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## THE RE-SWEATING QUESTION.

Meeting of Cigar Manufacturers to Consider  
What are the Rights Involved.

Full Report of Proceedings.

The meeting called in the previous issue of THE TOBACCO LEAF to consider the steps to be taken to defend threatened suits brought for alleged infringement of patents for re-sweating leaf tobacco, was held on Wednesday night at Blank's Hall. The attendance was not large, a few prominent local cigar manufacturers, Mr. Gumpert, of Gumpert Brothers, cigar manufacturers of Philadelphia, with a representative of his counsel, and members of the press, composing the assemblage. A larger gathering was expected, and probably would have been had but for the inclemency of the weather, as the subject before the meeting was one in which very many cigar manufacturers and leaf tobacco dealers are supposed to be interested.

For many years, perhaps thirty, leaf tobacco has been re-sweated for cigar-making purposes in this country. Formerly the methods were crude and simple; latterly they have been based upon scientific principles, and have involved special knowledge and liberal expenditure of money in the construction of apparatuses adapted to the re-sweating of leaf. At the present time, the re-sweating of leaf tobacco is a process of the past three or four years. He is the inventor of a process of re-sweating tobacco on an extensive scale that is popular, and is the owner of several patents relating to the same pursuit.

Messrs. C. S. Philips & Co. have sued Messrs. Gumpert Brothers for infringement of their patents, and Messrs. Foster, Hilson & Co., of this city, for breach of contract in connection with the same, and these pending suits have inspired an apprehension that it might be the intention of Messrs. Philips & Co. to hereafter proceed against other members of the cigar and tobacco trades who were in the habit of re-sweating tobacco by artificial means. This apprehension led to the meeting of Wednesday night. It will be seen on perusing our account of the proceedings that the action of the meeting was in every way friendly to Messrs. Philips & Co. There was nothing personal in the aim of any of the gentlemen present. Those who had been sued sought only to know whether or not they were responsible to somebody for royalty, and if so, to whom, being willing and ready to meet all their obligations, but wanting a finality when once they had met them; and those who had not been advised of legal accountability desired merely to ascertain the scope of Messrs. Philips & Co.'s claims. If Philips & Co.'s pretensions extended beyond their patented processes and embraced methods of re-sweating devised anterior to and not covered by their patents, they would adopt measures for mutual defence at the proper time; if they did not, then they had nothing to do with the present attitude of the firms named as plaintiffs and defendants.

After the loss of their recent suit with Robinson, plaintiff, which they conducted as per contract, in behalf of one of their licensees, the firm purchased the Isherwood patent, noted above as No. 91,601, and dated June 22, 1869. This appears to be the first patent ever granted for re-sweating leaf tobacco, and seems to cover all processes now in use from the date of its issue; in fact, from about 1866. If it can be shown in any given case that tobacco was successfully re-sweated prior to 1866 by any process now in use, the Isherwood patent will not be infringed by the employer of such process; but, if it cannot be so shown, Philips & Co. appear to have it in their power to demand royalty from all re-sweaters who are not their licensees. And herein lies the necessity for a prompt and final judicial decision of the right of ownership. There is danger in delay. All cigar manufacturers and leaf dealers are deeply interested in this matter on account of the yet unsolved problem. The proof of prior use and success needs to be demonstrated, and it was the realization of this need, judging by his observations, that led Mr. Gumpert to believe New York tradesmen might act in concert with his firm.

In order that the trade might know what are the claims of Messrs. Philips & Co., we interviewed Mr. Philips on Thursday. That gentleman assured us that his firm had no intention to demand anything not called for by their patents. He disclaimed any idea of instituting suits against tradesmen generally for infringement, and desired us to state this fact with emphasis. The rights covered by his patents he thought he was entitled to enjoy, and he did not doubt he would secure them all by negotiation. The time might come, he said, when the Isherwood patent might be judicially declared to cover all primitive modes of re-sweating tobacco by steam, but until it was so declared he should not think of assuming that it did so. He had proceeded against Messrs. Gumpert Brothers, he said, because they were infringing his trade in Philadelphia, and would not recognize his patents. His firm's representative,

