Annual Meeting, September 9-12, 2004

The Western Bird Banding Association will hold its 79th Annual Meeting in conjunction with the Western Field Ornithologists (WFO, 29th Annual Meeting) and Oregon Field Ornithologists (OFO, 25th Annual Meeting).

The Klamath Bird Observatory will host the joint Annual Meetings in Ashland, Oregon, September 9 - 12, 2004 at the Windmill & Windsor Inns.

The Setting

The Klamath Bioregion of southern Oregon and northern California offers wonderful opportunities for birders to discover mountain and Great Basin bird species in rural, urban, mountain, and wetland settings. This region is rich in a variety of wildlife and in September participants will be visiting during the height of shorebird and passerine migration. The Klamath-Siskiyou and Cascade Ranges; the Great Basin desert; the creeks, marshes, meadows, and agricultural fields of the Klamath Basin; and the Rogue River Valley are some of the destinations of field trips planned for this meeting to highlight the rich diversity of landscapes, habitats, and avifauna that the region has to offer. Extended post-meeting trips are being planned for the Klamath Basin Refuges, Great Basin Desert, and Oregon Coast (for pelagic birding). Consider bringing the entire family to Ashland for this meeting. For the

enjoyment of all, the famous Oregon Shakespeare Festival (<http://www.orshakes.org/home.html>) is a major event that will be in full swing and continues into late autumn. There are galleries, museums, and excellent restaurants throughout the town.

Conference Activities

The joint annual meeting will offer full-day field trips to the Klamath Basin National Refuges Complex on September 9 and September 12; and local, half-day field trips on September 9, 10, and 11. Other planned activities include banding workshops, photography and sketching workshops, evening field trips, afternoon science sessions on September 10 and 11, and a poster session. Additional events will include WFO's ever-popular expert slide identification and sound identification panels, a WBBA-sponsored Peter Pyle molt-limit workshop, and a North American Banding Council bander evaluation session. Social activities will include a welcoming reception, evening programs with noted speakers, and combined annual dinners. WBBA, WFO, and OFO welcome all levels of birder, from beginner to seasoned veteran. A number of noted western birders, ornithologists, and professional field trip leaders are contributing their time and talents to ensure that meeting participants enjoy good science and good birding.

Call for Papers and Posters

Abstracts are now being accepted for presentations and posters. Oral and poster presentations should reflect original research or summarize existing information. Talks and posters relating to the following special themes of the 2004 meeting are especially solicited:

- * New or expansion of methods of capture, processing, ageing and sexing, to make capture of birds more meaningful;
- * Ecology, population biology, and conservation of the birds of the Klamath/Siskiyou region of southern Oregon and northern California;
- * Identification, status and distribution, and taxonomy of hybrid and intergrades of bird populations found in Oregon and elsewhere in western North America.

Talks and posters relating to the following, more general, themes are also solicited:

- * Techniques for field study of birds, including censusing, monitoring, and other methods; results of studies applying such techniques;
- * New information on field identification problems relevant to the birds of western North America and the eastern Pacific Ocean;
- * Systematics and biogeography of the birds of the Pacific Coast region, the North American interior (including Mexico), and the interface between the two.

All talks and posters should identify study objectives; describe study methods and data analysis; discuss the significance of the research; and propose future research directions. We expect to allot 15 minutes per oral presentation, which should include three minutes for questions and discussion. Dialogue between presenters and audience is a hallmark of all meetings of WBBA and its partners.

Posters should fit within a width of six feet. Graphic materials, tables, and illustrations should be as simple as possible. Sequence the viewing of the poster with arrows, letters, or numbers so as to be self-explanatory. Text, graphics, and illustrations should be readable from a distance of at least four feet. Poster presenters are expected to be available for extensive discussion with meeting participants.

An abstract of your presentation or poster should be submitted electronically to C. J. Ralph (cjr2@humboldt.edu) and John Alexander (jda@KlamathBird.org). We would prefer that all queries and submissions be via e-mail. Because of the joint meeting, papers will be accepted in the order received. We expect to rapidly fill the available slots for WBBA talks, so early submission is strongly encouraged. All abstracts should be received no later than 15 August 2004 and should be submitted in exactly the following format:

* YOUR LAST NAME, YOUR FIRST NAME. Your affiliation (if any), complete mailing address, e-mail address. Title of your talk. Brief (300 word maximum) summary of the objectives, methods, results, significance, and generality of your study. Results from the Vote on WBBA Issues

In December, President Ken Burton contacted WBBA members with a list of issues requiring a vote of the membership. All questions passed. In summary:

1. The size of the Board may now range from three to eleven members.

1a. We have three new Board members: Mike Boyles (National Park Service, Boulder City, NV), C. J. Ralph (USDA Forest Service, Arcata, CA), and Walter Sakai (Santa Monica College, Santa Monica, CA). These officers will serve until the next annual meeting.

1b. There is now a Board position for Membership Coordinator.

2. The Institutional category of membership now includes ALL organizations, institutions, and agencies.

3. Institutional members are now allowed to vote.


4. The cost of Life membership is now independent from the cost of Active membership.

In a subsequent vote, the Board agreed to set the cost of Life membership at \$300.
