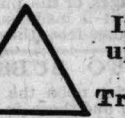
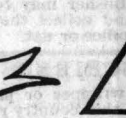

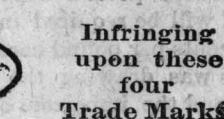

MERCHANT APPRAISERS TO BE ABOLISHED.

WASHINGTON, Nov. 21.—The special committee of the Senate appointed to investigate undervaluations in New York and other ports have concluded their labors, and are preparing a report to Congress. Senator McPherson, a member of the committee, said to-day he thought the committee would make a unanimous report. He added that his committee would recommend the passage of a bill to do away with the merchant appraisers altogether, and establish a board of nine Government appraisers, three to be stationed in New York and one in Boston, Philadelphia, Baltimore, New Orleans and San Francisco. These appraisers would be transferred from point to point, which would enable them to become thoroughly familiar with all classes and grades of articles coming into this country. No appeal will be permitted from the unanimous decision of the board in New York, except to the courts.

This looks well on its face, but the meaning of it is that expert merchants shall not be permitted to express their opinions, as they now can, concerning the proper duties to be imposed upon merchandise where the question of what is lawful duty arises between the importer and the Customs officials. In the place of qualified merchants, whose honest testimony would be convincing, political appointees are to be substituted as witnesses and judges.

UP AND DOWN, SEE-SAW.

On Monday last Collector Magone of the New York Custom House issued the following dictum:

"On all leaf tobacco hereafter arriving from Dutch ports a deposit of 75 cents per pound will be required in lieu of the deposit of 35 cents per pound heretofore required."

This was drawing the line on the Dutch ports and the importers of Sumatra tobacco in a way that was more original than agreeable. Accordingly, somebody interested in the import trade asked the Collector to modify his ukase. He has done so, as will be seen by the annexed statement of Mr. Comstock of the Custom House, made to a representative of the LEAF Friday, Nov. 25:

"A new order will be issued to day, and will not require any deposit, except as under the terms of the entry, when it has to be determined what is the proper duty, and measures will be taken to protect the Government by having an immediate report made by the Appraiser, which report will form the basis of withdrawals hereafter."

In other words, the Collector leaves the situation about as it has been. His order of Monday was to the effect that importers of Sumatra tobacco must pay duty upon withdrawal from warehouse at the rate of 75 cents per pound on the whole quantity withdrawn, and then wait until the liquidation of the entry for a refund of the difference between the duty assessed by the Appraiser and that paid. Heretofore the importers have been permitted to withdraw their tobacco upon payment of 35 cents per pound, and have paid on liquidation the balance found due by the Appraiser.

Had the Collector persisted in enforcing his original order, importers might have lost many months' interest on their deposits.

TIMELY EVEN NOW.

The Tobacco LEAF's report of the convention of cigar manufacturers at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, this city, last week, is conceded by those in attendance to be the fullest and best yet published. The LEAF always aims to do its duty, and usually succeeds.

If any shortcomings in miscellaneous intelligence were visible in last week's LEAF, its readers will excuse the omissions when they read through the nine solid columns devoted to a verbatim portrayal of the proceedings of the cigar manufacturers who were in convention on Wednesday and Thursday, November 16 and 17—on the latter day, even unto the small hours of the following morning.

The Legal Protective Association of Cigar Manufacturers have had a clear-headed, able worker and good impromptu speaker in their president, Edward Heyman.

It was a graceful tender of a Roland for an

Oliver on both sides when Mr. Hirsch nominated Mr. Fuller for president of the convention, and Mr. Fuller declined the honor in favor of Mr. Hirsch, who was simultaneously named for the same position.

Morris S. Wise is the prince of organizers. He knows just how and when to do everything he engages in, and is always so calm that he has time to be both helpful and courteous.

For good extempore speaking Joseph Oppenheim is deserving of a high measure of praise whenever and wherever he indulges his oratorical gifts.

Messrs. Newmark, Cohn, Hall, Wertheim, Green, Crouse, Gumpert, Baron, Landauer, Fuller, Ottenberg, Ford and Roth proved ready debaters in the convention.

The one important puzzle remaining for solution at the close of the convention was whether or not the cigar manufacturers of the United States, speaking as a majority, want the cigar tax abolished.

