THE TOBACCO INDUSTRY AND THE TARIFF.

Our tobacco-growing friends, or some of them, and also some of our cigar manufacturers and importers, are apprehensive that by the adoption of our new treaty with Spain, which will shortly be officially ratified, and the assumed impending reduction of the tariff under Democratic rule, their interest will be prejudicially affected. We incline to the belief that a Democratic administration, no more than a Republican one, will be disposed, either for the sake of the Spanish treaty or the carrying out of its theories respecting the tariff, to do anything that will depress or prevent the expansion of the tobacco interest in any of its forms in the United States. That interest is now and has for a long while been doing well, and Congress will naturally be inclined to permit it to continue in its present prosperous course. Should it happen, however, in the mutations to which the minds of men are subject, that an attempt shall there be made to diminish the present protective duties levied on leaf tobacco and cigars imported into this country, both growers and manufacturers know how to institute a protest that will be heeded.

THE NEW CROP OF WESTERN LEAF.

In his circular elsewhere printed, Mr. Wallace gives his customary autumn resume of Western crop and market matters. He says the crop has been housed free from frost and that but little complaint of house-burn is heard.

The quality of the crop, he thinks, is good, though the size of the leaf shows variation—some of it being small and short. In quantity the crop is large, approximating that of 1877. But little has yet been bought in the country, and for what was purchased prices ranged from 4 to 6c for dark, up to 7½c for Burley in winter order. Large as the crop may be, the quantity of dark leaf in it will all be wanted, as there is little, if any, of that description now available.

Mr. Wallace fears that this season's harvest may be followed by another next year as large if not larger than it. The effect on prices, if this should prove to be the case, he apprehends will be prejudicial. Common lugs, he says, on June 1, 1877, sold in this market at 4½c per lb, June 1, 1878, at 2½c, same date, 1879, 2½c, and 3½c in 1880. He believes 4c per lb for average Illinois and Indiana crops, 4½c for Green Rivers, 5c for Western districts, and 5½c for Clarksville.

will be as much as it is advisable to pay under present circumstances.

The increase in the growth of the past year he conceives is attributable to the augmented production of Burley, which will not not be likely to average much, if any, higher than dark leaf, and should be purchased at the same price.

NOW THAT IT IS OVER.

Now that the election, with all its excitement, its parades, banners, music, torches, speeches, lies, yells, yells, sore heads, sore hearts, weary brains and bodies, etc., etc., is over, and there is a prospect of public and private quietude for the ensuing four years, let all the people of this country quietly rejoice. We say quietly, with a due regard to the proprieties, as there has been noise enough. THE LEAF is non-partisan, but because, like its patrons, it thrives best in an atmosphere of peace, it welcomes the reign of peace that has at last been inaugurated. It doesn't want to see another Presidential election until the time comes to hold another one, and, fortunately, it will not have to, the Constitution forbidding. But not to digress from the text, which is, "Now, That It Is Over."

We were going to say, now that the election is over, it would be interesting and valuable information to everybody if the money cost of it could be approximately summed up. Not that those who contributed the funds and those who spent them want a reckoning for personal gratification, as they respectively performed their respective parts without a thought of self, but because it will have knowledge of this kind concerning every Presidential campaign, so that it may be seen how much is paid by the people for the great and glorious privilege of choosing their chief ruler. This privilege is an inestimable one—one that should not be bartered for any other thing on earth, but "Oh, lah, lah," as the conventional Dinah used to say, what a heap of money it costs every time, and this time in particular.

When the American citizen duly imbued with admiration for all things terrestrial pertaining to his native heath glances at the annual salary lists of Royalty in Europe, he instinctively aspires to a sign of condolence for the "down-trodden" peoples there who, in the sweat of their brows, have to raise the wherewith to pay those enormous salaries, and thanks his stars that the putative ruler of his own country only receives \$50,000 per year for his services as boss, and a few years ago got only \$25,000 a year. This good man rarely, perhaps never, stops to think that in a single Presidential campaign, which occurs once in four years in the United States, enough and more than enough money is generously contributed and expended by the people, and lost by the people in the general derangement of business to pay the salaries of all the known Royal families of Europe for the year ensuing, as also, the current expenses of their armies and navies for the same period. As now entertained, both Royalty and Republicanism are expensive delights, and if both could be made less expensive by the practice all round of more economy and simplicity of manner, it would be far better for the people living under both forms of Government.

If appeals had been made for church and hospital uses for one-tenth of the amount given freely in the Election by the friends of both candidates it is a question if it would not have been thought that the applicants were at least a trifle cheeky. Such is the difference between political enthusiasm and other kinds of enthusiasm.

The moral of all the foregoing is, that now that we have been exceedingly prodigal, economy in public expenditure should characterize the incoming administration, and, probably, it will. This last inference seems a safe one, even though when written nobody can tell who is the President-elect.

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TOO MUCH INQUISITION.

Cigar Foreman Schmidt Summoned Before Judge Powell to Answer for Ejecting an Alleged Deputy Labor Commissioner from Lichtenstein Bros. & Co.'s Cigar Factory.

