# 12-student class rule: 'It's really killing us'

A rule requiring colleges to drop classes having less than 12 students is wreaking havoc in some USF departments and having little effect on others, according to several department chairmen and college deans.

"It's really killing us," said Dr. Norman Oleson, chairman of the Physics Department.

According to Oleson, the Board of Regents' plan, which seeks to save money by eliminating "low-demand" courses, harms small-enrollment programs.

MANY UPPER-LEVEL courses, which require prerequisites, have to be held off until enough persons have taken the prerequisites, slowing a student's progress in the program, he said.

The department had to cancel five 400-level courses this quarter, he said.

On the other hand, Dean Robert Cox of the College of Business Administration, said he has had to cancel very few classes in his

departments because the college is "filled to overflowing with students."

Cox said that in most cases where a class has too few students, there are other sections of the same class open.

HE ADMITTED that there might be some trouble with senior or graduate courses, "which by their nature are in less demand."

The regents' rule requires cancellation of undergraduate classes with fewer than 12 students and graduate courses with fewer than seven students. The rule is intended to save money for the university system.

But, that may backfire, Oleson said, because many graduate students needed to teach lower-level classes may transfer to states with universities that don't have the class-size rule.

SWIHART SAID he thought the rule should not be difficult to accept because it is not too different from past department or college guidelines used to determine class frequency.

Economically, the university cannot afford many classes with fewer

## Banks avoid credit tuition plan

Since students were first authorized three years ago to pay for tuition and fees by credit card, USF has been unable to get any Tampa area bank to accept a campus account, according to administrators.

"Local bankers will not even talk to us about it," Robert Wallace, vice president for administration, said yesterday.

IN JUNE 1974, Gov. Reubin Askew signed into law a bill authorizing Florida's university system to accept credit-card payments for tuition and fees. The problem in the law, according to Wallace, is that the bill provides that the universities may not pay a service charge.

Because of this stipulation, he said, "Master Charge and BankAmericard banks will not allow us to participate in this area."

Florida Credit Service Center Inc. handles the accounts for most Tampa area banks, and without the service charge they would lose money, account manager Cliff Smith said.

If the law is changed to permit service charges, "every bank in the state would be jumping at you," Smith said.

But according to Bill Law, an administrative assistant of the state Board of Regents, "The banks are taking a hard line on this (service charge)."

THE UNIVERSITY system is a "half-billion dollar a year enterprise that is being denied an elementary

business tool," Law said.

Law said students would benefit from the use of credit-card payments because it would reduce the large lump-sum cash payment and make it easier to keep records of education expenses.

The credit-card companies would benefit from having more students participate in credit-card services offered offcampus, Law said.

The Exchange Bank (of Tampa), has never been approached by USF on this issue, bank representative P. J. Batcho said yesterday.

Riva Wright, marketing manager of a Tampa bank said that she could not comment without studying the law "for at least three weeks."

## Arms talks falter

MOSCOW — Soviet leader Leonid Brezhnev flatly rejected both of President Carter's disarmament proposals and presented no new Kremlin offer on arms reductions, a disappointed Secretary of State Cyrus Vance said yesterday.

"I am disappointed," Vance said in a news conference after the failure of his first mission to Moscow as Secretary of State and the first major diplomatic defeat for the Carter Administration.

"WE HAVE FAILED to make progress in the essential of all areas."

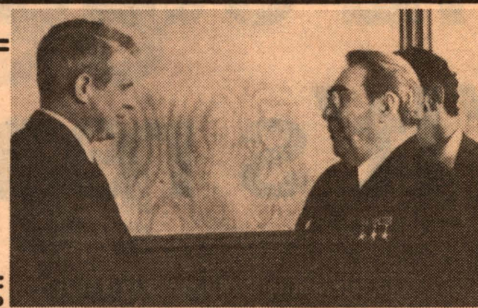
"The Soviets told us they examined out two proposals and did not find either acceptable. They proposed nothing new on their side,"

Vance said it would be a "tragedy" if the breakdown in the U.S.-Soviet arms talks led to a new acceleration of the arms race.