THE TOBACCO TAXES—HAVE A CONVENTION IN WASHINGTON.

It does not clearly appear at this time what is to be the outcome of the present agitation on this never-ending topic. It is certain that Congress has only to be authoritatively asked to repeal these taxes and they will be repealed. But the authoritative request is still lacking; from the great body of those interested no general and formulaic expression of opinion having been made public, nor in the absence of organization is likely to be.

The desire of tobacco growers for the repeal of the taxes has been made manifest by frequent declarations in convention; so, too, the desire to the same end has been often publicly expressed in resolutions of the leaf tobacco boards of trade of the country, as also by individual cigar and tobacco manufacturers, but up to this moment neither Congressmen nor the people at large can determine from anything that has been said or done what is the real sentiment of the majority interested in this question, or what amount of influence by petition *pro* and *con* is to be brought to bear upon Congress this winter. This circumstance is to be regretted for many reasons, the most important of which is that the uncertainty as to the result thus caused unsettles and hinders trade.

It was expected that the convention of cigar manufacturers at the Fifth Avenue Hotel, this city, last week, would be able to indicate pretty nearly the sentiment of their trade respecting the retention or abolition of the cigar tax, but the vote—11 for abolition and 25 for retention—showed that even there, where leading men were assembled, opinion was not far from equally divided; while outside of that assemblage it is a matter of conjecture as to what the preference is.

Almost at the same time that the cigar manufacturers were in session on Wednesday and Thursday, some leading tobacco manufacturers, as announced in the LEAF last week, were considering in this city the course to be pursued by them in relation to the tax on manufactured tobacco. The attendance was small and no definite action was taken on the subject for which the meeting was held, but it is almost certain that the large tobacco manufacturers will, when Congress convenes, advocate the continuance of the tax on tobacco. How potent will be the voices of the manufacturers who prefer the repeal of the tax remains to be seen, as does the force of the proposed protest against the cigar tax of the minority in the cigar manufacturers' convention.

Through Mr. Strasser, at Binghamton, the cigarmakers recently announced their preference for a continuance of the cigar tax; but from this utterance, no more than from the other approving declarations already mentioned and predicted, can a positive conclusion be reached as to the strength or bearing of the opponents of further taxation.

To solve the riddle, we suggest a convention of all parties in interest—representative growers, manufacturers of tobacco and cigars, and cigarmakers—to be held in Washington some day in January ensuing, to discuss, resolve and report what is desired to Congress.

Can we not find a way to prevent this grave danger?"

CIRCULAR TO THE CIGAR MANUFACTURERS OF THE UNITED STATES.

50 AND 52 EXCHANGE PLACE, NEW YORK, NOV. 24.

EDITOR TOBACCO LEAF.

In conformity with the resolution adopted by the late convention, I have formulated the resolutions adopted by that gathering, the same has been printed as per enclosed copy and sent to many hundred of the leading cigar manufacturers of the United States in all sections thereof, who were not represented at said convention. As it was impossible to reach all the manufacturers, I suggest, if you see fit so to do, that you publish the enclosed circular as a matter of news, coupled with a warning to the effect that any cigar manufacturer not receiving a copy of my circular may nevertheless send his answers to the questions propounded therein to me, also asking such manufacturers to give the number of hands for which their factories are bonded.

Upon receiving the replies to this circular I will tabulate the result and send you the same. The idea of disseminating these queries is to give all sides a fair and equal show, and to endeavor to get at the real views of the trade on the questions involved. Yours respectfully, MORRIS S. CIRCULAR.

DEAR SIR:—A resolution was adopted by the above entitled convention requiring the secretary thereof to formulate the resolutions adopted at its sessions, and to forward the same to the leading cigar manufacturers of the United States who were not represented at said convention, with the request that views of such absent firms be obtained from them on the questions involved in said resolutions. The resolutions adopted at said convention were in substance as follows, and your immediate answer is requested as to the same.

First Resolution—That the retention of the Internal Revenue tax on cigars, although not opposing a reduction thereof should Congress see fit to reduce the same. Or to be specific, the convention resolved that it did not favor the abolition of the tax on cigars, and consequent withdrawal of the Internal Revenue regulations governing the same.

