WHAT'S THE FUTURE FOR NORTH AMERICAN BIRD BANDER?

It's a question those of us involved with the production of *NABB* ask ourselves. Dedicated volunteers prepare sections including Recent Literature, Significant Encounters, Atlantic Flyway Review and Western Annual Report. What *NABB* needs is a larger pool of authors to assure you, the readers, a continuing flow of interesting articles in each issue.

Who might write articles about the results of a banding project, or techniques of banding, or ageing and sexing a bird species? You! Everyone who bands birds generates data suitable for publication. If the articles in *North American Bird Bander* bring you useful information, you can return the favor by sharing your techniques and results with others. Though the results of a larger project may be published elsewhere, descriptions of the banding techniques used, the data gathered on ageing and sexing, details of plumage variations and patterns of weight gain and loss are still appropriate for publication in *NABB*. These are important data which should not remain buried in your files.

Now that you are convinced to search your records and write up interesting information that might help other banders, why should you publish it in *North American Bird Bander*? Because this is the journal for banders, and it specializes in the kind of information that banders need and use.

For experienced authors, *NABB* offers a simple format, constructive peer reviews, a reasonable publication schedule, no page charges, and papers of any length are welcome. In addition, for new authors, our reviewers and editors will help you with the details of scientific writing.

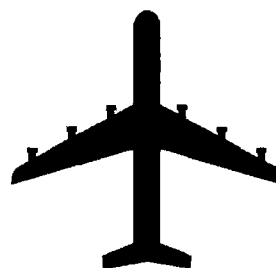
