed and personal looks at this era ever done.

The hungers, the passions, the motivations for degradation and

power come alive at the hands of Visconti. In getting at the baser human emotions on a large scale, there's not another director who can touch him.

The man who made his first worldwide impression in 1960 with "Rocco and His Brothers" found his finest screenplay here. From an original story by Nicola Baddalucco, the dialog by Baddalucco, Enrico Medioli and Visconti is crisp and lucid.

THE PHOTOGRAPHY by Pasquale de Santis and Armando Nannuzzi is stunning, a tribute to the director. The costumes (which won nine major fashion awards) by Piero Tosi of Rome are masterpieces, worn with style and sophistication by the stars.

"The Damned" is a staggering, hypnotic look at a fascinating era; it is also a movie made with care and precision by a master.

Rod Stewart rescheduled

Due to the sudden illness of Rod Stewart, last night's Jeff Beck, Faces and Aerosmith concert at the Lakeland Civic Center was postponed until tomorrow night. Times for the concert and ticket prices will remain the same as scheduled.

Series wins honor

"Growth: Who Pays?" a TV series on Florida's growth co-produced by Harmon McBride of WUSF-TV and campus cinematographer Bill Buxton, has won honorable mention in national competition. Women in Communication awarded the honor in the environmental category of The Clarion Awards.

The three-part documentary which aired last fall examined unplanned and ill-planned growth in Florida and some possible solutions.

The show explored the environmental impact of the state's current population of 8.5 million, which is increasing by 6,000 new residents each week, and the need for a plan of "managed growth" in Florida.

Produced by WUSF-TV, the documentaries were funded in part through a \$25,000 grant by the Florida Department of Education and shown on nine public television stations throughout the state.

COLLINS SAID he isn't alarmed.

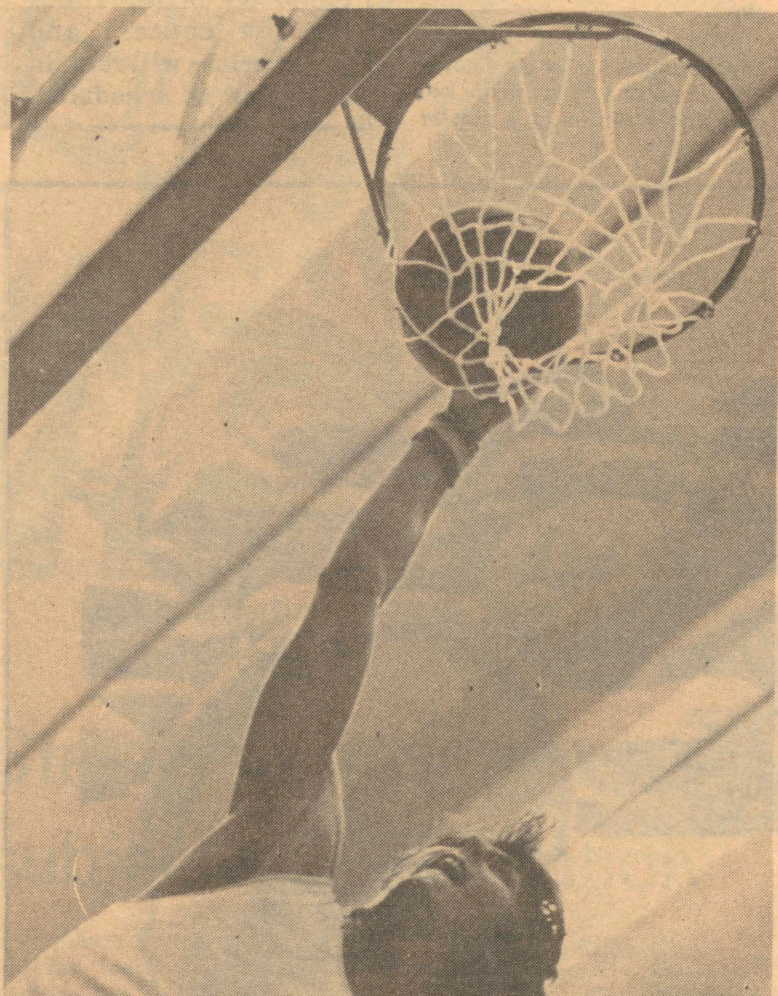
Davis will be seeing a doctor today and if the report is favorable, the coach expects him to begin practicing with the team.

Brahman bats spark explosion

With the Brahman team hitting less than .230, USF Baseball Coach Jack Butterfield knew the squad needed a spark.

But as the diamondmen traveled to the University of Tampa for a single game Tuesday afternoon, the coach couldn't have predicted the explosion that followed.

THE SPARK — Gary Smith's three-run homer in the third inning — ignited Brahman bats and when the smoke cleared the USF white team had won easily, 10-1.

John Pullaro and John Grocki crossed the plate ahead of Smith in the third as the Brahman scored all the runs they needed for team's seventh win in eight fall exhibition games.

RBI's by Mark Miggins and Dave Bearden, sandwiched around a passed ball, accounted for three USF runs in the sixth.

