THE HEWITT TARIFF BILL.
What this bill, which is introduced on Monday, provides for in respect of the tobacco interest is specified in another article, and the summary will repay perusal.

Our opinion concerning it is, that if it ever gets out of the Committee of Ways and Means, to the hands of which it was duly consigned on its introduction, it will never pass the House of Representatives, to say nothing about the Senate. It is too much like the Morrison bill, which did not meet the wants of the people or the country, to find general favor in our Congress.

We reiterate the declaration ventured in our previous edition that there will be no new tariff law enacted at this session of Congress.

BOYS SHALL NOT SMOKE CIGARETTES.
The New York Assembly passed on Wednesday a bill prohibiting the sale or giving away of cigarettes to minors under 14 years of age.

The Legislature of New Jersey did a similar thing a year ago, but the boys over there have been smoking cigarettes ever since, nevertheless.

With such tyranny as is attempted in laws of this nature it is not to be wondered at that Peck's Bad Boy has many imitators in this land of boasted freedom, or that little bipeds in trowsers arm themselves with death-dealing implements and start westward with a view to slaughtering wild Indians.

Bah! Messrs. Legislators, you make yourselves both foolish and disagreeable by such measures.

SUMATRA TOBACCO AND THE TARIFF.

Though there is little chance of Mr. Hewitt's tariff bill becoming law, yet it is quite probable that the proviso which he has attached to the clause relating to imported leaf tobacco in the existing law will be adopted by both the House and Senate. This proviso will be found in our article entitled, "The Tariff Muddle Still Pending," and is designed to prevent the admission of Sumatra tobacco at a lower rate of duty than 75 cents a pound, even when wrappers are so packed with fillers that less than 85 per cent. belong to the wrapper class. As we have elsewhere stated, though no general tariff law is likely to pass, this, and other amendments to the law now in force, will probably be made in compliance with popular demand. Even without this amendment, it must be remembered, Sumatra leaf will have to pay 75 cents a pound duty under the recent ruling of the Secretary of the Treasury.

THE TARIFF MUDDLE STILL PENDING.

As announced in our last issue, it seemed as if nothing more was to be heard of the tariff question at this session of Congress; but now the situation is altered, and uncertainty is to be prolonged.

Apparently seeking to resurrect the Morrison bill disposed of last week, Mr. Abraham S. Hewitt, of the Committee of Ways and Means, on Monday, May 12, introduced in the House of Representatives another tariff bill, which was referred to the Committee of Ways and Means in the regular course of business.

So far as it affects the tobacco interest, Mr. Hewitt's bill provides that the duties specified in schedule F, which relates to imported leaf tobacco, shall be 20 per cent. lower than at present, which is exactly what the Morrison bill, as amended, provided for.

SUMATRA LEAF.

To straighten the crooks in the existing law concerning Sumatra tobacco, the bill adopts the latest ruling of the Secretary of the Treasury, and provides as follows:

"Strike out from this schedule the second clause, relating to 'leaf tobacco,' and in lieu thereof insert the following:

"Leaf tobacco of the requisite size and of the necessary fineness of texture to be suitable for wrappers and of which more than one hundred leaves are required to weigh a pound, if not stemmed, 75 cents per pound; if stemmed, 85 cents per pound."

"Provided, that so much of any package of such tobacco as may be so broken as not to be suitable for wrappers shall pay a duty of 35 cents per pound."

The meaning of this, that the packing of wrappers and fillers in one bale shall be permissible, but that when bales are so packed

the wrappers as prescribed shall pay 75 cents or 85 per pound, according as they are stemmed or unstemmed, and fillers 35 cents a pound.

If this becomes law the end of mixed packings to evade the higher rates of duty will be reached.

As stipulated, the bill is to go into effect, if it becomes a law, on the first day of January, 1885.

INTERNAL REVENUE.

Mr. Beverly Tucker, of Virginia, on Monday, May 12, introduced a bill to repeal all internal revenue taxes on tobacco, etc.

TOBACCO TAX ABOLITION.

In another article we summarize what the New England tobacco growers are contemplating in connection with the tobacco taxes. By next week it is probable that a long step forward will have been taken by those energetic and intelligent people in an effort to obtain a speedy abolition of the internal revenue taxes now imposed on the manufacturers of tobacco. They demand complete freedom for the tobacco industry of the United States.