he said, some months since, left a model of their re-sweating apparatus at the establishment of the brothers Gumpert. Subsequently the brothers commenced re-sweating for the Philadelphia trade, charging five dollars per case therefor; while his firm charged seven dollars for the same service, five dollars per case being only about the actual cost. The patrons of his firm called his attention to the difference in price, and feeling that the brothers were infringing both his patents and his business, he requested them to become licensees and discontinue re-sweating for the trade, offering them in return for the latter to grant them a license at a merely nominal rate. The brothers declined to do either, and suit for infringement of patents was brought against them. Why the brothers declined to become licensees is explained in Mr. Gumpert's statement below. They claim they are not infringing Messrs. Philips & Co.'s patents.

Against Messrs. Foster, Hilson & Co. suit was brought, Mr. Philips informed us, because that firm refused to abide by their contract with his firm. Foster, Hilson & Co. had been using Philips & Co.'s apparatus and paying \$500 per annum for the privilege. After their removal to their present premises, where Philips & Co. re-established the apparatus for them, and for which mechanical labor they paid, Foster, Hilson & Co. declined to continue payment of the royalty previously paid and agreed upon; claiming exemption on the ground that they had moved and changed the composition of their firm since the contract was made. Mr. Foster's explanation, it will be noticed in his remarks below, indicates that interference by Robinson was the impelling motive to his firm's resistance to Philips & Co.'s demands. With the different statements of the different gentlemen we have nothing to do. Our part in the unfortunate controversy commences and ends in giving a fair and intelligent account of it and its possible effect upon others.

Just before the opening of the meeting on Wednesday night the following circular was handed to the gentlemen present:

### FAIR PLAY IS A JEWEL.

To the Leaf Tobacco Dealers and Cigar Manufacturers interested in the Successful Re-sweating of Tobacco.

Living known Mr. C. S. Philips for many years, and appreciating his sterling honesty and industry, we take the liberty to address you, being thoroughly convinced that the meeting called for this evening is in the interests of only two parties in the trade, who are endeavoring to make scapegoats of you by trying to entangle you in a fight in which you will be politically requested to foot the bills, and receive no benefit. You will readily admit that Mr. Philips for many years has made the curing and re-sweating of tobacco a scientific study, and by his indefatigable zeal succeeded in bringing it to nearly perfection. You will also admit that if he imparts his knowledge and experience to others, who are benefited thereby, that it is entitled to any and every recompense that may be agreed upon by and between the parties interested.

A party who obtained a patent in 1879, (several years after Mr. Philips commenced sweating,) brought an action against one of C. S. Philips' licensees, in Chicago. Through bad management by his attorney, the case was decided against Mr. Philips' licensee. Yet the attorney had the manhood to acknowledge in an affidavit to the judge before whom the case was tried, that he was not familiar with patent law, on the strength of which a rehearing was granted before the master. Since then competent patent-attorneys have brought in such important additional evidence before the master that the amount of damages will be merely nominal. Besides that, a petition has been presented to the judge for reopening the case, and ultimately the verdict will be reversed. Whatever the amount of damages may be assessed by the master, the case will be tried over again, either at Chicago or Washington, without putting the innocent party to any expense. In every respect of Mr. Philips with his licensees is a clause whereby he agrees to protect them from any and all suits for infringement, and the Chicago suit proves that he will live up to his contracts every time, and that his licensees will never be put to any expense whatever. As a simple matter of justice he has the right to demand that the amount of damages will be merely nominal. Besides that, a petition has been presented to the judge for reopening the case, and ultimately the verdict will be reversed. Whatever the amount of damages may be assessed by the master, the case will be tried over again, either at Chicago or Washington, without putting the innocent party to any expense. In every respect of Mr. Philips with his licensees is a clause whereby he agrees to protect them from any and all suits for infringement, and the Chicago suit proves that he will live up to his contracts every time, and that his licensees will never be put to any expense whatever. 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our business narrows itself down to Mr. Phillips at this meeting, to find out what he claims. If we find that he claims what you say he does, then we will go into this thing more thoroughly; and if we find out that he does not claim to that extent, then we have but very little more to do.