GROCKI, LEADING the team with a .444 average, singled home

Don Hogestyn in the seventh. Two batters later, Lou Garcia came up with the bases full and slammed a three-run double to complete the 10-run onslaught.

Tampa's lone run came in the ninth when catcher-turned-second baseman Bearden, in his first infield appearance in four years of college, booted a hot grounder.

Since some players had left early to get back in time for dinner, Bearden was forced to play at the keystone, and as Butterfield explained, "When the ball came at him, Dave went down to block it like a catcher."

DIAMOND DUST: Despite the Brahman's poor .230 team batting mark after eight games, several individuals have hot bats: Grocki, .444; Mark Simon, .353; Richard Skinner, .333; Smith, .316, 6 RBI's; John Shouse, .304, 4 doubles; Hogestyn, .294, 6 steals; Garcia and Scott Miller, each with .286...Butterfield said of Grocki, "John is a much tougher out than before. He's a lot quicker with the bat and is also trying switch-hitting, since he's had trouble with left-handers. At the end of the fall we'll have to make a hard decision as to whether he

will switch-hit in the regular season"...on the mound Jeff Walters, Tony Fossas and Wayne Dubois have yet to be scored on, while Chris Welsh has given up just one run in 10 innings of work...Bearden, Garcia and Welsh were given permission to attend games four and five of the World Series in Cincinnati. "I couldn't have said no to anyone that's so big of a baseball fan that they'd be willing to drive all that way," Butterfield said...USF entertains Hillsborough Community College today at 3:15 p.m. and plays another home-and-away twinbill with Eckerd

College tomorrow. The home half starts at 3:30 p.m. Saturday, it's two at home with St. Leo College beginning at 11 a.m. and Sunday the Brahman travel to Orlando for the Valencia Tournament.

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Gov. Reubin Askew yesterday refused to predict a winner of the Florida-Florida State football game.

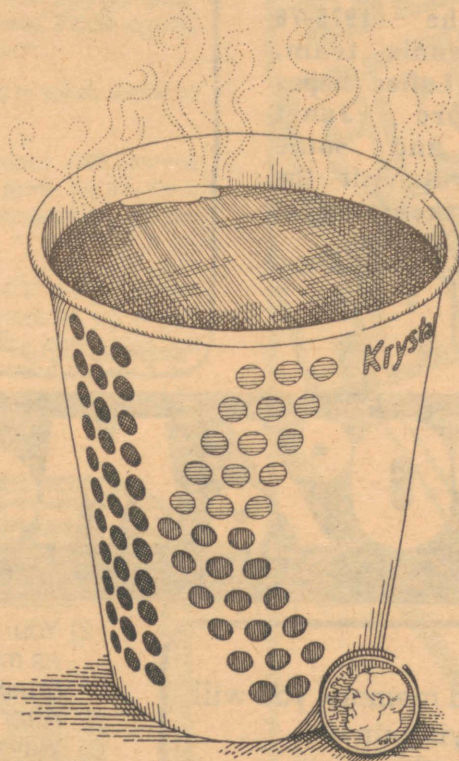

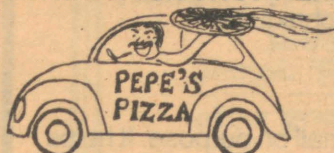

did," Christie said. "We are looking forward to the next tournament because we can do much better."

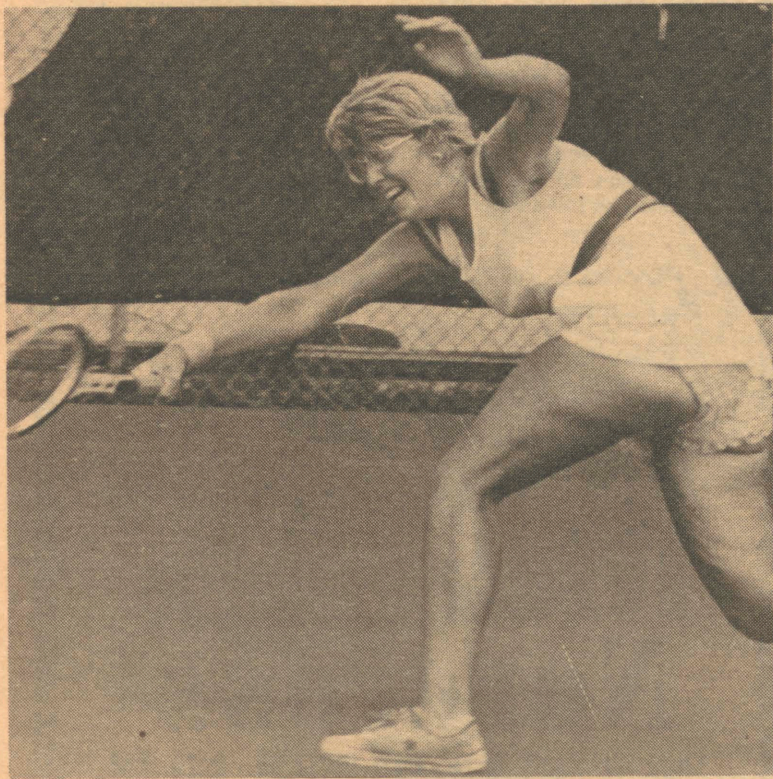
Mary Hathman (162), Dale Lundquist (164) and Marian Burke (166), led the way for USF.