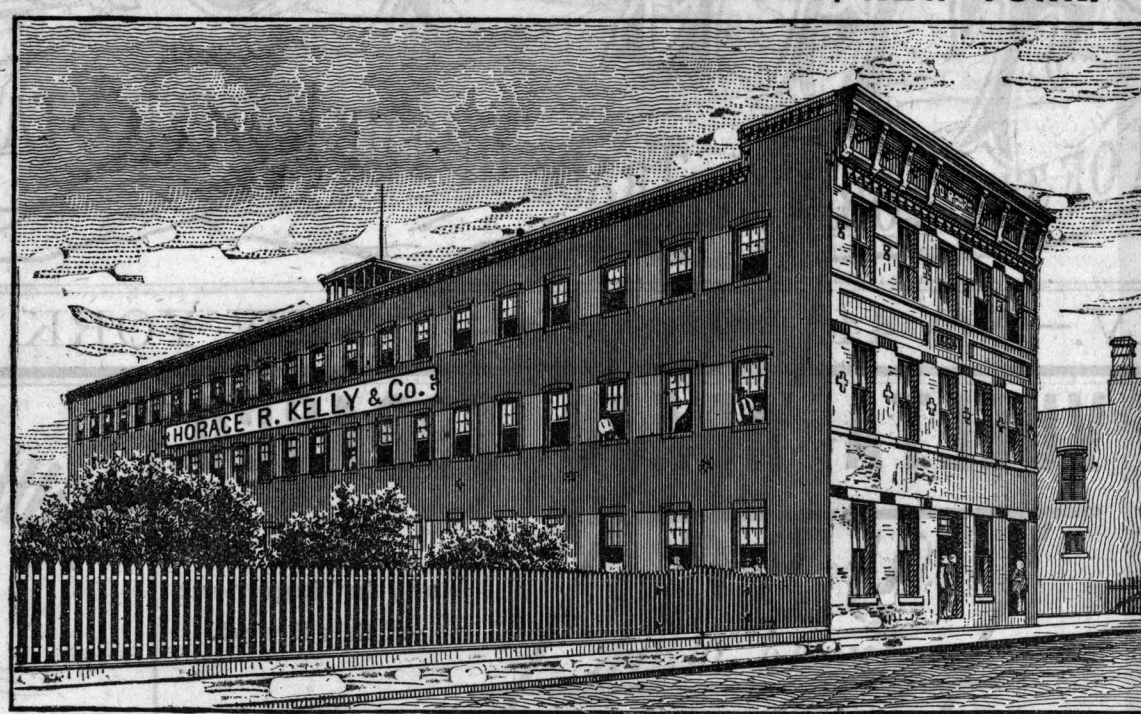

NEARLY 2,000 BALES OF SUMATRA

LOST AT SEA.

The Steamer W. A. Scholten, from Amsterdam, sunk off the English Coast.

News reached this city on Sunday last that the steamer W. A. Scholten, from Amsterdam, bound for this city with nearly 200 passengers and a full cargo, was sunk off Dover, caused by a collision with the steamer *Rosa Mary*. A dense fog enveloped the steamers when the accident occurred. The life-saving apparatus on the steamer, it seems, was entirely inadequate to the demands made upon it by the terror-stricken passengers, and over 100 lives were lost. The scenes on board the vessel at the time of the accident, as described in lengthy cablegrams to the daily press, are heart-rending. The *Scholten* makes the fifth steamer the Netherlands Steamship Co. has lost within the past five years.

A cable was received on Monday morning from a broker in Amsterdam, saying that the steamer had on board 1,700 bales of Sumatra, which was all lost. Many of the Sumatra importing firms cabled to Amsterdam asking if any tobacco had been shipped to them on the ill-fated steamer. From the answers to these cables it seems that there were nearly 2,000 bales on board. Following is a list of the consignees:

Most of the tobacco lost is said to be of the finest grade, and for one lot of over 300 bales the highest price yet received in Amsterdam was paid. The goods were all fully insured. Although the importers will make 10 percent on the value of the tobacco lost they would have much preferred to have disposed of it in the regular way, especially as the goods cannot be duplicated and a good profit was insured.