Mr. FOSTER:—What further information can we really get than the patents themselves. If we go to Mr. Phillips or Robinson they will give elaborate statements of their patents. If you get the patents themselves you will have it in black and white. Three intelligent gentlemen taking up these various patents and looking them over can form an idea of what they cover and who are infringing them. If this committee is appointed, for my part they can go to my counsel and he can give them all the information they want, or they can go wherever they choose.

The CHAIRMAN:—As I understand it this committee would have to find out what Phillips claims. It would have been better probably to say that they should find out whether he claims that artificial re-sweating of tobacco is covered by his patent.

Mr. FOSTER:—We have got that in the decision of the Judge, that anybody sweating tobacco in cases and using steam heat infringes the Robinson patent.

The CHAIRMAN:—Moisture at the bottom or on the sides have to accompany it.

Mr. LEVY:—I will amend my motion so as to read that a committee of three be appointed to learn from Mr. Phillips by letter what he claims under his patents, and whether he claims his patents cover the artificial sweating of tobacco in cases or otherwise.

Mr. FOSTER:—I move to amend the resolution to the effect that we also ask the same information of Robinson.

The amendment seconded and carried.

The question being on the original resolution it was carried.

Mr. Chambers suggested that the committee get from Phillips the process which he claims his patent covers, and stated that he was covering the artificial re-sweating of tobacco by heat it was perfect nonsense.

A resolution of thanks was tendered to Mr. Chambers and Mr. Gumpert for their attendance and the information which they imparted to the trade, in reply to which Mr. Gumpert said: If the trade think we are infringing it is highly unnecessary for me to appear in the Court. The verdict of the trade in my opinion will be just as good as an appeal, and if the trade after a due examination think that we ought to acknowledge Mr. Phillips' claims as the original patentee of re-sweating tobacco appliances, we are willing to submit and pay him a royalty. The Chairman appointed as the committee of inquiry, A. Lichtenstein, A. Levy and L. Kaufman, who were instructed to report as soon as possible.

Adjourned subject to the call of the Chairman.

#### MR. GRAFF'S NOTES BY THE WAY.

The Cincinnati tobaccoists and tobacco merchants, as a class, have had a dull winter. Since spring, or, better, summer, fairly opened, the market has improved, and retailers and jobbers are doing a profitable business. Stocks of manufactured tobacco are large, especially in first hands, and holders are living in ease. The manufacturers, however, are not so well off. The tobacco manufacturers, that is, the fine-cutters, have been doing almost a losing business, and one and all have gone, or will go, into the manufacturing of plug. Messrs. Barber & Stout have gone out of business altogether. Plug is king; this is a sure thing. Of course firms like the Spence Bros. & Co. will continue making their favored and popular brands of fine-cut in connection with their large and new plug establishment, but Covington manufacturers will either have to give up the ghost or make plug, and this is only a matter of time. Eastern and Western tobacco manufacturers' agents report a good business, and friend Richey, tobacco manufacturers' agent & commager, has stated that all representative manufacturers are doing a paying business. The Western leaf market is firm, and if the offerings in the different warehouses were more suitable, sales would be larger and figures higher. But the 1880 crop was a poor one. At Bodman's and friends Wayne & Ratterman's warehouses receipts continue large, and sales correspondingly so. The Second Leaf market has been rather animated of late. Stocks are small and of inferior quality, the choice dark wrappers being scarce, and in the hands of only a few of the principal firms.

Hydraulic pumps, presses, double-end finishers, wringers and licorice-kettles are furnished, and drying-rooms fitted up by this firm at the shortest notice."

I had the pleasure of meeting in the Cincinnati market of G. Herber and Mr. L. W. Wicks, of New York; Mr. George Krenkelberg, of New York; Mr. E. H. Hersey, of Chicago; Mr. S. F. Hess, of Rochester; Mr. Eugene Lipkau, representing L. Bamberger & Co., Philadelphia; and last, not least, our New York exporter, Mr. Carl Upmann.