Midgets mobbed, shorten season

KISSIMMEE (UPI) — The coaches of a Kissimmee midget football team who were clubbed to the ground by a mob of fans wielding sticks and pipes have called off the rest of their games with their Orlando rivals.

"I've been scared before, but I never saw anything like that mob," said Alan Baker, 24, a burly 240-pounder who volunteers his time as head coach of the Kissimmee Boys Club team for youths 12 and 13.

"THEY JUMPED us. They had clubs and pipes. The longer it progressed the worse it got. If it had lasted another five minutes there probably would have been 1,000 people in that mob there. They were coming from everywhere."

During the brawling Saturday afternoon in Orlando — just after the Kissimmee Midget Patriots had defeated the Southwest Blazers 2-0 in overtime — Assistant Coach Edward Murphy, a 206-pound pipefitter, was knocked unconscious and sprawled motionless on the ground for 20 minutes.

"He's dead," someone shouted. The mob scattered.

"That's what did it," Baker said. "They split like a bunch of rabbits."

MURPHY WAS hospitalized two days at Orange Memorial Hospital after remaining unconscious for four hours. Baker was treated and released, while Assistant Coaches Tom Bell and Bob Eby and Pat Eby, the parent of a player, suffered less serious injuries.

The club announced Monday it was canceling the two remaining games with the team from Orlando's Washington Shores section.

"We blame the leadership out there," Murphy said. "They should have a couple of policemen there. Leaders should control their community."

"The other coaches might have wanted to help us, but they didn't. They could have tried to get things calmed down."

MURPHY AND Baker said a group of outsiders, troublemakers 20-25 years old and not associated with the Boys Club, had harassed the Kissimmee team throughout the game.

"It was a normal football game," Murphy said. "It was rough. They have a good team. We were just leaving the field toward our cars and they were waiting for us."

Baker said the older brother of a Southwest player confronted Bell and asked if he had struck his brother.

"They jumped him," Baker said. "I got under them and said, Tommy, let's get out of here. Leave it alone. But then they hit him from behind the head. I threw him out, but they tackled him and it just broke loose."

"THEY CLUBBED Ed and he didn't move a muscle for 20 minutes. I mean he didn't budge. After they clubbed him I tried to get over to help him, but then I blacked out, too."

"The parents were getting the kids in the car. They did the right thing there. The way they were swinging those clubs and pipes, imagine if they had hit a kid. And they were beating and kicking us after we were down."

"It's a miracle somebody wasn't killed."

Police arrived shortly after the mob scattered.

FSU names Vinson new tennis mentor

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Ken Vinson, a teacher in Florida State University's Law school, is the Seminoles' new head tennis coach, FSU Athletic Director John Bridgers said yesterday.

Vinson, 40, succeeds Randy Jobson, who resigned to teach tennis at a Tallahassee country club.

Vinson, a member of the law school faculty since 1969, played college football at Rice University and North Texas State. He has been a private tennis instructor and has conducted tournaments for the Tallahassee Recreation Department.

"We feel fortunate to have a person the caliber of Ken Vinson right here on our campus willing to take over the duties of the tennis program," Bridgers said. "His background in tennis instruction and organization give him outstanding credentials as head coach. I am sure that he will continue to keep Florida State's tennis program at its current highly competitive level."

Awareness may be reason for no rapes

"Heightened awareness" among USF coeds may be a key to the lack of confirmed rapes on campus, University Police information officer Max Bromley said yesterday.

"We've had a good cooperative effort between dorm residents and the UP, and so far we've just been fortunate," Bromley said.

Ten incidents of rape have been reported to the Hillsborough County Sheriff's Department since February in the north county area. Police suspect one man may be responsible for all 10.

THERE HAVE been reports of rapes on campus but UP could not confirm any of them, Bromley said.

"For many girls this is their first connection with having to be concerned about rape. Many are accustomed to nice neighborhoods where the chances of rape are less and just aren't aware of what to look out for," Bromley said.

"We try to educate the girls in common-sense methods of how to stay away from rape."

The UP sponsored a Rape Prevention Seminar Qtr. 3, featuring Florida Atty. Gen. Robert Shevin. Bromley said Shevin has expressed a desire to return to this campus, and that the program may be repeated this year.

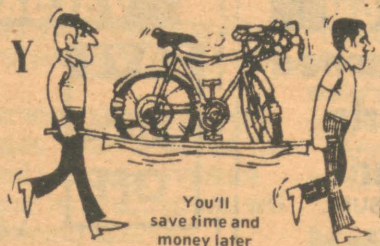
BROMLEY SAID "excellent lighting on campus serves as a deterrent to rape. USF is one of the best lighted of all campuses in the Southeast, he said.