The following Associated Press dispatch shows the present status of the movement:

"Boston, May 14.—A Springfield dispatch says that the officers of the New England Tobacco Growers' Association have started an important movement to secure the repeal of all internal revenue taxes on tobacco.

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THE TENEMENT HOUSE CIGAR BILL BECOMES A LAW.

Tenement House Cigar Manufacturers Continue Their Work with Little or No Inconvenience.

THE NEW LAW DEFECTIVE.

It caused the tenement house cigar manufacturers no surprise when it was reported that Governor Cleveland had signed the Tenement House Cigar bill on Monday. They all thought that he would sign the bill, if for no other reason than to be consistent. The law went into effect on Monday, and the first arrest for violation of it was made on Wednesday.

Peter Jacobs, a cigar manufacturer, of 344 East Seventy-eighth street, was the party arrested; and a man by the name of Irving, supposed to be in the employ of the Cigar makers' Union, was the one who caused his arrest. The tenement house cigar manufacturers' triumvirate counsel, William M. Everts, ex-Judge Dittenhoefer and Morris S. Wise, deeming Jacobs' case a good one for a test case, defended him, and he was released into the custody of ex-Judge Dittenhoefer.

On Thursday Jacobs' counsel had his case brought before Judge Donohue in the Supreme Court on a writ of certiorari, and Judge Donohue confirmed the constitutionality of the law under which Jacobs was arrested. The case was then appealed to the General Term of the Supreme Court, and was set down for next Monday. There seems to be no apprehension felt by the manufacturers, for even if the Court of Appeals declares the new law unconstitutional, the law, as it stands permits them to continue the tenement house system with very little, if any, change in present practices. The law says that the preparation of tobacco or manufacture of cigars in tenement houses above the first floor is prohibited, and defines a tenement house as one where more than three families live, eat, sleep and cook independently. A great number of the houses used by manufacturers accommodate no more than three families, but even where it is otherwise, the surplus can become boarders of the three families and come within the meaning of the law. The law will probably be contested in the Court of Appeals, but the fact that it permits the manufacture of cigars in tenement houses, as above described, makes the manufacturers very indifferent as to the outcome, so far as it will effect their business.

TOBACCO GROWERS WANT THE TOBACCO TAX ABOLISHED.

The New England Homestead of May 17 editorially says:

"The United States Treasury is overflowing. There is a surplus income of over sixty million dollars. This surplus is a constant temptation to Congressional extravagance and official corruption. It must be reduced. Congress has just killed the Morrison Tariff bill. The only remedy left is to lighten the internal revenue taxes. Abolish the internal revenue taxes on tobacco and over thirty millions of surplus revenue are saved."

Abolish the tax on tobacco and the hundreds of tobacco manufacturers which it has fostered will be broken down. Honest competition in tobacco manufacture will then be possible. Now it is impossible. The rich crush out the small manufacturer and control prices of both raw and made up materials. Abolish this tax and the small manufacturer will buy direct of the country packer or grower. Higher prices for raw leaf will be the inevitable result of such honest competition. Growers will then have the right to sell their tobacco to whom, when and where they wish—a right which has been denied them for twenty long years."

By circular dated May 14 the same paper announces that:

"A meeting of the New England Tobacco Growers' Association's officers is to be held at Hartford, Conn., May 17. Arrangements for immediate and organized effort among tobacco growers and the trade throughout the country will then be perfected."

What is to be done at the meeting on the 17th instant with reference to the tobacco taxes the Homestead's announcement does not say. Presumably the meeting, in addition to the transaction of other business, will resolve that the tobacco taxes should be forthwith abolished. The members labor to carry it into effect, we judge is the hope and aim of our contemporary. THE TOBACCO LEAF has been hoping, aiming and pushing in the same direction, that is, to have the tobacco taxes abolished, for several years past, but the work has been all uphill. The majority of the large manufacturers don't desire a change, so the old war measure lingers lagging on the stage. As THE LEAF asserted last week, all that needs to be done at this moment to secure abolition is to ask for it. Congress is ready to grant the favor, the bills introduced to that end proving the fact; now, who will be the first and most persistent to seek the concession? Will it be New England growers alone, or will the growers of other sections and manufacturers generally unite with them?