However, Vance said he would meet Soviet Foreign Minister Andrei Gromyko in May to continue discussions on strategic arms and the Middle East. He added that the two sides did agree to set up 10 working groups to continue a dialogue on major diplomatic and military problems.

## Carter to stand firm

WASHINGTON — President Carter said yesterday he will "hang tough" and keep pressing the Soviets for nuclear-arms cuts despite their abrupt rejection of U.S. proposals. But he warned he might approve development of new weapons if Moscow will not cooperate.

Carter went into unprecedented detail on the U.S. proposals and said he assumed the Kremlin simply found them too "radical" in their sweeping proposals to reduce nuclear missile and bomber forces.

THE PRESIDENT insisted he

has seen no "evidence" to prove the Soviet rejection was motivated by anger over his human-rights crusade. But he said that, in any case, he will go right on speaking out in defense of human rights worldwide.

Carter, speaking without notes after briefing a bipartisan congressional delegation, laid out the list and particulars of the American proposals:

— The simplest proposal, he said, was to ratify the agreement made in Vladivostok in 1974 between President Ford and Leonid Brezhnev. Carter said the

Soviets maintained that the previous American Administration had agreed to include the American long-distance cruise missile in the total allowed count of 2,400 weapons. Carter said he had checked with Ford and former Secretary of State Henry Kissinger and they said they had not made such an agreement.

## House Budget Committee proposes increased deficit

WASHINGTON — The House Budget Committee yesterday recommended a 1978 budget — with a deficit \$6.6 billion bigger than proposed by the Administration — that would restore much of the money for water development projects that President Carter wants to review.

After three days of debate, the committee voted 16 to 9 to approve a target ceiling on spending of \$462.3 billion for the fiscal year beginning Oct. 1, \$2.9 billion more than Carter recommended.

It proposed \$398.1 billion in revenues, which is \$3.6 billion less than Carter asked, producing a deficit of \$64.3 billion, compared to \$57.7 billion projected by Carter.

Much of the added deficit reflects more pessimistic economic estimates by the committee as to how fast the economy will recover, which determines how much the government receives in taxes and must pay out in welfare and unemployment compensation.

### 'Why require insurance?' -Barron

TALLAHASSEE — Two of the three members of a Senate insurance subcommittee, Dempsey Barron and John Ware, said yesterday the state should not force motorists to carry insurance.

"Why require people to carry any insurance at all on any side of the spectrum?" asked Barron, D-Panama City.

The state does not make a citizen buy life insurance or fire insurance for his home and it should not force him to buy automobile coverage, Barron argued.

He also contended that most people buy health insurance which would cover medical bills from an automobile accident.