Campus police have added two fulltime female officers to its force, a move Bromley said he feels might be helpful if a rape occurs.

"There's an obvious advantage in a rape victim talking to another woman. It's much easier in her traumatic state to express the facts in the case," Bromley said.

THE UP HAS ALSO been experimenting with a 10-hour, four-day work week that affords greater campus protection as a result of overlapping shifts, Bromley said.

If attacked—scream

Rape is a reality and all women are potential victims. Women should be prepared to deal with an attack, Jeannie Nable, an instructor in USF's anti-rape self-defense class, said.

If attacked, think — don't panic. One brochure says, "Most women escape a rapist by talking their way out of it."

Noise is the first defense — long, loud screaming. Nable said "Scream fire, not help. People feel very civic-minded going to a fire."

MANY TIMES a woman can put off the attacker momentarily by using things she is carrying or has on her person. She can use a lighted cigaret, pens or pencils, an aerosol perfume or hair spray, a rolled-up magazine or newspaper, keys, a stiff hair brush or steel comb or purse.

These suggestions are included in a rape prevention pamphlet published by the University of Florida:

Try to remember a description — age, hair color, race, clothing, height, weight, distinguishing characteristics (scars, tattoos, a limp, etc.), speech accents and patterns and complexion.

If a rape does occur, report immediately to the University Police (974-2628), local police or the sheriff's office.

AFTER REPORTING the rape the victim should not change clothing, should not clean her clothing or person and should not apply medication, according

to the handout given to students in the anti-rape self-defense class. "This may seem very cruel and against one's natural instincts, but such actions would destroy the physical evidence needed for prosecution of the rapist," the brochure says.

If the victim feels she needs a doctor, she can ask a police officer to call one for her.

In Hillsborough County, STOP RAPE is a 24-hour service for crisis calls from rape victims. The victim can call 228-RAPE.

State health plan rates going up 20-25 per cent

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Personnel Director Conley Kennison said yesterday rates for the state employees health insurance plan will go up 20 to 25 per cent under bids opened last week, and the state could be forced to reduced benefits.

Blue Cross-Blue Shield got some \$20 million for the group plan last year and a 25 per cent increase would raise total premiums to about \$25 million.

The state's share of the premiums last year was \$6 million and that is all the legislature included in this year's budget.

BIDS WERE TAKEN from four companies last Friday and they are being evaluated by the Department of Insurance, and the divisions of purchasing and personnel in the Department of Administration.

Kennison said a detailed report on the bids probably will be ready tomorrow, "but it looks now like there is going to be a 20 to 25 per cent increase."

The state has also taken bids for the first time on a group life insurance plan for its employees, but that coverage may not be offered and if it is, it probably will be in a separate contract.

DOA officials have warned that if the rates went up, a \$100 deductible provision might be tacked onto the medical coverage or benefits reduced in other ways.

THE COMPANIES offering bids for health insurance are Blue Cross, the Equity Life Insurance Society of the United States, Aetna and Travelers.

Blue Cross has held the contract for the last three years. It told DOA officials this spring it would have to raise rates. The department decided to re-bid the contract.

Blue Cross has agreed to continue coverage at present rates until Feb. 1.

Kennison would not discuss details of the bids, other than to say they are all higher than existing rates.

STATE EMPLOYEES with major medical coverage have a \$100 deductible now, but not employees with regular medical insurance.

A \$100 deductible would upset many employees because the most common claims are for \$50 or \$60 hospital emergency room bills, officials said.

"I would hope reduction of benefits is the very last thing we consider and I think it will be," Kennison said. "That's not a decision that is going to be made arbitrarily."

Med school to be checked

The Council of Advisors will tour USF's medical school when it meets there today, chairman Reece Smith said.

Secretary of State Bruce Smathers will address the group as part of his day-long visit to the campus.