At the Louisville breaks I saw the following buyers:—Mr. J. J. Beyer, Jr., of Detroit; Mr. Cash, of New York; and Mr. George Krenkelberg, who was visiting his branch house in this market.

The Louisville tobacco market has, in common with all other prominent tobacco points of the West, been very dull during the winter season, and operations in all grades have been limited, and almost entirely on orders. With the present season, however, and I may say ever since February, there has been an increased general demand for all parts of the globe. Receipts are heavy, prices are firm, and there are plenty of buyers. Regie grades are from 1/2 to 1 cent higher to-day than they were offered for at the same time last year. The Regie grades are scarce; the new crop, take it all in all, is a very inferior one, and it will be pretty hard work for resident speculators and agents of exporters and manufacturers, to satisfy their principals with what they can select from it.

Mr. John H. Keithly, of Cincinnati, agent for Messrs. Heppner & Maurer, lithographers, of New York, has removed to 160 W. Fourth Street, that city. Mr. Keithly keeps a large stock of the most beautiful labels on hand.

Messrs. Prague & Matson, leaf tobacco brokers, of Cincinnati, report a very remunerative business for their firm, and they consider the market for the entire country; and why should it be otherwise, when it is a fact that there is not a better known or more popular tobacco merchant in the Queen City than F. A. Prague. Messrs. Prague & Matson buy "re-driers," cutting leaf and plug fillers on commission.

Another new cigar manufacturer has been opened in Cincinnati at late, the Queen City Manufacturing Co., under the management of Mr. Jacob Wolf, formerly of Weil, Kahn & Co. The firm occupy a large new building at 114-120 East Pearl Street.

The old and well-known tobacco manufacturing firm, Messrs. P. J. Sorg & Co., of Middletown, O., run to the full extent of their capacity, and their Eastern trade is fast increasing. Messrs. Sorg & Co. have introduced two new brands of plug tobacco, "Sawtooth" and "Fence Rail," 32-crown plugs, the largest ever produced by any manufacturer of this country. This new departure, Mr. Sorg states, meets with unusual popular favor.

My good friends, Messrs. R. W. Jenkinson, tobacco manufacturers and jobbers, of Pittsburgh, are running heavy on two new brands of tobacco, "Long Thread" and "Sawtooth," 32-crown plugs, the largest ever produced by any manufacturer of this country. This new departure, Mr. Sorg states, meets with unusual popular favor.

The former firm of Uhl & Riebel, of Indianapolis, has been changed by the death of Mr. Riebel. The firm has associated himself with Mr. Frank Eliff, under the firm name of Uhl & Eliff, for the purpose of continuing the Havana and domestic leaf tobacco business.

The new cigar-box factory of Mr. Samuel Trost, of Cincinnati, is a large and roomy building in every respect, perfectly arranged for the purpose it is used for. The size of this factory is 100 by 125 feet, and five stories in height, and it has all the improvements and modern machinery that could be needed, or the liberality of Bro. Trost provide. It has broad floors, high ceilings, large drying and complete priming rooms, with adequate sheds for the storing of lumber. The capacity of Trost's steam cigar-box manufacturing is 40,000 boxes per week.

The Messrs. Nathan Bros. have opened a wholesale and retail tobaccoist establishment at 102 Main Street, Cincinnati. These gentlemen are connected with Southern enterprises, and in order to be better enabled to supply their Columbia, Miss., branch, they opened a house in the Queen City.

Some of the leaf tobacco brokers of Cincinnati who have been established in that city for years have been very successful, but their good fortune did not result from sitting still at their door steps, but was rather the consequence of an active, well-spent life. Among these gentlemen, of whom Cincinnati has a good number, may be mentioned F. W. Dohrmann, a man of rare ability and integrity, who has achieved a success that he richly deserves.