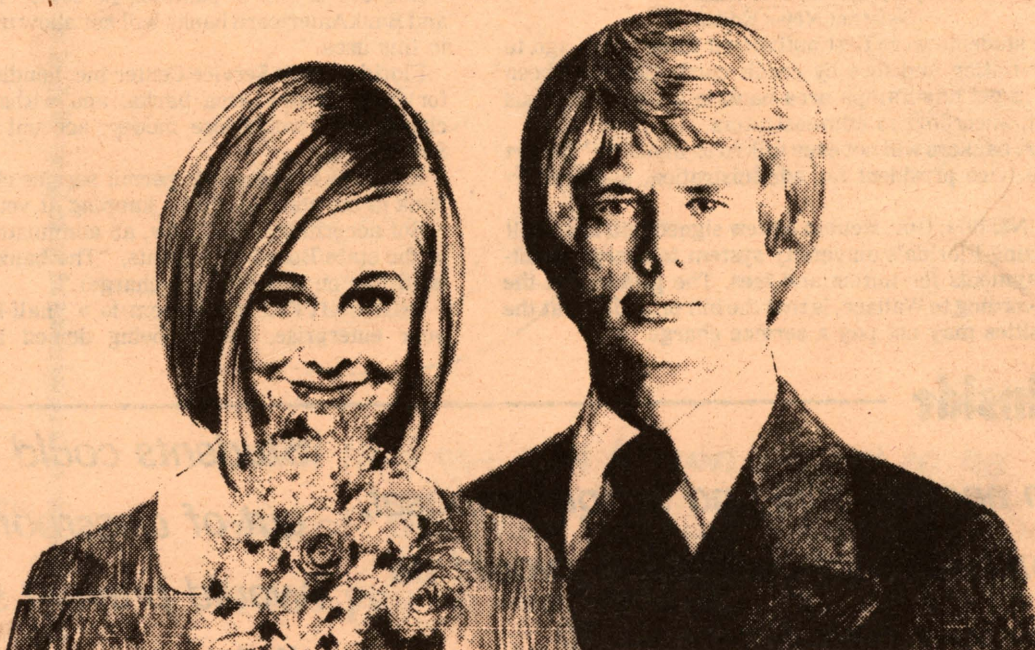

## SG sees close fund watch

Campus organizations had better not count their chickens before they are hatched, following action taken by USF's Student Government (SG) Senate Tuesday.

The senate passed a resolution requiring that allocation of student money to campus groups be done without regard to how much they received in the past.

ORGANIZATIONS will be funded "from the ground up," said Sen. Michael Rome, who proposed the resolution.

Sen. Paul Austin said he opposed the resolution because the senate will have to do historic budgeting in many areas, including, for example, the men's basketball team. A majority consensus on the resolution did not require a vote.

In other business, the senate discussed but tabled two other resolutions, formed several committees, elected committee chairmen and heard a report by SG Pres. Les Miller.

Legislation concerning new rules of procedure, including a point system for recording senator absences, was sent to committee for study.

THE PLAN called for each senator to receive half a point for each of the twice-a-meeting checks missed, with resignation or impeachment following accumulation of a determined number of points.

Gary Musselman, senate president, later threatened impeachment of senators who miss the April 16 and 17 Activities and Services money-budget hearings.

"By skipping out on budget hearings, you're skipping out on what students elected you to do," Musselman told the senators.

Amendments to the finance code were also tabled.

Miller said the senate and his administration "must communicate and communicate well." With a "mature, responsible attitude," the senate and Miller can overcome internal problems and everything can run smoothly, he said.

MILLER'S cabinet positions will be voted on by the senate at the next meeting. The Internal Affairs Committee must approve the cabinet positions before the senate votes.

Miller said his cabinet members were responsible and mature and said they could work well with the senate and himself.

Discussing USF's Presidential Search committee, Miller urged senators to become active in the search.

Senators must consider the future of the university even

though the senate may not be in office when the new president comes into power, Miller said. "It's our university no matter if it's 10 years from now," he added.

Senators and the posts they were elected to are: Sen. Cathy Townsend, president of the senate pro tem; Sen. Lorna Musselman, Budget Committee chairwoman; Sen. Martin Locklear, Internal Affairs Committee chairman; Sen. Brian Crawford, Student Affairs Committee chairman.

Also, Sen. Alan Steinberg, Academic Affairs Committee chairman; Sen. Michael Robinson, University Affairs Committee chairman; Sen. Betty Locklear, Communications Affairs Committee chairwoman and Steve Butler and Kacy Curry, two senators for the Student Government Productions Review Board.

## Theatre Gallery Art: not just for its sake

"Art for art's sake," said French philosopher Victor Cousin. Little did he know that art has many uses — one of them being theatrical costume and stage design.

"Stage Design at USF," the art show at the Theatre Lobby Gallery (TAT), which runs through April 5, is a fine example of art not having to be created just for its sake. Included in this exhibit are works of resident artists, Theatre Dept. faculty and students.

Designs from recent stage productions here, such as "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern are Dead," "La Boheme," "A Little Night Music" and "Macbeth," are captured through sketches, costumes, models, color photographs and blueprints

of the stage setting.

INK, TEMPERA and pencil drawings (by Associate Prof. William A. Lorenzen) of cast members of "Rosencrantz and Guildenstern Are Dead," are vivid and representative of the real costumes which actors used in the play.

For the opera "La Boheme," the story of young artists in 19th century Paris, Gerry Leahy did a rich, earthy ink and watercolor drawing of the setting for Act II. Leahy is a set and costume designer-in-residence for the Florida Center for the Arts.