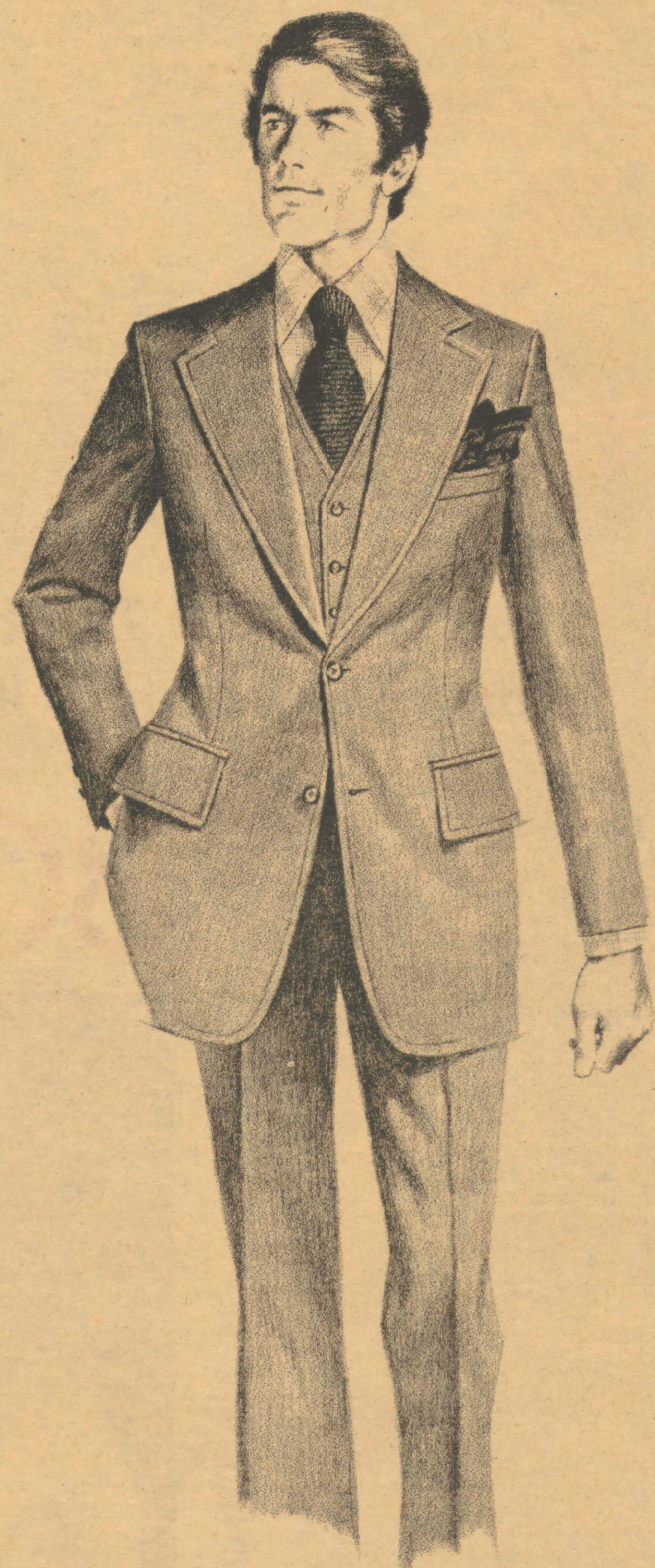
"We're going to acquaint ourselves with the facilities, the problems and concerns of the medical school as they relate to the university," Smith, a Tampa attorney, said.

The Council of Advisors is composed of community members not employed by the university but who have an interest in higher education.

Its functions are to provide a tie between the community and the university and to advise Pres. Cecil Mackey of "things of concern to USF," Smith said.

Smith is also a member of the university Mission and Goals Task Force.

He said he believes the university's major concern is "the question of how the state will fund higher education, not only at USF but all institutions in the state."

Stop light plans delayed

A delay in federal funding has postponed installation of a permanent traffic light for the intersection of 131st Avenue and 13th Street.

Last January, a flashing light was installed after USF students and the University Community Affairs Committee petitioned for a signal there.

Hillsborough County Traffic Engineer Nick DiGioia said the flasher was supposed to be temporary, but his department still has not received Federal Highway Safety Funds for the permanent light.

"Safety won't be improved by the light anyway," he said. "All it will

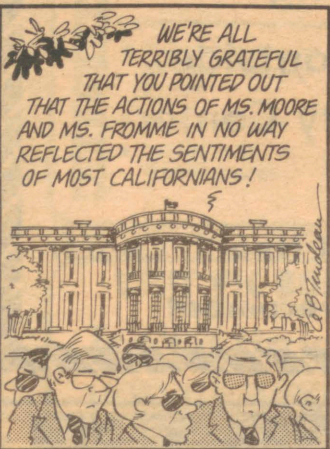
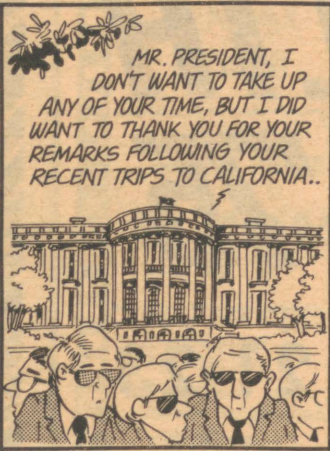
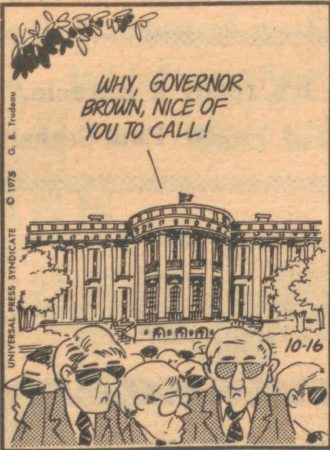
do is provide for an orderly flow of traffic and it will satisfy the USF students who have been trying to get it installed."

There are not many accidents on the corner and the light is not really necessary, he said.

There are no statistics available on the number of accidents at the intersection, but DiGioia said they are mostly "fender benders" and not considered serious.

"Compared to any other intersection carrying the same amount of traffic, I'd say the accident rate is a low one on a scale of one to five," he said.