Messrs. Henry Meyer & Co. report a good business in Seed leaf and Havana tobacco ever since the season opened, and state that the Cincinnati Seed leaf trade is becoming more prominent from year to year on account of the great number of new cigar manufacturers coming into existence in the State of Ohio and adjoining States. Messrs. Meyer & Co. are heavy operators in Seed leaf tobacco, and enjoy an enviable reputation.

My friend W. G. Morris, of Cincinnati, wishes his many friends to understand that he is still on the old spot, and has superior facilities for supplying manufacturers and exporters with choice leaf. Members of the tobacco trade will not fail to remember the old "stand-bys."

The Messrs. Haas Bros., successors to M. Haas, manufacturers of cigars, of Cincinnati, have recently opened a large and splendid warehouse at 83 Race Street, that city. Messrs. Haas report an increased and well-paying business both in cigars and leaf tobacco.

"Chick" is a new brand of Buchanan & Lyall's New York manufacture. Mr. G. S. Hale, the Cincinnati manager of this old firm, says:—"Chick is beautiful, and so is the dear little creature we see her represented on a splendid showman. She sells like hot-cakes. More orders than I can fill!"—no wonder, she is so handsome!

Messrs. Spence Bros. & Co., of Cincinnati, have removed into new quarters, the old "National Theatre," 86 to 96 Sycamore Street. The firm are now remodeling the entire building, and will find room enough for both their fine-cut and plug manufacturers.

#### BUSINESS TROUBLES.

LAWRENCE & MARTIN, CHICAGO, ILL.,

Wholesale and retail dealers in liquors and cigars, have been reported as having been closed by the sheriff. This was done through confession by the firm to its creditors, amounting to \$55,655.35, obtained against them, two in favor of A. S. Truett, a lawyer of Chicago, for \$32,813.02, three in favor of Charles S. Bush, of New Orleans, for \$20,217.33, and one in favor of Michael J. Blasing, of Memphis, for \$4,625; the last two are said to be well known "turmen." The books have not as yet been examined, but the liabilities are estimated at \$200,000, of which \$20,000 is due to cigar manufacturers. Their assets are said to consist of patents on "Rock and Rye" stock and certain fixtures estimated at \$50,000, and bank accounts estimated at \$140,000. The firm claim a stock of whiskey, the warehouse receipts of which have been hypothecated to banks and private individuals; it is valued at \$40,000, and it is said by the firm that their embarrassed condition was brought about by the demand of Charles Johnston, a noted "horseman," for the return of a call loan of \$12,000 on honor to Martin. An attempt was made to raise this amount, but it failed. Circulars have been sent to all the creditors notifying them of a meeting to be held at 11 o'clock on Friday next, at which time the books and assets will be shown, and a plan of liquidation with a view to continuing business. It is reported that some of the creditors are willing to accept 25 cents on the dollar, but it is said to be a question whether they will get the chance to do so. It is rumored that both Lawrence and Martin were very active in hypothecating goods and disposing of their paper a few days before the judgments were entered against them. We hear that there is a prospect of the whole affair being ventilated in court. The creditors among cigar manufacturers are said to be the following firms:—Messrs. Louis Ash & Co., \$1,000; A. Thurber & Co., \$175; H. R. Kelly & Co., \$540; Howard Ives, \$500; Kerbs & Spiess, \$260; Giglio & Freschi, \$400; A. Dorn, \$500—all of this city; S. Freedman, Detroit, \$3,000; Hershheim Bros., New Orleans, \$1,000.

WM. NUSSBAUM, GREENBUSH, N. Y., Cigars, made an assignment on the 2d instant to Silas Wentworth, preferences as follows:—First cost \$5,726.36; Nicholas Sherler, \$1,500; Theo. Nussbaum, Greenbush, \$550; Wm. Nussbaum, Jr., Greenbush, \$150. Nussbaum is said to be a creditor of Benj. Payn, in Albany, for whom he manufactured cigars on contract, for about \$13,000, and who, on his making an assignment, gave him only preference to the amount of \$500. This, it is stated, forced him to succeed. It is claimed, however, that he will be able to pay in full, although his house and lot is registered in his wife's name.