"Macbeth" is represented by a model of a fortress and water colors of costumes by Bambi-Jeanne Stoll, associate professor of Theatre.

Stoll's costume designs are also currently featured in an exhibit at the Tampa Public Library, 900 N. Ashley St. The exhibit is open free to the public during regular library hours.

The exhibit in TAT is open weekdays from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free.

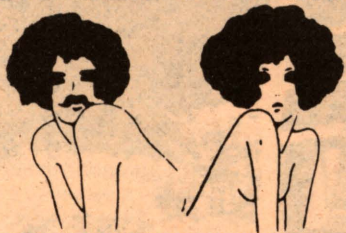

# If the caller means business...

USF has had as many bomb threats so far this year as it had for all of 1976, and it's starting to "tick" some people off.

Since January, 18 calls have come in claiming a bomb will go off in a specific building on campus — mostly in the college of Business Administration.

**IRKED BY** the constant interruption and annoyance, several faculty members and administrators have decided to do something about it.

They've come up with a plan they think will deter bomb scares, by getting around what they believe the caller's goal is: to cancel a test.

In event of a threat, students are to meet with their professors at a pre-arranged point near the building for instructions as to where else on campus the class will meet.

The names of those students who don't show up at the designated classroom are put into a computer and programed to search for trends.

**CO-CONSPIRATORS** OF the contingency plan were Business Dean Robert Cox, campus police chief Paul Uravich and a couple of Business College department chairmen.

"We think it's a 95 per cent probability they (the calls) are related to exams," Cox said. "The other 5 per cent is related to some nut, and there's not a thing you can do about that."

## Photography exhibit open to university

The first USF Photo Club Exhibit will be held in the UC gallery - April 18 through 22.

All USF students and faculty are eligible to submit black and white or color photographs on any subject. Number of entries will be limited by space available.

All photographs must be mounted and no larger than 18" X 24". Entries may be turned in to Dawn Livingston at the UC desk no later than Saturday April 16.

He said that under the plan, the fact that the classes will be held regardless of a bomb threat should deter someone trying to get out of an exam via a threat.

The Colleges of Engineering and Social Behavioral Sciences have similar contingency plans, Cox said. ALL went into effect a few weeks ago.

**COX EMPHASIZED** that students whose names are put into the computer will not be

harassed or contacted.

He said the university recognizes that some students miss classes and that being absent during a bomb scare will not make them automatic suspects.

The computer will look for trends, such as which students from which classes at what times are absent when these bomb threats come in. He said other information will be "input," such as which professors scheduled

exams on a day a bomb threat is received.

University police report five bomb scares so far this year in the College of Business, three in Engineering, three in Arts and Letters and two in Physics. The rest showed one each for other selected buildings on campus.

Cox said he thinks Business gets the distinction of having the most threats because of "pressures" relating to the subject matter offered.

# Semesters to get another shot

The Board of Regents Monday will once again vote on changing state universities from the quarter to the modified-semester system.

Plans to initiate a semester system that would provide a common academic calendar among the nine state universities and 28 community colleges were tabled by the regents March 7. Questions were raised about the cost to universities changing from quarters to semesters and by persons favoring the quarter system.

"I WILL VOTE no now, I will vote no when you've done all your studies on cost and I will vote no a year from

now," regent Marshall Harris said at the meeting.

One drawback of the semester system is that students who are not suited or are flunking in a certain area, such as chemistry, are delayed in changing majors due to the longer semester term, Harris said.

Harris said that 40 per cent of the students taking the beginning chemistry course at Florida State University fail. "Under the semester system you've got them hanging around another eight weeks," he said.

"It is a benefit to us to find out quicker if a student is where he thinks he belongs," Harris said.

DR. CARL RIGGS, USF vice president for Academic Affairs, said he favors the modified-semester system.

Under the current quarter system, professors don't have time to give adequate exams and a study of universities showed that institutions which had changed from quarters preferred the semester system, Riggs said.

Under the common academic calendar plan, state universities would have two 16-week semesters and a 12-week summer period divided into two six-week sessions.