The Student Senate's University Community Affairs Committee has not taken any action on the problem since the flashing light was installed, committee member Eric Draper said.



FORML seeking fresh leadership

The USF chapter of the Florida Organization for the Reform of Marijuana Laws "needs fresh leadership" to be effective this year, Mike Malter, FORML co-chairman, said.

"We'd like to begin legal research into Florida laws, but right now we don't have the capability," he said.

Malter and co-chairman Parker Stokes are the only USF members of FORML.

"We're at the position now

where legislation is too slow for us," Malter said. "No elected official will take a stand on marijuana reform until after the November, 1976, elections. It's politically dangerous."

Last year, FORML members backed a bill to lessen the penalty for marijuana possession, but it was killed in the House.

Persons interested in joining FORML should call Malter or Stokes at 621-3837.

Business course planned

Cancer recovery deemed 'miracle'

COLUMBUS, Ohio (UPI) — Linda Hardy, the specter of death apparently cast from her once-cancerous body through what her doctor calls a "miracle," faces an evidently bright future with the three children for whose future happiness she fought so desperately.

Hardy first gained national attention a year ago when, resigned to the fact of terminal cancer, she set about looking for a family to adopt the youngsters after her death.

HUNDREDS OF offers to take the children poured in from across the country, but now, after six operations, she apparently won't need the help.

"It's unbelievable!" declared Dr. Paul Gutheil. "It's really a miracle, a miracle."

Gutheil said it was impossible to tell for sure whether the disease is completely cured and will not return, but "you can see no sign of cancer in the areas involved: her lungs, rib cage and dorsal areas. It's a miracle!"

"She's a strong Catholic, and she never really stopped praying and hoping," he said.

THE LAST operation in the series, which included a mastectomy, was the final one in the cancer treatment process directed by surgeon Dr. William Bradway.

Hardy, who was not available for comment, "somehow

responded favorably to chemotherapy and the surgery," Gutheil said.

"We had her in the hospital for an evaluation," he said, "and you can see no sign of cancer. It's a miracle!"

Cars ignore blind students

Blind students are having problems with traffic along Holly Drive, between Argos and Andros

complexes, Handicapped Students Adviser Dale Hartmen, said.

According to Florida law, traffic must stop whenever a pedestrian with a white cane or

guide dog approaches a crosswalk.

LENORA MCGOWAN, a blind student, said she has almost been hit at least once and has waited for "about 10 minutes" several times for traffic to stop.

"It's not so bad at the curb, because you can step back, but in the middle of the crosswalk the cars may only stop in one direction," McGowan said.

The students also are having troubles with bicycles, both parked and moving.

"A bike is silent except when its ratcheting and a blind person doesn't know which way to dodge," Hartman said.

BIKES HAVE BEEN parked along the wheelchair ramps and building entrance ramps, hampering wheelchair and blind students. When a blind person uses a cane to find a safe pathway it can strike a bicycle causing an accident, Hartman said.

The worst times are between classes; when people are rushing "they won't stop for nothing," he said.

To bring national attention to the problem, President Ford declared yesterday White Cane Safety Day and called for motorists and bicyclists to be alert for pedestrians using white canes or walking with guide dogs.

Israel, Syria war possible

JERUSALEM (UPI) — Israeli military and political leaders yesterday raised the possibility of war with Syria once the U.N. mandate on the Golan Heights expires, with the chief of military intelligence predicting Jordan's

entry into the fighting.

Foreign Minister Yigal Allon said Damascus might resort to a military option to force international intervention in the Middle East, but he did not explain whether he meant a

possible confrontation between the United States and the Soviet Union.

Maj. Gen. Shlomo Gazit, the chief of military intelligence, said that "in the event of war between Israel and Syria, we should take it as a very high, high probability" that Jordan would fight or enter the conflict.

JORDAN, WHICH recently joined in a political and military alliance with Syria, sent a tank brigade to fight alongside the Syrians in the 1973 October war. But it did not formally enter the war.

Both men spoke at a symposium on the military aspects of the Israeli-Arab conflict. Chief of

Staff Lt. Gen. Mordechai Gur told the conference that the recent development of ultra-sophisticated weapons such as advanced missiles would make it "almost impossible" for Israel to return to her pre-1967 war boundaries.

The Israelis' comments followed a series of war-like remarks by Syria and expressions of concern by Israeli leaders over the situation in the Golan Heights.

In a television appearance Tuesday night, Prime Minister Yitzhak Rabin said he would not "completely rule out that Syria is also liable to exploit the unstable situation in Lebanon to achieve its purposes."

HE HINTED AT the possibility of Israeli intervention in Lebanon should Syria meddle in the civil strife there, saying that "Israel has an interest in the existence of Lebanon as it is."

Syria accused Israel yesterday of launching a "criminal attack" in the killing of two Syrians in the Golan Heights and the commander of the Syrian air force spoke of constant vigilance against what he called Israel's "wish for expansion and invasion."

Tel Aviv military sources denied broadcast Syrian reports that Israel has begun a major troop buildup for the purposes of aggression.

refugee camps in the Arab sector to find out what the people want.