The following schedule of the assets and liabilities have been filed:—Nominal assets, \$83,605.85; actual do., \$89,417.30; liabilities, \$76,389.92. Leaving out the real estate which is estimated at \$41,000 (which is said to be too high a valuation by at least \$3,000) and the encumbrance thereon, \$38,620.26, there are assets other than real estate of \$28,171.25, liabilities \$37,768.96, and of this amount \$13,598.19 is preferred. This deducted from the assets leaves \$14,573.06, from which deduct 25 per cent for costs, expenses, and shrinkage (\$7,042.51) leaves the net assets \$7,530.55. It is said that probably an offer will be made of 25c on the dollar.

#### Our Lancaster Correspondence.

LANCASTER, Pa., May 19, 1881.

Though the inquiry for tobacco of the '79 crop is brisk, we have no sales of any consequence to report. A large number of buyers were about hunting the good and medium grades, but the market was under way in 100 cases in Mountville, and for the 300 case lot in Lebanon County, but neither was bought.

No apparent change in the market so far as the '80 crop is concerned. The packers are yet hard at work, buying large quantities, and the indications are that the whole crop will be taken. Estimates place the quantity yet unsold at from 5,000 to 12,000 cases. The former figures came from those who are pretty well supplied with the leaf, and don't want much more; the latter from those who have not enough, and think they have plenty to choose from.

The prices paid are as high as ever where fine goods are sold, and the lower grades there is not much reduction. But the majority of sales reported are at low figures, which shows that low grade goods make up the bulk of the crop yet in the hands of the growers. In Manor, Benj. Breneman sold 10 acres at 25, 15, 10, 5 and 3. In Colerain, T. Coates sold 2 acres at 18, 4 and 3, and 1 acre at 17, 5 and 3; Samuel McConnell, 1 acre at 16, 5 and 3; John P. King, of Strasburg township, at 16, 12, 5 and 3; David Mumma, 2 acres to Mr. Spingarn, at 12, 5 and 3; Mrs. John Smith, 1/2 acre to Mr. Spingarn, at 25, 10 and 3; Henry Eisenberg, 1 acre to S. Houghton; Caspar Keller, 1 acre at 8 and 3; John Houghton, 2 acres at 15 for wrappers; Henry Kline, 1 acre at 10 and 3; Jacob Kame, 3 acres to Mr. Spingarn at 17, 7 and 3; J. C. Smith, 2 acres to J. Moore at 12, 6 and 3; John P. King, of Strasburg township, to C. Herr at 17, 5 and 3; John Brown, of Cecil County, Md., at 10, 4 and 2; to Mr. De Haven; John Goss, of Conoy, to Mr. Atwater at 25, 14 and 2; A. Musser, of Manheim, to Mr. Becker at 15, 5 and 3. The lowest price paid for a crop in this county yet was for a lot in Fulton township, which sold for 3, 2 and 1, a big fall from 31c round, the highest price paid.

The plant beds got just what they needed, last night and to-day—a good soaking rain. Some of our farmers have already set their plants, but the number is very small. It is not yet so soon to estimate the acreage for this year's crop, but the general opinion seems to be that in this county the average will be the same as in 1880, while in the neighboring counties it will be largely increased. Though insect pests have destroyed some plants, every farmer will have all he wants. A destructive insect is reported to have appeared on the farm of E. S. Jones in Chester County. It resembles the Colorado beetle, with a hard shell. It nips off the roots of the plants and throws the plant out of the

### KENTUCKY.

Augusta, May 7.—Since the spring has opened we have had fine growing weather. Farmers are improving every moment. Plants are up, and generally looking well. If we should have dry, cold weather in May to start the bugs to work and check the growth of plants, the planting will be early enough, with favorable seasons in June, it is expected to set a full crop. The present crop has largely been bought at high prices. The county of Bracken will have fully a thousand hogsheads less than last year. The tobacco is not turning out the proportion of good grades which buyers thought when they bought it, being much more frozen than last year, with a great deal of green trash and nondescript lugs. If any of the White Burley districts are as short of substantial qualities as our county, manufacturers may expect to pay full prices for it before the end of the year.