MEMORIAL
To the Right Honorable Hugh C. E. Childers,
M. P., Chancellor of Her Majesty's Exchequer:—

SIR—At a meeting of the City and County of Dublin Tobacco Dealers, held at the European Hotel, Dublin, on Tuesday, 18th March, 1884, it was resolved to bring under your notice some of the grievances under which the retail tobacco trade is suffering, owing to the addition of 4d per lb to the duty on tobacco in 1878, and to forward to you the present memorial, which the chairman of the meeting was authorized to sign.

The duty having been increased in 1878 4d per lb, or one farthing per ounce, and the principal portion of tobacco sold being in half ounces, and there being no coin to meet the advance on the latter quantity, the manufacturers, to meet our demand, were obliged to manufacture a cheaper article, which means more water and less tobacco, and as the duty is levied on the dry leaf, the revenue cannot have obtained the amount anticipated by the change. With regard to advancing our retail price, we find it an impossibility; the popular price being 3d per ounce, we cannot obtain more for the principal portion sold, which reduces our profit to a minimum inadequate to meet current expenses.

Our trade is considerably disturbed in consequence of the article which we are obliged to retail being so inferior, as consumers, in their efforts to obtain a good article at 3d per ounce, go from retailer to retailer endeavoring to purchase good tobacco at 3d per ounce, which, of course, is an impossibility, the duty alone being 3s 6d per lb.

We believe a return to the old duty of 3s and 5 per cent, would be a general benefit to consumer, manufacturer, retailer and the revenue, as competition in the retail trade would compel the retailer to purchase a better article from the manufacturer, thereby satisfying the consumer and increasing the quantity of leaf on which duty would be paid.

Your memorialists therefore pray that you will reduce the duty to its former rate—namely, 3s and 5 per cent, believing that the change will be beneficial to all parties connected with the trade and the revenue.

CORRESPONDENCE.
GLASGOW, April 3, 1884.

SIR—It is not in the interest of the trade to have a high rate of duty on leaf tobacco at any time, but when Sir Stafford Northcote, as Chancellor of the Exchequer, added the 4d per lb, it would have been better (if an increased duty was to be forced upon the trade against their wish) that he made it 8d instead, and thereby compelled an additional halfpenny per ounce to be paid by the consumer, and though this would necessarily have lessened the consumption of it, the manufacturers and retailers would not have suffered so grievously in their interests as they have done under the infliction of the 4d.

What the great consuming public require is a good article at 3d per ounce, such as they have been accustomed to for a life-time, and this, in the ordinary state of the leaf market, can be supplied when the duty is at 3s and 5 per cent., though I would prefer a 3s duty as meeting exceptional states of the leaf market better.

A Way Invented of Making Whiskey in Solid Plugs Like Tobacco.

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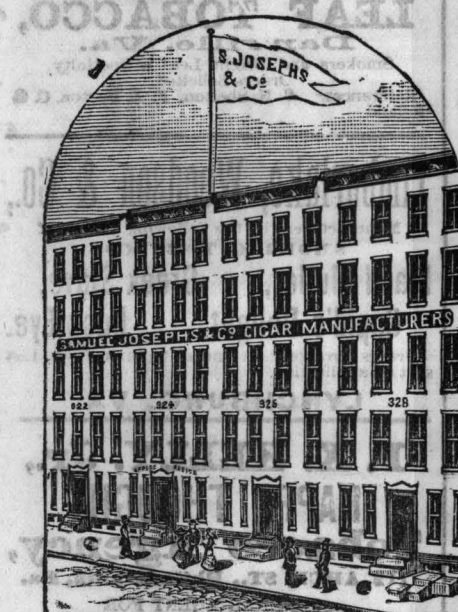