"We have dialog and encounters and we speak of our common future," Abileah continued.

"WE ARE TRYING to have this dialog in a brotherly way with respect to the views of the people of other countries. The simple brotherly human way is

the way these people will understand."

Following Abileah's speech, Dr. Abdelwahab Hechiche, assistant professor of Interdisciplinary Studies, commented in support of the society's ideals. "I believe in his utopia," Hechiche said. "If there must be a confederation, I agree with Mr. Abileah. He is closer to the reality."

him to be a participant in the cover-up," the report said.

The unsigned report—for sale for \$2.65—summarizes the work of Special Prosecutors Archibald Cox, Leon Jaworski, Henry S. Ruth Jr. and their staffs since the office was set up some months ago. The office compiled a record of five dozen convictions, including those of many high government officials.

Thus far, the report said, Watergate investigations have cost more than \$5.5 million.

AMONG THE mysteries left unsolved are who caused the infamous 18½-minute gap on a crucial Watergate tape, and whether the Nixon White House deliberately tampered with transcripts provided for the impeachment inquiry. The report said criminal responsibility was impossible to prove.

Calling Watergate the "insidious climax" to years of growing governmental abuse of power, the report urged a strengthening of laws to guard against future crises—including a constitutional amendment to clarify when a president may be prosecuted.

In an interview, Ruth said there was "never a firm decision to proceed with criminal action against Nixon."

But the report clearly indicated the prosecutors were on the verge of an indictment twice—once in

January, 1974 when evidence of his involvement in the cover-up seemed sufficient; and again at the time of his resignation eight months later when he released long-suppressed tape transcripts that proved it.

THE PROSECUTORS concluded after research and "in tense debate" that there was no constitutional bar indicting a president. But Jaworski, according to the report, felt the Supreme Court "would not uphold an indictment" and that the constitutional struggle would thwart the impeachment process already underway.

The grand jury settled instead for naming Nixon as unindicted co-conspirator.

College teams document hurricane damages

TALLAHASSEE (UPI) — Teams from the State University System are documenting damage to the Florida Panhandle from Hurricane Eloise and assisting in long-range recovery efforts, Chancellor E. T. York said yesterday.

York, in a report to Gov. Reubin Askew, said university research teams are documenting beach erosion, crop loss and other damages, and preparing recommendations for economic redevelopment of the ravaged areas.

Dr. James Purpura, professor of Engineering Sciences at the University of Florida, and seven employees of UF's Coastal and Oceanographic Laboratory, worked throughout the hurricane measuring its intensity, York said.

AFTER THE STORM, the

team assessed erosion damage and is now working with the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers in preparing recommendations for rebuilding the eroded areas.

Dr. Pete Bennett, assistant to Stanley Marshall, Florida State University president, is leading a study of FSU faculty members on "economic redevelopment, both short and long range" for the counties hit by Eloise.

Dr. Jay Baker, FSU professor of Geography, is taking a group of graduate students to Panama City Beach and Fort Walton Beach this weekend to question property owners on the effectiveness of government regulations, including flood plain zoning, mobile home regulations and building codes.

University of West Florida scientists are studying the

estuarine biology of the Panhandle to determine storm damage.

"BECAUSE OF financial losses sustained by residents of the area, the university has extended the period for payment of student fees, and has made available special allocations of financial aid for students from the affected area," York said.

Representatives of the Institute of Food and Agricultural Sciences at UF "have been busily involved in helping agricultural interests in the Panhandle to minimize losses from the storm."

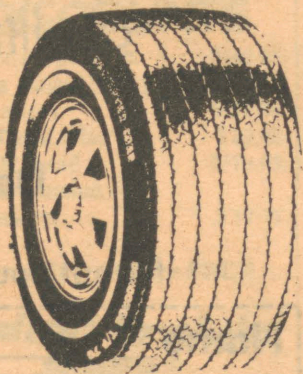

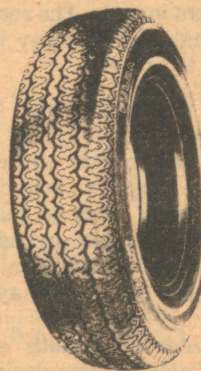

Nader claims poll results suppressed

WASHINGTON (UPI) — Ralph Nader said yesterday the Federal Energy Administration suppressed a poll showing 94 per cent of Americans oppose allowing air-polluting power plants to be built where the air is clean.

The FEA denied the charge. "FEA OFFICIALS have contrived arguments that rival the worst pollution excuses of the auto and electric power industries," Nader, the consumer activist, said in a letter to Sen. Edmund S. Muskie, D-Maine.

The FEA denied suppressing the poll showing 94 per cent of the American people oppose its policy of allowing air-polluting power plants to be built in clean air regions of the country, and showing only 2 per cent support for dispersing such plants.

The poll was available to the public through the National Energy Information Center, an FEA spokesman said, and even was cited by Russell E. Train, head of the Environmental Protection Agency, in a speech before the Southern Governors Conference last month.