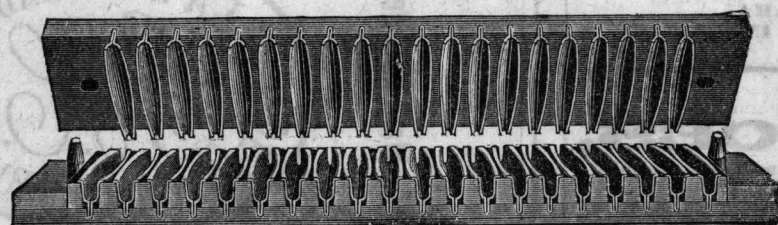

**LIVERPOOL.**—Messrs. Edward Samuelson & Co.'s monthly report for Nov. 1, 1887:—

We note a better tone in the market for North American tobacco, and the sales during the past month were more varied, and perhaps to a larger extent than for some time past.

Western strips of the lower and finer qualities were in request, and were more readily met with at prices suitable to buyers in the new tobacco than in the old. There is an evident scarcity of the better grades, which must be disappointing to manufacturers, especially as the sampling is well advanced, and only half the quantity compared with this time last year remains unsampled. Trade leaf was inquired for, but suitable quality is difficult to find, although the stock, including exports, amounts to a large figure. The shipments to Africa were large.

Bright Virginia, especially leaf, met with more inquiry, and some fair-sized parcels found buyers. In dark grades there is nothing of interest to report.

The most recent advices from Virginia speak in more subdued tones about the quality of the new crop. We regret we so seldom see the fulfillment of those early promises of fine crops which periodically charm the ears of the trade. Virginia exports to be called upon to supply part of the deficiency in the West.

Imports—4,626 hds, of which 484 were Virginia leaf, 491 strips, 2,031 Western leaf, and 1,103 stems.

Deliveries—1,839 hds, viz., 188 Virginia leaf, 263 strips, 613 Western leaf, 756 stems, and 9 Maryland.

Exports—236 hds, viz., 7 Virginia leaf, 1 strips, 224 Western leaf, and 4 strips, of which 226 were sent to Africa, 5 Isle of Man, 4 Gibraltar, and 1 Bordeaux.

Stock—48,991 hds, against 46,074, 30,509, 23,466, 28,463, and 29,867 at this period the previous five years.

Cavendish quiet. Imports, 417. Deliveries, 460. Stock 5,793 packages.

**LONDON.**—Messrs. Grant, Chambers & Co., in their circular dated Nov. 1, say:—

During the past month there has been rather more interest shown by the trade, who appear to have been partially aroused from the long continued apathy which has prevailed, and have been looking into the future prospects of the market in connection with the sampling of the present import, which has now made considerable progress. The bulk of what has already been seen of the new tobacco proves to be in good dry condition, moderately leafy and part fair color, but rather coarse in appearance.

In substitutes a considerable business has been done, and colory classes have brought full prices. Cigar tobacco has been only in moderate request.

Imports, 3,366 hds. Deliveries, 1,067 hds, against 1,071 in the corresponding month of last year. Stock, 34,287 hds, against 30,903 in 1886, 25,787 in 1885, 20,915 in 1884, 20,687 in 1883, 21,994 in 1882, and 28,842 in 1881.

land and Ohio—For the former there is scarcely any demand, and for the latter there has of late been a lack of inquiry. This state of things will no doubt improve when the sampling of the new crop, now commencing, has taken place.

Havana cigars have not attracted buyers to any considerable extent, although some moderate sales were made at public auction. A further quantity will be offered in the same way during the present month. Manila Cigars and Cigars—Some considerable sales have been effected, but not at satisfactory prices for the shippers. Some other parcels will shortly be offered.

Sumatra when of desirable quality is in moderate demand.

Seed Leaf—Several late arrivals of fillers were placed immediately they were sampled, and little remains in first hands.

Turkey—A fair business has been done. Very little of the new crop is expected to come here. Java has been only operated in to a moderate extent. Japan has been in active demand, especially the lighter colored sorts, of which sales have been effected at slightly higher prices. About 400 bales of this growth will be offered at public auction on the 10th instant. Latakia continues very much neglected. Negrohead and Cavendish only in very limited demand. Stalks in good demand. Smalls in fair request.

Nov. 2.—There has been but little inquiry in this market during the past week, and the business done in American growths has been upon a limited scale. Substitutes have been operated in to a moderate extent. Western—Some few sales of strips have been effected at current prices. Virginia—Colory leaf has had some attention, resulting in a small business. Ohio—Sampling has now made considerable progress. Cavendish is slow of sale.