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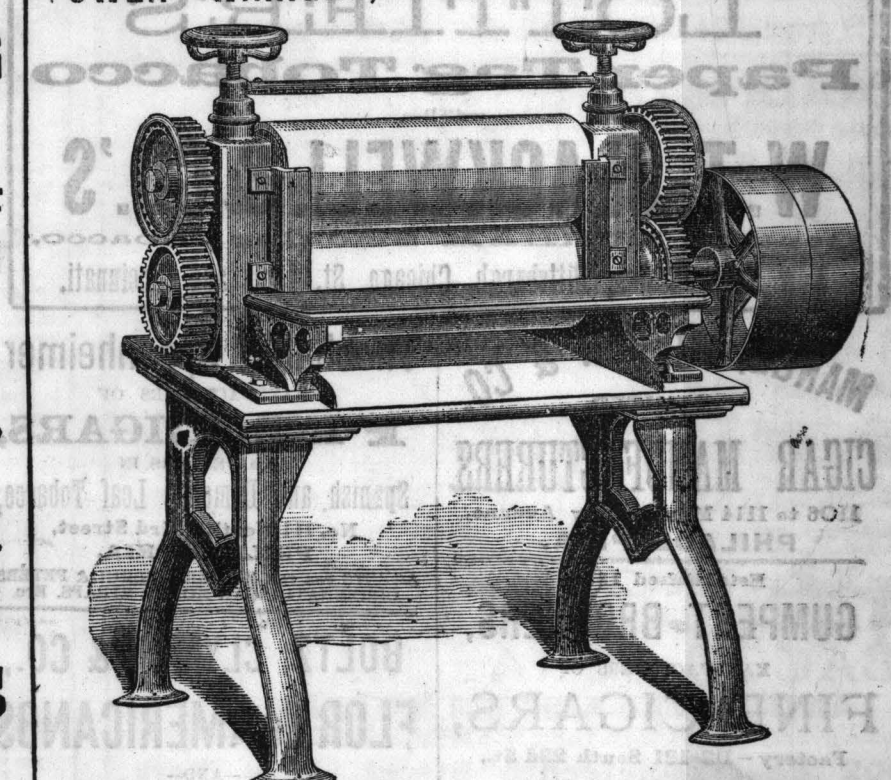

The tax on all kinds of Manufactured Tobacco is 8 cents $\frac{1}{2}$ lb; Snuff, 8 cents $\frac{1}{2}$ lb; Cigars, $\$2 \frac{1}{2}$ thousand; Cigarettes weighing not over 2 lbs $\frac{1}{2}$ thousand, 10 cents $\frac{1}{2}$ thousand; Cigarettes and Cigarettes weighing over 2 lbs $\frac{1}{2}$ thousand, $\$3 \frac{1}{2}$ thousand. The duty on Foreign Cigars is $\$2 \frac{1}{2}$ $\frac{1}{2}$ lb, and 25 per cent ad valorem. Cigarettes same duty as cigars. Imported Cigars, Cigarettes and Cigarettes also bear the prescribed Internal Revenue taxes, to be paid by stamps at the Custom House. Imported Manufactured Tobacco and Scraps are subject to the Internal Revenue tax of 8 cents $\frac{1}{2}$ lb, and must be packed in conformity with Internal Revenue law and regulation. Scraps and cuttings, however, may be withdrawn in bulk for use in a tobacco, snuff or cigar manufactory without payment of the Internal Revenue tax.