We hope all crops will be good, and shall not call them bad until they are proven so, if they shall be, which does not seem likely.

—According to reports from Chester County, Pa., it seems that they are preparing there to plant a large acreage. Here are a few items clipped from the papers:—John Ebsenshade, of Highland township, will erect on his farm during the coming summer a large tobacco shed, to be supplied with all modern improvements. Mr. Ebsenshade expects to raise a large amount of leaf this year. A man by the name of Maze, from Lancaster County, has been engaged by George P. McFarlan, East Brandywine, to cultivate for him about three acres of tobacco. But an item from the *Republican* tells another story: A gentleman from West Nottingham, who was in West Chester lately, says the tobacco fever in his township has subsided about as quickly as it came on, and that very little of the plant will be cultivated in his neighborhood the coming season.

—In Italy, only nine pounds of manufactured tobacco may be imported by a private citizen, and to do this a special authorization must be received from the tobacco monopoly.

—A Pennsylvania paper remarks:—There will be considerable tobacco planted this year in Highland. The price of last year's crops encourage those who raised it to put in an increased acreage.

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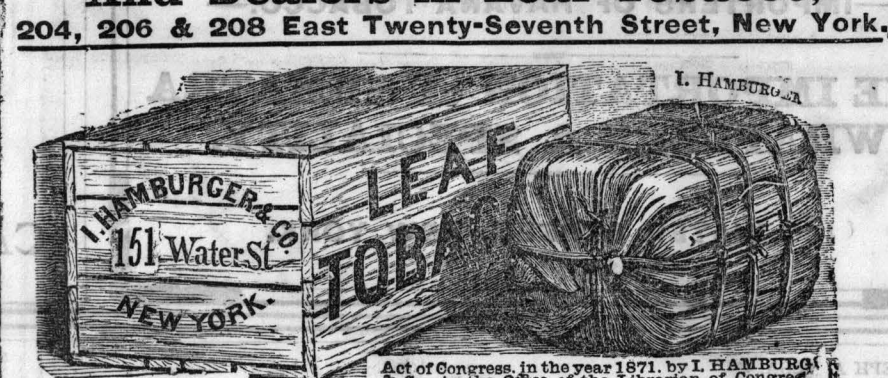

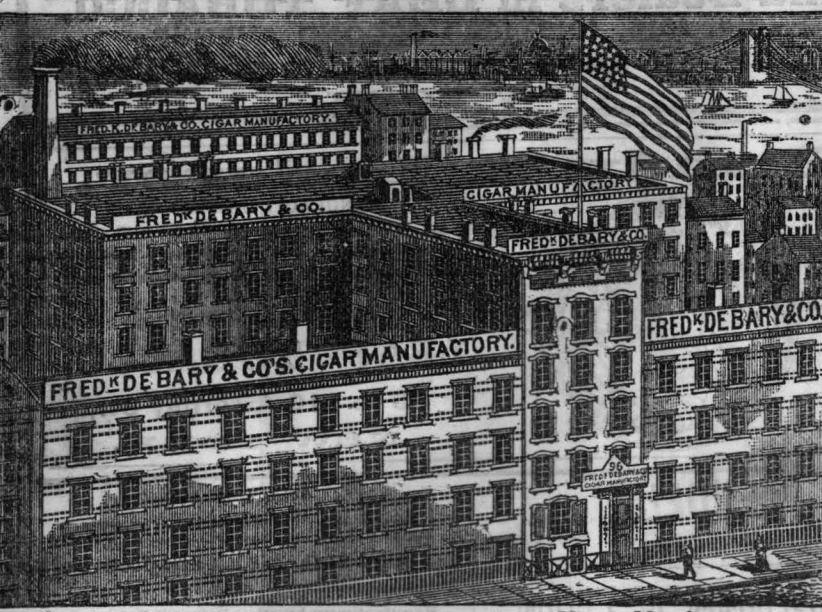