COUNSELLOR WISE DEFENDS HIM.

In the Fifty-seventh street Police Court, on Thursday, a case came up which is fraught with considerable interest to cigar manufacturers and all other people who claim a right to protect themselves against inquisitorial laws and persons claiming to act under such laws. The plaintiff in the case was a man who claimed to be deputized by the Commissioner of Labor Statistics, who, it will be remembered, was appointed under a law passed by the last New York Legislature, creating a Labor Bureau, to enter private houses and workshops in search of labor statistics. The defendant was Mr. Schmidt, foreman of Lichtenstein Bros. & Co.'s cigar factory, in Forty-fifth street. It appears that the plaintiff had visited the factory several times, claiming to be in quest of information relative to labor and the sanitary condition of the workers in the houses. He was so inquisitive that his presence became a nuisance, and on Monday last foreman Schmidt ejected him from the buildings. The deputy appealed to the Court and Mr. Schmidt in consequence was summoned to appear before Judge Powell, the complaint being attempted interference with an officer of the law in the performance of his duties. This Mr. Schmidt did, and was defended by Morris S. Wise.

In his argument Mr. Wise said:—

"As I represent the Cigar Manufacturers' Association of this city, and have had considerable experience in contesting on their behalf many of the so-called labor laws, notably the Tenement House Cigar Law, I beg leave to express my opinion on the matter."

"I made to your Honor this morning on the question of the right of the agents of the Bureau of Labor Statistics to pay domiciliary visits under the powers conferred by the law. The only act of the Legislature on the subject is found in chapter 356 of the laws of 1880, which reads:—

"The act is not amended; it stands today as originally enacted."

The act is brief and appears to me very plain in its scope and bearings. There is no possibility of misunderstanding the intent of the Legislature. There was certainly no intention to create a tribunal for the investigation of sanitary, spiritual or material conditions. The act was intended to create a bureau for the collection of statistics, and to collect, sort, systematize and present in annual reports, etc., details relating to all departments of labor in the State, etc. Section 3 invests the Commissioner with power 'to send for persons and things, to examine witnesses under oath; to take depositions, or cause them (that is depositions) to be taken by others by law authorized to take depositions (that is Justices of the Peace, Notaries, etc.), and said Commissioner may depose any unwilling person to do what? To enter houses to gather statistics, to investigate sanitary, spiritual or material conditions? No! but to serve subpoenas and to pay witness fees. I claim there is no power vested in the Commissioner to depose any one to do more than the law authorizes him to do himself. Now, the Court can easily see that if the law is to be enforced, the Commissioner must have power to appoint inspectors to make personal examinations it would have said so; but it plainly limits the power, and, in addition, the law in section 3 distinctly provides that 'no witness shall against his will be compelled to answer any question respecting his private affairs.' Now, if a witness is protected in this regard, how much stronger is the protection against a forced intrusion in a dwelling, or in the apartments of the worker against his will."

The Constitution of the United States, Article IV, of the Amendments, distinctly provides that 'the right of the people to be secure in their persons, houses, papers or effects against unreasonable searches shall not be violated.'

If the Commissioner has the right to send a person into the private rooms of the worker, he may as well send him to the worker's bedroom, to examine his wardrobe, to take his clothing to the inspector to examine the workman's underwear in order to arrive at his social or sanitary condition. We protest against any such interpretation of the law. There is nothing in the act to warrant such surveillance or inquisitorial visitation."

"The Commissioner has the right to send for persons or papers—that is, to examine witnesses. He may appoint a clerk. He may depose persons to serve subpoenas. But he has no more earthly power to appoint substitutes, or assistants, to do his own work; than your Honor would have the power to appoint some other person not to justice to take your place on the bench, to sign commitments or perform your duties. We therefore kindly request the Court to decide that there is no power vested in the Commissioner or his Bureau to make these visits. That the Commissioner and his work being purely the creatures of a statute, the statute must be strictly followed. Courts will not enlarge a statute, especially in a direction which might be made an odious tyranny. Every citizen has a right to resist such an unlawful intrusion."

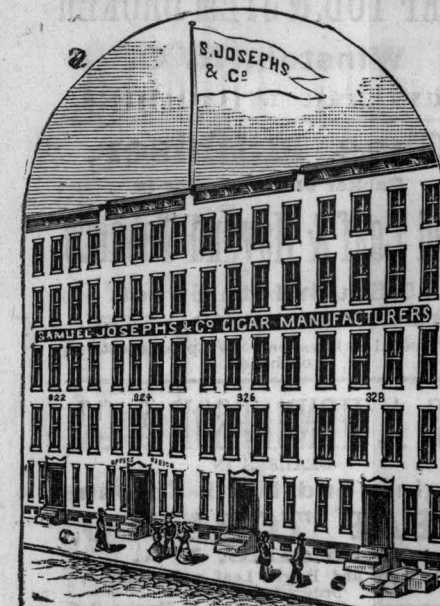