The regents, meeting at the University of West Florida in Pensacola, will also decide if USF's College of Education will be allowed to keep its doctorate program in education, if the college will have to initiate a minimum 2.5 grade-point average requirement for students entering this fall and if it will have to give competency tests.

## Ticket law 'unnecessary'

There may not be a need for legislation forcing university students to pay campus traffic fines because very few USF students neglect to pay, University Police Traffic Coordinator Otto Meerbott said.

State Rep. Clyde Hagler, D-Pensacola, earlier this week introduced a proposal to the state legislature preventing students who fail to pay traffic fines from registering for classes.

But, Meerbott said, of the 12,000 traffic tickets that went uncollected last year only a handful were violations by students.

CAMPUS VISITORS make up the bulk of unpaid tickets, Meerbott said.

Usually what happens is that a

campus visitor will enter the university from a side entrance avoiding the visitors' booth at the main entrance where visitor parking permits are distributed, Meerbott said.

The visitor will park in a restricted area and the car will be ticketed, he said. Since the car isn't driven by a student there is no way to enforce the fine if the visitor refuses to pay, he said.

If a student or staff member fails to pay a fine he is easily tracked down through the university, Meerbott said.

HAGLER SAID students avoid payment of traffic fines by choosing to have cases heard in a county court, not a university court.

"In Tallahassee, county courts say they are not going to hear

campus cases; therefore they are not going to fine anybody," Hagler said.

Hagler's bill would eliminate the option of students using county courts, thus forcing students to go through the university court. If a student failed to pay a fine or appear in court he would not be permitted to register the following quarter, according to Hagler's proposal.

# Plan favors 'quality' programs

State University System planners are considering a plan to financially favor "programs of exceptionally high quality" over regular university programs, the newest of our Role and Scope discussion papers states.

That proposal, as well as others on dormitories, university research, public service, remedial education, contracting and location of duplicate programs, is scheduled to be discussed in Tallahassee on April 6 by a university system task force.

IN 1975, a plan was adapted to establish 23 so-called "programs of distinction" that, theoretically, would gain national attention.

The new paper states "some of the original assumptions (in the 1975 proposal) are changed."

This proposal, dated March 24, says money for programs of distinction would be in addition to funds allocated for "regular curricula."

HOWEVER, THE proposal states that if the legislature fails to allocate money for those high-quality programs, "the order of priorities will favor the required funding for programs of distinction over the maintenance of marginal regular programs."

Also, "admissions standards for the programs of distinction may be more demanding than for

regular programs," the document states.

The paper concedes that implementation of these programs "might dilute the quality" of traditional university programs.

"In addition," the paper states, "the proposal might engender intra-university jealousy between personnel of regular programs and programs of distinction."

A copy of the 10-page paper was received at USF on Monday. Interim Pres. Reece Smith has sought a delay on the scheduled discussion to enable the university to prepare its reply, his assistant, Joe Busta, said yesterday.

CONCERNING THE research proposal, the paper states: "All university faculty should be provided the time and the resources to engage in scholarly activity sufficient to remain current in their respective academic fields."

In other matters:

The proposal calls for "a categorical allocation (of money) to each university which is based upon the total population within its continuing education service area."

That suggestion also states that each university has a "basic responsibility" of public service and that "each institution should develop mechanisms to provide the citizens of Florida access to the expertise of its faculty."

The paper also suggests a concentrated effort "to coordinate instructional programs, student activities and dormitory operations to ensure that each becomes an integral part of the total educational experience."

"WHEN DORMITORY capacity is not sufficient to serve all students requesting housing, priority should be given for each commuter to have at least one

term on campus before others who can commute have a second or third term in campus housing."

Also, "where design and legal restrictions permit, dormitories should be converted to other uses, such as faculty and administrative offices."

The paper also states that given Florida's extensive network of community colleges that

maintain an open-door admission policy, "the State University System should not provide remedial education."

And in order to "prevent unnecessary competition between the public and private sectors of higher education... the State University System should utilize the opportunity of contracting for instructional services and-or facilities."