"We don't suppress these polls," a spokesman said. He said a press release may not be made on every poll and there may be a lag between when a poll is made and when FEA prepares a report on it, but the raw information is transmitted to other government agencies.

NADER SAID that FEA officials failed to disclose the poll when lobbying Congress for changes in the Clean Air Act.

USF student in contest

A USF sophomore has qualified to represent the Central West Coast area in the 25th annual "Jeanie With the Light Brown Hair" auditions to be held Oct. 24-25 at the Stephen Foster Memorial.

Soprano Elizabeth Rivers, 20, of Tampa, along with 24 other young Floridians, is seeking the title of "Jeanie for 1976." The event, sponsored by the trustees of the Stephen Foster Memorial and the Florida Federation of Music Clubs, will award scholarships of up to \$4,000.

Advice offered

An assistant public defender for the city of Tampa, Fred Vollrath, is offering legal advice to students through Student Government legal advocate's office.

Students with legal problems ranging from landlord-tenant disputes to insurance technicalities should contact the legal advocate in UC 156, or call 974-2401. If the problem warrants professional attention, the office will contact Vollrath.

Nader's letter to Muskie, who heads a subcommittee considering extension of the Clean Air Act, said the poll also shows two out of seven Americans are so concerned about clean air they would oppose the construction of new steel mills or power plants, even if unemployment and power shortages resulted.

"Information has come to my attention," Nader said, "that while the FEA officials lobbied members of the committee for maintaining polluted air, they failed to disclose an FEA commissioned public opinion poll that 'Finally, the main reason for support for clean air.'

"The poll showed that 94 per cent of the American public oppose and only 2 per cent support the administration's policy of dispersing air polluting power plants into areas which still have clean air, and that by a 2-1 margin the public is willing to meet the statutory emission standards..." he added.

NADER SAID the FEA has been claiming that the nation's energy requirements are such as to warrant the construction of

power plants in remote rural areas, without smokestack scrubbers or other anti-pollution devices. Extension of the Clean Air Act has been put off until after the current congressional recess.

The poll, conducted by Opinion Research Corp., was based on 511 interviews. The FEA memo on it said:

"Fully two out of seven of those interviewed with an opinion would oppose construction of new steel mills and power plants, even if this caused unemployment and power shortages, and a substantial majority would oppose construction on a balance. demonstrated overwhelming opposing air pollution is that three out of five Americans say that the primary problem caused by air pollution relates to health...It is this association of air pollution with health problems that provides the very strong base of support for environmental laws in this area, even at some personal monetary expense."

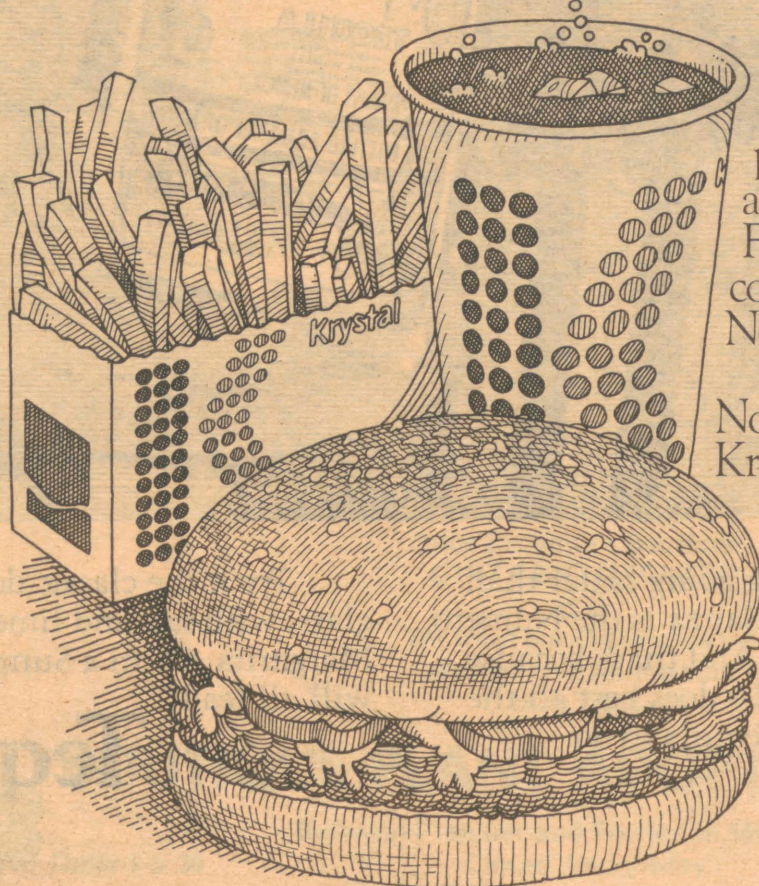

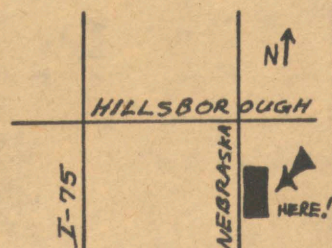