Resolved, That we do endorse the resolutions recently adopted by the New England Tobacco Growers' Association, at Hartford, Conn., especially in so far as they relate to a proper and equal enforcement of duties on imported leaf and the abolition of the Internal Revenue tax on domestic leaf, and generally as they look to the interest of home producers.

The following resolution was then adopted and ordered published in like manner:—

Resolved, That in the death of vice-president W. H. Paschal, this association has lost an earnest and useful member, the county a good and conscientious citizen, and the fraternity an honorable and progressive light; that we as a body, while bowing humbly to the will of Him who governeth and who taketh away, deplore his untimely departure from our midst and take this action in honorable memory of our deceased brother; that to his widow and surviving friends and relations our sincerest sympathies are extended in their affliction; and that these proceedings and resolutions be published in the Florida Tobacco Plant at Lake City.

The meeting then adjourned to meet again at the same place on Saturday, the 26th inst., when steps will be taken looking to the holding of a tobacco exhibit at Lake City about December 20. A full attendance is desired.

**IN OHIO.**

Miami burg Bulletin, Nov. 18:—Bamberger, of Philadelphia, is in town. He is riding with the Golden Eagle and looking after old Dutch.

Mr. Samuel Ragendorf, long a resident of Cincinnati, now resides in New York city.

Mr. Moritz Ragendorf, the famous originator of Little Dutch, is located in Kentucky.

Mr. Henry Meyer, of Henry Meyer & Co., Cincinnati, is comfortably established in his elegant new home.

Cincinnati tobacco men are astonished at the high prices lately paid for '87 Zimmer's Spanish and predict a big output of that matchless variety in '88. Zimmer's Spanish has sold for 20 cents, but it was all wrapper.

A knot of leading tobacco men on the street in Cincinnati, Saturday, agreed that too much Dutch is grown.

The question whether Zimmer's Spanish, as filler, will not displace the famous Little Dutch has lately been raised. Never—The two are distinct. As well might one ask why oranges have not long since supplanted lemons.

In 1838, when Krohn, Feiss & Co., of Cincinnati, were buying Zimmer's Spanish at 10 to 14c, along came our poetic friend Dickinson, of Massachusetts, and knocked some high permissims at 20c. The following year

Dickinson didn't come around, and Zimmer's Spanish went begging at 5 to 8 cents. The law of proportions approves the price paid by Krohn, Feiss & Co. 20 and 5 make 28, the half of which is 14—the highest price paid by Krohn, Feiss & Co.

**IN TENNESSEE.**

Stoughton Courier, Nov. 18:—As long as the dry weather continues it is impossible to handle the new tobacco crop. The buyers and planters are both in a state of excitement among the growers. The buyers in this city are doing but very little as yet. The farmers are waiting for a rain to enable them to commence stripping.

Edgerton Tobacco Reporter, Nov. 18:—Fulton's warehouse for the ensuing year. Leonard Friend, of New York, has been with us the past week, having arrived Friday evening.

A. O. Vincent's tobacco shed east of the C. & N. W. Railway at Milton Junction, was burned last week. It is supposed to be by an incendiary. The shed cost about \$700; insured for \$400.

M. G. Shindle, of Mountville, Pa., who represents the New York firm of L. Newgrass & Co., arrived Friday evening. He was called home Sunday by a dispatch announcing the death of a relative.

—A "Doctor" Wolcott, of western New York, is the latest scientist who strikes out to achieve fame by a tirade against cigarettes. The absurd statement that most of the cigarettes are manufactured from tobacco manipulated from old cigar stumps has been briefly set aside when the fact became generally known that to gather up and prepare one pound of cigar stumps would cost more than five pounds of the brightest and best leaf ever grown in Virginia. Besides this, one "high flavored" cigar stump would nearly destroy a hoghead of tobacco for manufacturing purposes. "Dr." Wolcott's statement that rank poisons are used by cigarette manufacturers has elicited strong denials from such leading manufacturers as W. S. Kimball & Co., Allen & Ginter, W. Duke & Sons and Goodwin & Co.

—Smoking tobacco made from leaf grown in England will shortly be placed on the market in that country. It has been prepared at Corcoran's factory, and is reported as of excellent quality.