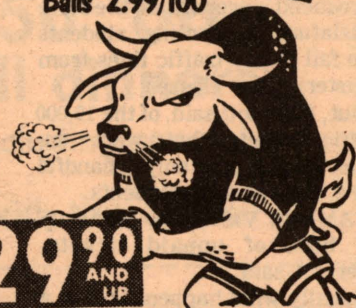

## Response time sought

USF officials last night said they want the scheduled April 6 discussion of a new Role and Scope proposal delayed to allow more time to prepare comprehensive responses.

Interim Pres. Reece Smith said he has asked that the Role and Scope advisory task force meeting be delayed for two weeks.

Dr. Carl Riggs, vice president for Academic Affairs, said the university was not given enough time to respond to the fourth Role and Scope proposal that, among other things, would give financial favor to "programs of distinction" over regular university programs.

USF HAS FOUR programs of distinction: Clinical Community, Applied Gerontology, Applied Anthropology and Water Resources.

"I don't see how they expect us to get faculty input in only two or three days," Riggs said at a reception prior to the dedication of USF's new baseball field.

A copy of the 10-page paper was received in Smith's office on Monday, and both the president and vice president said they have not had time to study it.

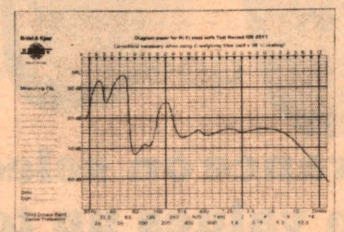
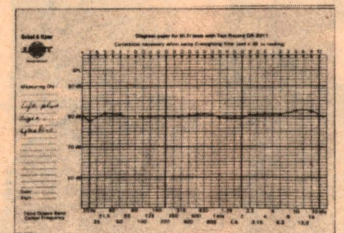

than 12 undergraduates, Swihart said. If small classes became the rule, more faculty would have to be hired, which the university system cannot afford, he said.

Oleson said he sees no way to ensure that upper-level students get the required courses, other than putting the courses on independent study, which requires an S-U grade not satisfactory for doctoral candidates.

The rule also harms students who want to work in a co-op program in which they alternate quarters of school with quarters of work, according to Dean Edgar Kopp of the College of Engineering.

"WHERE WE COULD teach a course twice a year to insure that the co-op students were able to take it, this rule forces us to teach some of the more specialized courses once a year, meaning that some students can't co-op because they have to stay here to take the course."

Kopp added that most of his college's graduate courses are not harmed because they are taught at night and attended by many area professional engineers.

Dr. Stewart Swihart, chairman of the Biology Department, said the small number of graduate courses he cancels does not harm the students since the classes "are elective and can be interchanged."

Undergraduate courses have little problem meeting the quota because many are required and the others usually have students trying to get in, he said.

THERE ARE usually several sections of a class for a student to transfer to in case of a cancellation, he said. Kopp said he tries to schedule only one or two sections of a class to ensure that students wanting that class are not spread over several sections with too few members.

Dr. Henry Robertson, chairman of the American Studies department, said limited section numbers are his key to preventing classes from being cancelled.

"We have a small faculty, and try to schedule the courses which might have trouble meeting the quota for only one section per quarter," he said.

American Studies has not been hurt by the rule, but according to Robertson, he is not happy with the rule because it could hurt the department in the future.

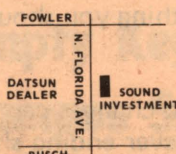

# Brahmans lose 'dedication,' 11-6

All the pre-game festivities in the world, all the fireworks that usually go with the opening of a new athletic complex and all the well-wishing of Brahman baseball supporters couldn't have pulled last night's game out for the Brahmans as the Florida Gators pounded and embarrassed USF 11-6 in the inaugural game at the Red McEwen baseball stadium.

Actually the Gators didn't do that much to make USF look bad. The Brahmans did a good job of that themselves by making nine errors, committing four passed balls and having three wild pitches.

"The things (errors) we were doing tonight can't be helped by practice," Brahman coach Robin Roberts said. "If you hit 180 balls to Mark Simon, he'll probably catch 179. But he missed one tonight."