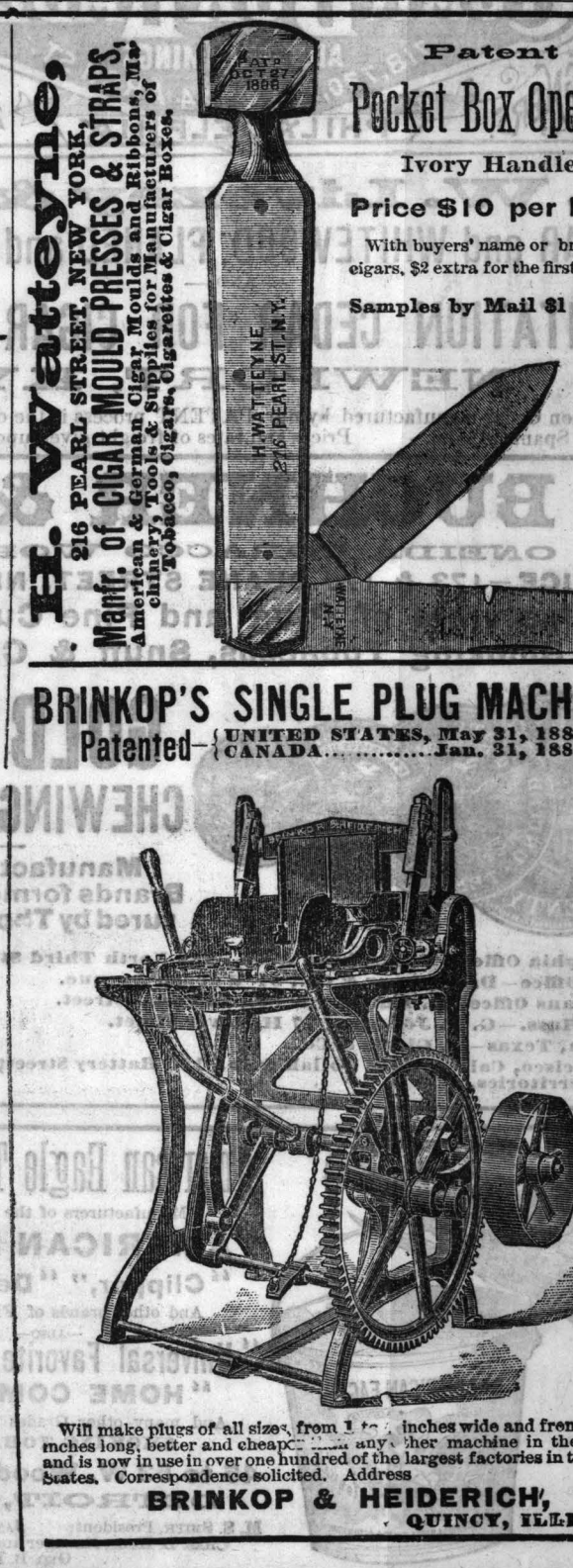

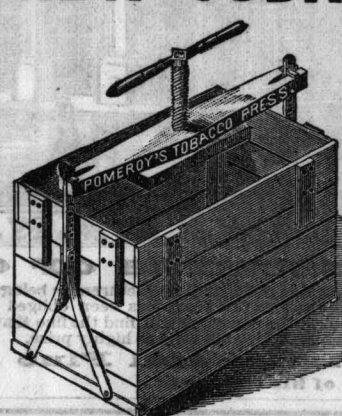

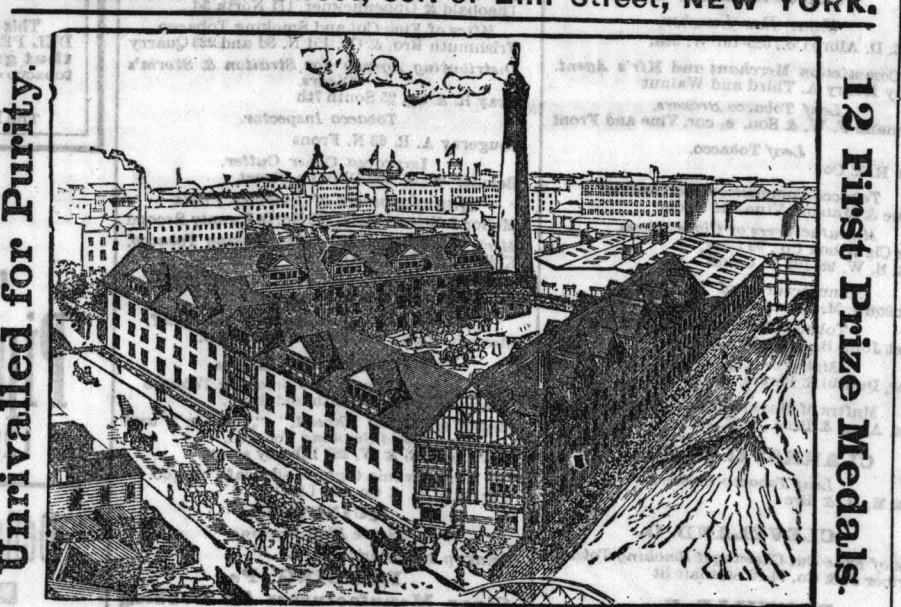