Scott Taylor, Brahman third baseman, missed one also from the Gators leadoff batter Nick Belmonte to start the game and the Brahmans were off to a mistake-filled evening.

Florida scored two in the opening frame but USF came right back to take the lead 3-2 on singles by Scott Miller and Mike Burton. Randy Downey doubled in two runs and then scored when Scott Taylor ripped a shot to left field.

The Gators scored single runs in the fourth and fifth and then broke the game open in the seventh with a three-run burst.

While Florida was building up a comfortable lead, pitcher Bruce Baker was coasting along, allowing the Brahmans one hit in the middle four innings.

Down 7-2 going into the bottom of the seventh, USF got cranked up and tried to make a game of it when centerfielder Miller doubled in two runs but Florida Coach Jay Bergman made a pitching change which cooled off the rally. Billy Abell set USF

down in order the rest of the way to gain the save for Florida.

Miller was the only bright spot for USF with a three-for-five night which included a single, double and triple.

"I've never seen Welsh pitch better," Roberts said. Rick (Groover) was having trouble holding on to some of the balls, but it shows that his pitches were really moving."

"No we weren't having trouble with our signs," Welsh added.

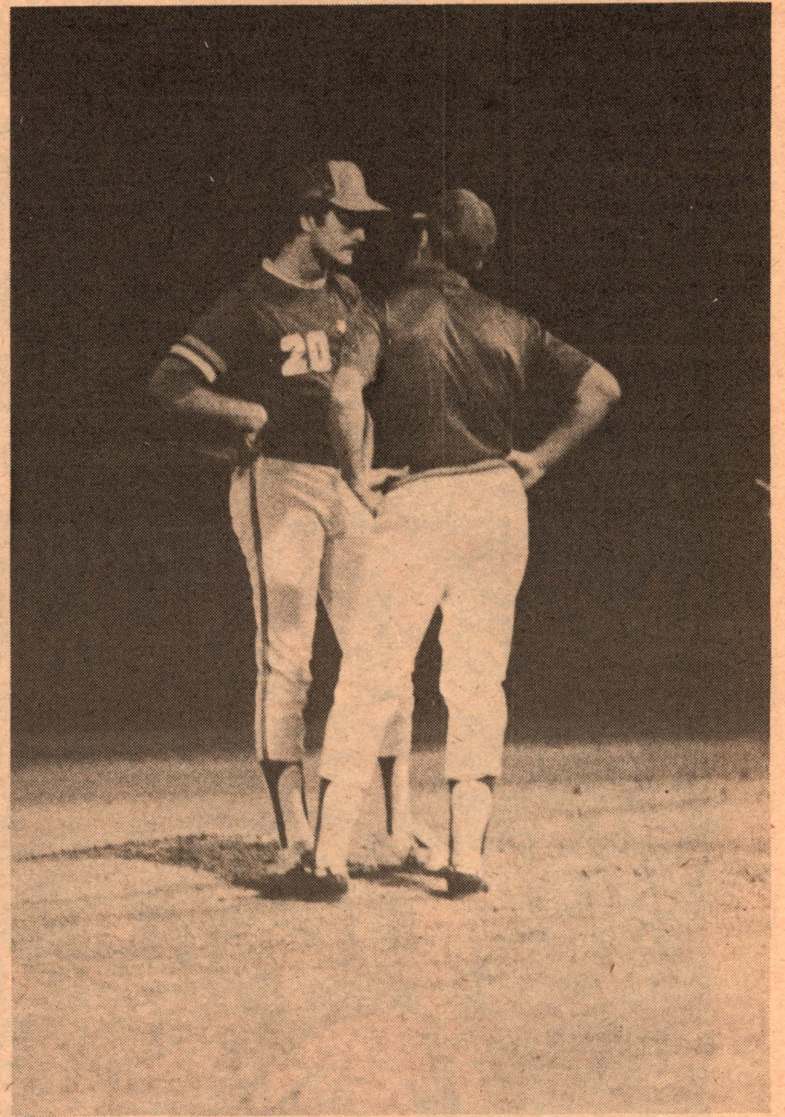
"I'm a very hard pitcher to catch and Rick has only been catching for a few games."
